DON'T BUY NOW, SAYS VET HEAD

Says "Bust" Is Coming In Real Estate Prices

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has advised its membership to stay out of the home-buying market if humanly possible, Eugene G. Patterson, V.F.W. state adjutant, declared in Seattle.

Patterson pointed out recent staffing of a property management division in the Veterans Administration as evidence of a probable "bust" in real estate prices.

Patterson believes activity of the government unit indicates it is preparing to take over a substantial number of homes bought by veterans under the G. I. Bill of Rights and later defaulted.

Houses Over-Priced

In the event of a major drop in prices, Patterson pointed out, veterans will find themselves still owing more on homes than the normal gross value.

He summarized the V.F.W.'s concern in the matter as follows: "First, we want to protect interests of veterans and their families. If veterans buy houses at present high prices, they may find they have bought over their heads if a later recession brings wage cuts, since the home payments will not be reduced. In this event, a veteran forced to default on his loan may find himself without a house, and with a heavy debt to a lender or the government."

"Our other interest is in the government. If wholesale defaults on G. I. loans put V. A. in large-scale property management, the cost to the United States would amount to millions of dollars. If it went too far, our national economy would be jeopardized."

MASS MEETING IS DEMANDED BY CITIZENS

COMMISSIONERS FAVOR "YES" VOTE; DISTRICT OPPOSED BY BRESEMANN

With the Water District election only a few days away, Spanaway people are excited over the outcome.

One group, consisting of Chester McAte, William Righetti, John Howard Lee, Grant Fogle, Harry P. Pennington, Louie Jones and Arthur Hallengren, has asked for a meeting of Spanaway citizens on Friday, August 15, at 8 p.m. at the Spanaway school to discuss the whole question again.

Mass Meeting

The statement reads as follows: "We, the undersigned, desire to hear exactly what can be told us in regard to the proposed water district Friday, August 15, at the Spanaway School at 8 p.m." It was emphasized that this was a public meeting with all interested people welcome to attend.

Commissioners Favor District

On Wednesday morning John Rohr, temporary water commissioner, stated that "I am in favor of the project and hope it will carry at the election on Saturday," Martin Gibbons, commissioner, also stated that he favored the matter. H. F. Guinn, the third temporary commissioner, said "I am absolutely and wholeheartedly behind the project." E. W. Senff, Spanaway resident, said, "I am 100 per cent for the water district."

Guinn also stated that the water commissioners have had no quotations of what the cost will be. "None was received in 1947," he said, "or to the present date. We will not know until the matter is computed."

Bresemann Opposes

However, Delbert Bresemann, Justice of the Peace, stated that he was entirely opposed to the matter. He stated, "If the election is carried Saturday it will result in the immediate assessment of a two mill levy on the assessed valuation of the property owned by the people of the district." He also said that the approximate cost would be \$2.80 per front foot of property facing the pipe line.

Continuing, Bresemann said that anyone within the boundaries of the district who is qualified to vote at a general election can vote on Saturday, whether or not a property owner.

Boundaries

The district roughly comprises the area beginning at 15th street, around Spanaway Lake, about 150 feet west of the Loop Road, then East on Military Road, 150 feet north of the Military Road, to Cullum's Addition. Then the line runs along East F street going South to 15th and East F.

The election will take place from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. at the Spanaway school.

Yet, so lax are our laws, so careless our enforcement, so calloused our consciences, that almost nothing is done when children are crippled, the aged maimed, and everyone's life endangered when these MURDERERS roam the highways.

WHEN WILL WE PUNISH THESE DRUNKEN THUGS? When will we re-write our laws so that the man who maims and cripples will receive the punishment he deserves? When will we keep them off the road by laws so stringent that they dare not kill our children? Or will we pursue in the future, as in the past, the same policy, letting them go their merry way, saying only "Naughty, naughty"? *Let us remember, that eight year old boy might have been your boy.*

Will Test Midland Water Tower Soon


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SPANAWAY RESIDENT PASSES AWAY




