County Agent's Corner

How does it feel to be the top individual 4-H poultry judge in the state? Ask Jim Bennett of the Fife 4-H club. He led the scorers in the poultry judging

contest at the recent state 4-H fair at Yakima. The Pierce County team placed first. Jim's teammates were Davil Larson from Edgewood, Harry Telling from Fife, and Roberta Reed from Puyallup. These youngsters also finished first at the Southwest Washington Fair and second at the Western Washington Fair. Judging contests at fairs offer

4-Hers an excellent opportunity to show what they know about good and poor quality products. October 1 marked the start of a new 4-H club year. This is the time of year to organize clubs. Good leaders seem to be the limiting factor. The youngsters are eager. Boys and girls between 10-21 years of age are eligible for club work. Five members are needed to form a club. The group meets at least once each month. Members may select from over thirty agricultural and home economics projects. Leaders serve on a volunteer basis and have a wonderful opportunity to do a service for their community. For further information, contact the County Agent's office.

What makes a happy home? Do some patterns of family values and relationships result in greater happiness than others? This was the basic question of a survey conducted by Walter Slocum of Washington State College. He gathered information from almost 2000 boys and girls who were seniors in 35 Washington High schools in 1954. Almost 80 per cent of these young people lived in unbroken homes. Of those in unbroken homes, about 90 per cent said

their home life was either very happy or fairly happy. This, Walt says, can be interpreted to mean that there are many ways of achieving happiness. At the same time, different degrees of happiness were indicated. The next step was to try to find out what made for the different degrees. Of course, happiness is undoubtedly more complicated and involved than any one thing. But here are some of the things that seemed to be involved in the happier home life: parents are happy with each other, parents are reasonably well educated, family has an income that is adequate for their needs, parents rule with a light hand, and parents are able to communicate to their children that they ap-

preciate them as developing individuals who can make their own decisions.

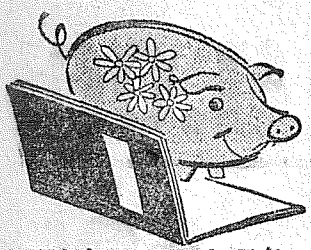

Bill Watterson, a new member, was appointed chairman of a committee to see about a club swim at the YMCA.

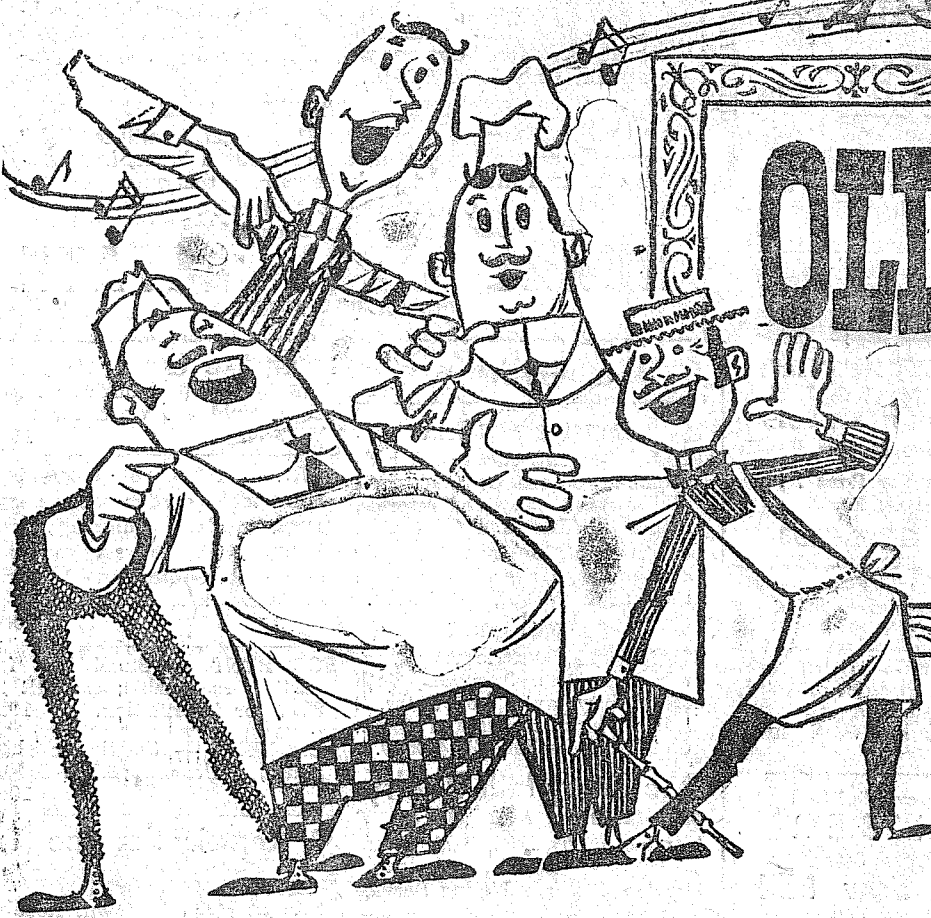

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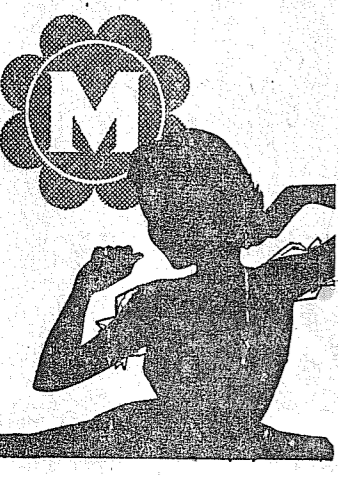
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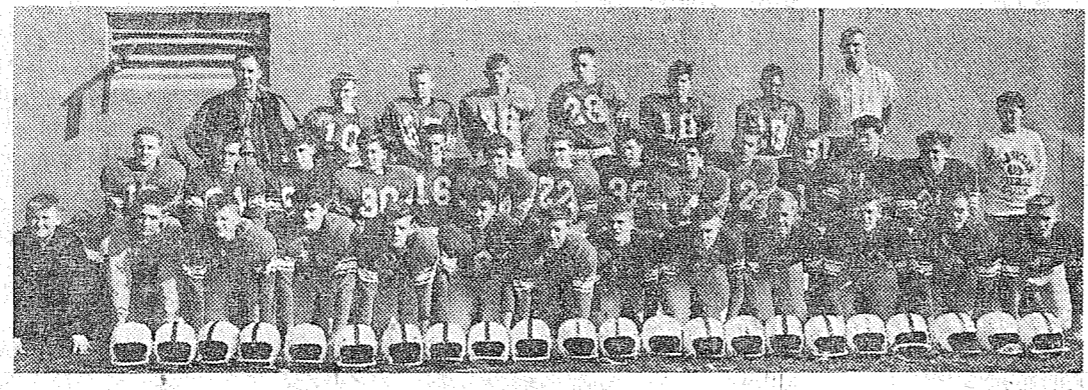

Rear Adm. Richard E. Eyrd made his historic first airplane flight over the North Pole 31 years ago. He flew a tri-motored Fokker monoplane.

This reporter must confess a degree of prejudice in behalf of Jones since yours truly played on the same team with "The Jet". He stood out like a man playing with the boys in the neighborhood.

Jones never stops, never quits, never lets adversity lick him. One only ahs to plar with or against him to realize this fact.

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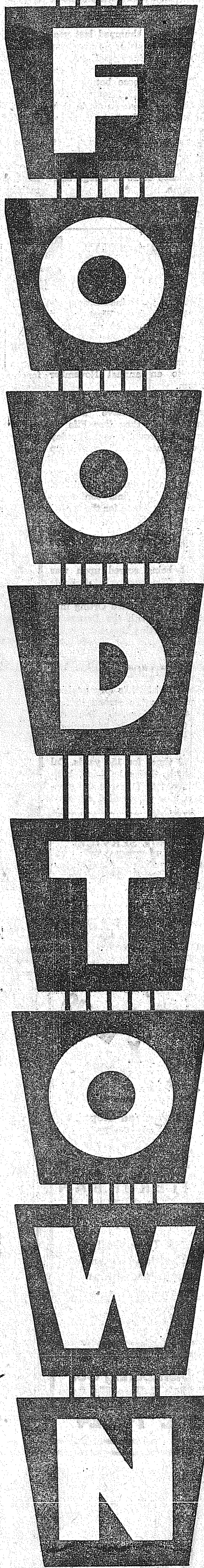

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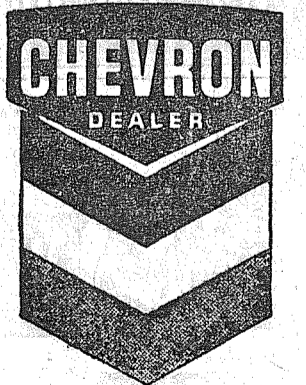
