Dr. J. A. Aasgaard, president of the Evangelical Lutheran Church, Minneapolis, Minn., will give the commencement address at Pacific Lutheran College at 3:30 p.m., Sunday, May 30, in Memorial Gymnasium.

The last visit to the west coast of the national church leader was in 1943 when he installed Dr. S. C. Eastvold as president of Pacific Lutheran.

Dr. Aasgaard is an outstanding leader in the Lutheran church. He is a member of the board of the National Lutheran Council. He is a delegate to the Lutheran World convention held in Europe last summer. King Haakon of Norway appointed him to the Order of St. Olaf. He is a member of the board of the American Bible Society.

Following the commencement exercises the Mill City leader will be honored at a reception in the Student Union for members of the faculty and their wives and for visiting pastors and wives.

Baccalaureate services for the senior class will be held Sunday morning at 11 in Memorial Gymnasium. The Rev. Theo. Gulhaugen of Sacramento, Calif., will give the sermon. Dr. E. B. Steen, the college pastor, will be the liturgist.

A class of 80 seniors will receive their degrees at Sunday's commencement.

The graduation festivities will begin with an academic procession from the Student Union down to the gymnasium. Music for the procession will be played by the college band under the baton of Prof. Gunnar J. Malmin. Dr. S. C. Eastvold, president of the college, will preside over the exercises.

Seniors who will receive diplomas include 36 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts in Education and 44 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. 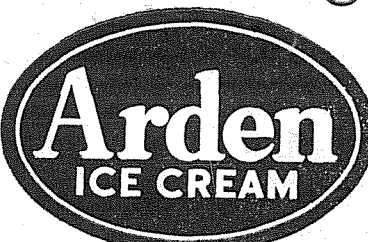

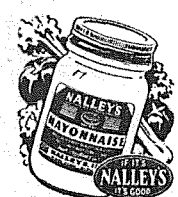

If your home caught on fire right now, would you know what telephone number to call to get your fire department? Don't cheat now — you couldn't quite remember it, could you?

And — this is just as important — do you know where you live — that is, could you give the proper address and directions to the fire department once you got them on the phone?

Maybe you know the answer to that one, but many people don't. Because of this many of the fire departments have received improper addresses in cases of fire and have thus been too late to save the home.

For this reason the H. M. and L. firemen are making a canvass of every resident in their district. They will find out such information as the number of persons in the home, the mailing address and the telephone number from which they will compile a three-way card index. In return the firemen will give you the correct location of your home so that they may find it easily in an emergency.

Your cooperation is needed in this program.

It sounds like a good idea for the other fire departments in this area, too.

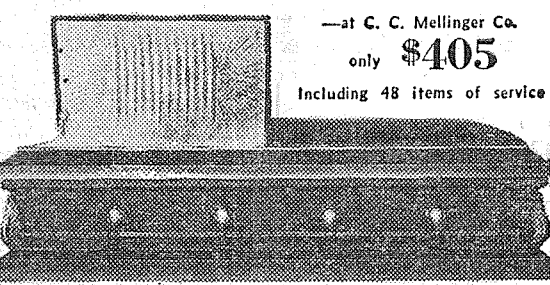

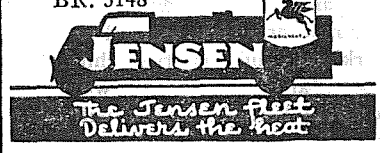
He is the son of Guy M. Myers. He enlisted for duty in Europe.
