South End's Golden Opportunity
 A chance for the entire South End to make a leap forward with seven league boots is now within its grasp. All that is necessary is for voters in the several school districts involved to approve a consolidated high school. This election will be held on Saturday, January 18, by call of County School Superintendent Olai Hageness. The one fact that a high school in this area would start with a student body of over 500 is certainly argument enough to prove the need of such an institution.

The election of January 18 will decide the question, "Shall the districts of Central Avenue, Collins, Midland and Parkland consolidate for the purpose of providing high school facilities?" For years our students of high school age have been attending Tacoma, Puyallup, Clover Park and Roy schools with the people of those districts standing the expense of providing buildings and equipment for our children.

With the arrival of war conditions, overcrowding of all the schools became a serious problem and the anticipated decline in school population as a result of termination of war activities has not taken place. Our school attendance over the area is larger now than it was a year ago. A study of the lower grades indicates a large pre-school population which can only mean that increasing numbers will be enrolled in our schools for a number of years to come. Then, too, we must consider the many new homes going up over the entire area.

The problem of providing facilities to relieve our overcrowded schools lies squarely on our shoulders.

Now that the war is over and the unusual employment opportunities are rapidly disappearing we can safely say that an even larger percent of our boys and girls will be completing their high school education. This number will be still larger if we do our duty and provide a high school in the area—conveniently located and with transportation provided for those living beyond a reasonable walking distance.

Consolidation throughout the states goes to show that the existing schools will continue to operate but upon a much sounder basis. The activities of the school would remain unchanged.

The question of financing the construction of a high school in this area must not be overlooked when considering the coming election. Other districts, Clover Park and Gig Harbor for example, have lived through it and are now rightly proud of their fine school systems. We have every right to expect the same state aid that they have received to help us in accomplishing our goal.

We owe it to our young people to provide equal opportunities for them. It is important that you and I vote.

Sitting Pretty

For quite a few years many rumors have gone the rounds regarding the building of a super highway between the north and south borders of the state with Seattle and Portland as chief junctions. Announcement of definite plans and routing of this roadway came recently and it places this area of Greater Tacoma in a strategic location.

Pacific Avenue from the business section of Tacoma to junction of the new road near the Roy Y is planned as the main feeder line and widening it to a four-lane highway from the city limits south this coming summer is scheduled.

An enormous flow of traffic will be carried by the avenue and business along the route will no doubt be even thicker than on South Tacoma Way which now carries the north-south highway traffic.

Keep your eyes focussed on this great South End section. It is due for a development that is almost beyond imagination.
