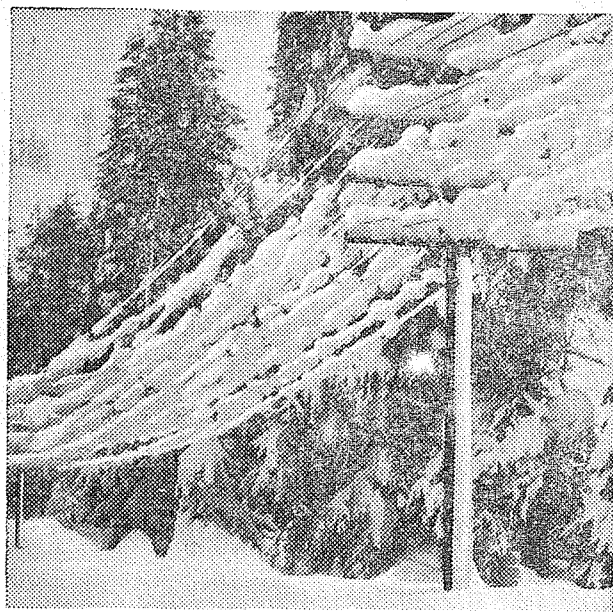


STORM

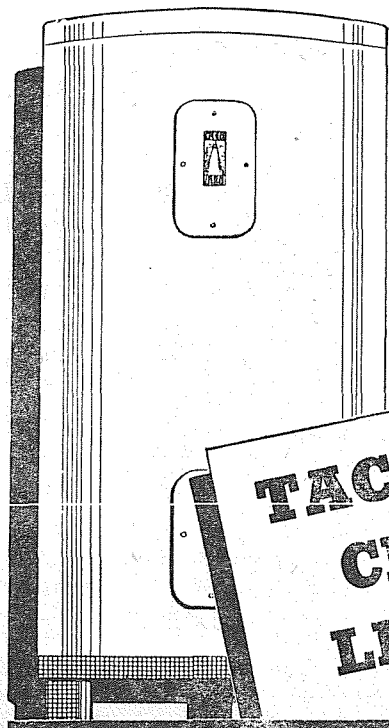

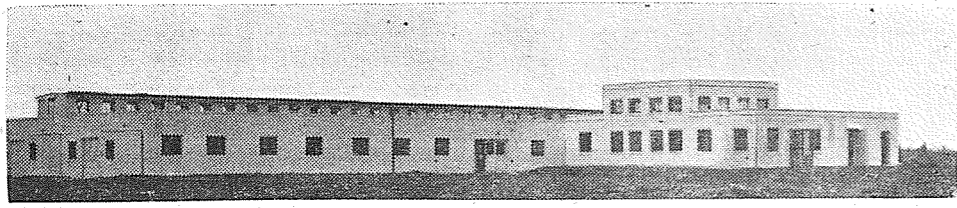
