What kind of a law is this? In last Saturday's school election the total vote was 701 "yes" and only 161 "no" for the proposed consolidated high school district, yet the proposition was defeated. Every district voted overwhelmingly in favor of the consolidation except Central Avenue. There the vote was 56 for and 90 against which killed the proposition in its entirety due to the wording of the present school consolidation law.

A little figuring with that Central Avenue vote will show that a swing of just 18 votes to the "yes" column would have meant approval. Therefore, it can be argued that a tiny group of 18 persons defeated the consolidation which otherwise was approved by the staggering proportion of seven

Those folks who voted against this much needed high school no doubt had good and sufficient reasons, but when the will of the majority is so overwhelmingly expressed in favor of a proposition such as happened in this election and still the plan goes down to defeat then it's high time we look to a change in the law.

Cold Stove

In last week's issue this purveyor of news stated that the fire in the Elk Plain school was believed to have been caused by an overheated stove. We have been notified by Alice Dorfner, our good Elk Plain correspondent, that such is not the case. She states that there had been no fire in the stove for several days prior of Sydney Selden who resigned to the disaster. We gladly publish this correction.





## STORM



Old Man Weather can be mighty tough on telephone lines in Washington, especially in the Cascades where snow often piles high enough to cover poles completely and ice builds up several inches thick on wires. But when a major break occurs, crews of telephone workers swing into action fast . . . and with some rather ingenious



Mountaineer workmen, experts on snowshoes and skis, are driven as close as possible to the break. Then they pack in the materials they need over the snow. As a special safeguard against sudden storms, well-stocked shelter huts have been built at regular intervals along mountain telephone lines.

Enough men rush to the job to keep repair work going without stop-in the meantime, calls are immediately rerouted whenever possible.
