New Rates For Air Parcel Post Released The new air parcel post service

which the post office department is inaugurating on September 1, should prove a boon to patrons of the Parkland post office, Acting Postmaster Elmer Beard said this week. According to instructions received in the local office, air parcel post must be accorded the same expeditious handling as all other air mail and will be dispatched with the First Class air mail. 
