## New Rates For Air Parcel Post Released

The new air parcel post service which the post office department is inaugurating on September 1, should prove a boon to patrons of the Parkland post office, Acting Postmaster Elmer Beard said this week. According to instructions received in the local office, air parcel post must be accorded the same expeditious handling as all other air mail and will be dispatched with the First Class air mail, Beard stated.

Rates for this new service are based on the same zones as regular parcel post with a weight limit of 70 pounds and the size not to exceed 100 inches in length and girth combined. Postage charges start at eight ounces. For example, a package weighing up to one pound, but not less than 8 ounces, will go by air anywhere in the first and second zone for 55c; zone 3, 60c; zone 4, 65c; zone 5, 70c; zone 6, 75c; zone 7, 75c; zone 8, 80c.

For each additional pound, the rate will be: Zones 1 and 2, 4c; zone 3, 8c; zone 4, 14c; zone 5, 24c; zone 6, 33c; zone 7, 45c; zone 8, 65c.

Employees at the Parkland post office will be glad to fully explain this new, fast service for parcel post to all those interested, Beard further stated.

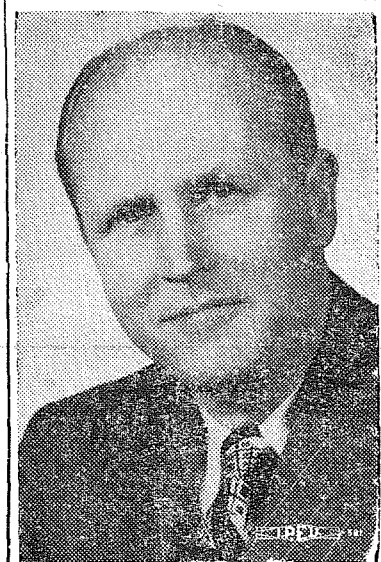

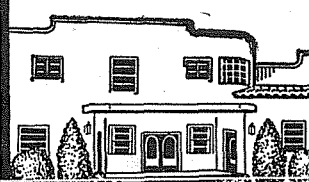

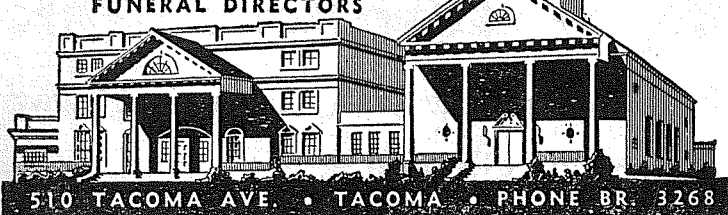
