Through the years since its existence, the Parkland PTA has worked hard for the betterment of schools but this year promises to be bigger and better than ever under their projects and social functions and the like.

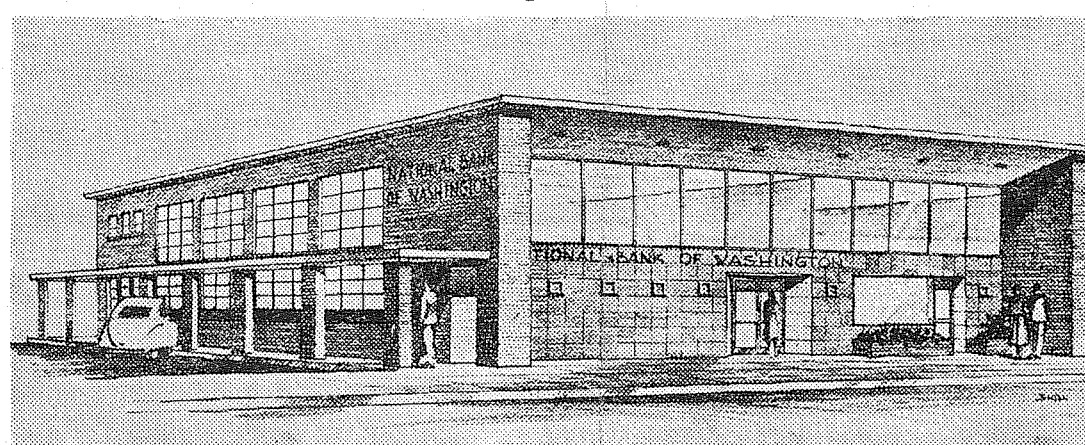

Possibility that the deplorable garbage disposal system in the Parkland and Spanaway districts would be cleaned up seemed imminent this week when the Spanaway Progressive Community Club received a letter from the Pierce County Health Department asking their aid in solving this problem.

Civic Club to Hear Incorporation Talk

Incorporation, a topic always of interest to residents in a small community, will be the topic of Dean Mullins, attorney for Gig Harbor, at the Parkland Community Club at 8 p.m. Sept. 9 in Parkland school.

Mullins will speak neither pro or con on the subject. Questions from the audience will be answered by Mullins both during and after the talk.

A meeting of the memorial committee of the community club was held recently with Ross Cory, Herb Socolofsky, Kenneth Jacobs and Morris Ford attending. Beautification of the memorial was discussed and Jacobs appointed supervisor of planting the lawn. Volunteers for the work of planting will be solicited. Other committees will be named at the meeting.

The garden clubs in this vicinity will have charge of planting shrubbery around the memorial, according to Cory, president of the Community Club.

The club has been working for improved sanitary conditions in the dump since its formation last year. Said the letter in part:

"I am sure the members of your Club are aware of the problems relating to garbage disposal within the Parkland, Spanaway and Lakewood districts.

"Your county commissioners and health department are interested in finding a permanent solution to this matter. Members of the Division of Sanitation have spent much time trying to locate suitable disposal areas in this district, but always we have run into opposition from the neighbors in the immediate vicinity of the proposed dump sites.

"We are wondering, therefore, if it would be possible for the community clubs in this area to appoint a joint committee, which would work with the Division of Sanitation in locating a suitable site for establishing a garbage disposal dump; one which could be set up and maintained in such a manner as to not (Continued on Page Four)

Parkland and Spanaway residents for some time have been worried over the problem of a sanitary dump in the South End. For a time there seemed little they could do about present dump conditions.

They have now had an offer from the County Health Department to meet with them to discuss relocating the dump in a position that will be satisfactory to residents of the community and will be easy to keep sanitary.

Whether this is a bona fide offer or campaign propaganda is hard to decide. At any rate the people in this community should get together with the health officials and have the situation cleaned up while the health department is willing to cooperate.

Back to Better Schools

"Let us hope that in the coming years even greater progress can be made in providing still better schools."

This was the wish expressed in an editorial in the Pointer this time last year and it is a wish that has been realized to a great extent during the past year, for this year South End students are going back to better schools.

Parkland students will soon have a new addition to their building which provides six new classrooms and much needed rest rooms.

A new library and playshed, converted from CCC camp buildings, will greet the Spanaway students this year. Clover Creek youngsters will soon have a new gymnasium.

It was during the past year also that one of the most progressive measures in education was taken—the voting of Midland, Parkland, Collins and Central Avenue to consolidate and to build a high school of their own for the children in these districts.

But before that consolidation is made official, Midland residents have a duty to their youngsters. That is to turn out in the special school election in Midland and Harvard, September 11, and vote for the 20-mill levy which will be used to complete the new Midland school.

The significance of this school election runs a risk of being overshadowed by the primary election which is to be held three days later. However, its importance should not be minimized. And remember, if enough voters fail to turn out, the election will be invalid.

Don't neglect your right to vote in the election September 11, and don't neglect your children's right to keep coming back to better schools.
