Norway may not have expected it, but it is now in the middle of its most exuberant laughing spasm in

years. Chuckles are echoing from one fjord to another, coinciding with the arrival of Prof. A. W. Ramstad of Parkland.

It's not that the popular professor himself is so uproariously funny; it's his wife at home who is providing the mirth.

You see, when Ramstad was packing for his European tour a fortnight ago, Mrs. Ramstad quietly filled one corner of a big suitcase with copies of "Anders", her recently published whimsical biography of her husband of the past 34 years.

The Ramstads have literally scads of relatives in Scandinavia, although they have never met most of them. A trip to his forefathers' stomping grounds has been a life-long ambition for Anders, better known as "Rammy" to a generation of students at P.L.C.

Although Mrs. Ramstad could not make the trip, she has the pleasure of knowing that her pocket-size book is causing quite a flurry in the land of lutefish. In fact, it is reported that many Norwegians are taking advantage of the summer midnight sun to finish reading the amusing volume.

Ever since the Ramstads were married in 1918, wife Emma has been convinced that incidents from her husband's life, particularly his boyhood, were worth publishing. "A. W." frequently delighted her with fascinating tales of his youth and the sock-knitting contraption he operated for folks in Goodhue County, Minn.

Gradually, Mrs. Ramstad started to jot down these humorous anecdotes and, last winter, compiled them into a 60-page booklet. Added features are cartoons by Harry Hoff, a former student in one of Ram's chemistry classes.

Easy Fish Croquettes

2 cups flaked fish, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup milk, 1/2 cup fine, dry cracker, 2 teaspoons grated onion, 1 cup fine, dry cracker or bread crumbs

Mix fish, 1/4 cup milk, onion, salt and pepper. Shape into 8 patties. Roll one at a time in crumbs. Dip in 1/2 cup milk. Roll again in crumbs. Brown on both sides in 1/2 inch of hot fat. Serve hot with chili sauce. Makes 4 servings.

OPEN HOUSE

Considered one of the most proficient fire stations in the Pacific Northwest is this new department building which was completed at McChord recently. On Wednesday, June 25, all personnel are invited to personally inspect the new installation. The new fire station has facilities for the housing of eight vehicles.

Open house of McChord's new fire station, considered one of the most proficient in the Pacific Northwest, will be held next Wednesday, at which time all personnel may personally inspect the new installation.

The new fire house which went into operation recently, will house eight fire fighting vehicles. All of the latest type facilities are available.

More than eleven years ago McChord's fire department was founded, at which time A. J. McCarthy became fire chief. And today, Chief McCarthy new heads a streamlined fire department in the new building.

Prior to the construction and operation in the new fire station, the local department was operating three stations—the old main station, housing five vehicles; the north station consisting of one piece of apparatus, and a station between hangs two and three with two trucks.

Eight vehicles can be housed in the new building. There also is one fire-fighting vehicle housed in the MATS area.

The main floor of the new fire station consists of eight truck stalls, a wash stall, a modern kitchen, a combination dining-day room, a sleeping quarters capable of sleeping 36 men, a modern shower room, chiefs' offices and a shop which can be utilized for first and second echelon repair.

On the second floor can be found rooms for a training section and class room procedure.

And atop the building, nearly 70 feet from the ground, overlooking the entire runway area is a look-out tower. From here the fireman on duty can spot a puff of smoke at any position on the runway, and with a touch of a button and complete inter-com facilities, is able to have a crash crew on the scene within a matter of seconds.

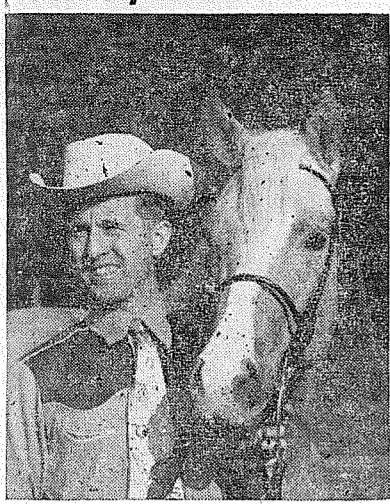

New Armed Forces Police Organized

A new collaborated military "John Law" has been instigated in the Seattle area, placing Air Force, Army and Navy policemen under a single command, WOJG Duane Stonewall, of McChord's Air Police Squadron, announced recently.

It is intended to increase the efficiency of military law enforcement. This new force, called Armed Forces Police, will pull duty in the Seattle area, but does not pertain to individual base or post patrol.

There are several other cities under which this type of patrol has been organized, including Washington, D. C., and San Francisco.

It is anticipated that in the near future distinctive uniforms will be worn by the Armed Forces Police that resemble no particular service. Therefore, a serviceman asking assistance of an Armed Forces Policeman will not know in what branch of service the military patrolman is enlisted.

At present, seven men of the 567th Air Police Squadron at McChord are assigned to duty with the Armed Forces Patrol at Seattle. The number of men from each service assigned to the new patrol is determined by proportion of the number of personnel of the various service branches stationed in this area.

Since the Navy dominates the Seattle area in number of personnel, the 13th Naval District is the operational head of the Armed Forces Police.

Ancient legend has it that upon entrance to either the Naval or Military Academy the plebe begins practicing

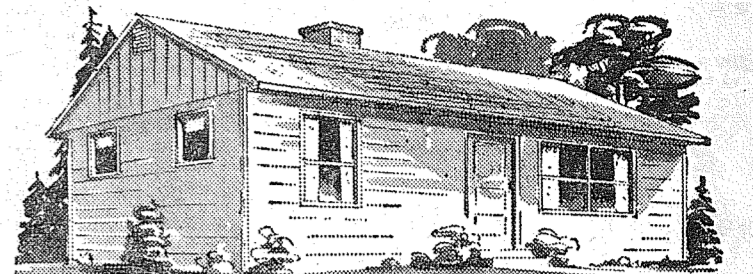
throwing his hat high into the air and retrieving it with accuracy. This he does for four years, throwing it higher and higher as he progresses toward graduation.
