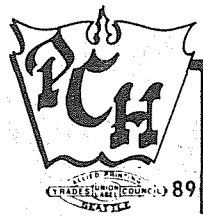
Since first publishing the announcement that the paper would only be delivered to subscribers, a number of people have inquired asking what changes will be made in the publication, Matson said.

In addition, students will find on-the-spot coverage of PLU and area high school sports a reading "must". The Times Journal will continue Walt Tupper's weekly report on Spanaway Speedway activities. information will be submitted by local correspondents, and printed under separate headings for Midland, Parkland, Spanaway - Elk Plain, Roy, Graham, and Eatonville.

A guest editorial column, submitted each week by readers, will give residents an opportunity to express their views on general interest subjects, Matson stated. "We have already started to receive contributions for this feature," he explained. Contributors are requested to keep their editorials within a 300 word limit.

Dr. W. Schnackenberg Named To FP Board

"I've been interested in schools for a long time and am looking forward to serving on the Franklin Pierce School Board," Dr. Walter Schnackenberg said of his recent appointment to fill a directorship vacated by the May resignation of Phyllis Erickson. Dr. Schnackenberg, chairman of PLU's History Dept., was named to fill the vacancy during the June school board

meeting. He has lived in the area since 1935 except for Naval service during World War II and advanced studies at Augustina College.

In appointing Dr. Schnackenberg to the board, Franklin Pierce directors stated his professional understanding of curriculum and school operation was an important factor. The new board member was selected from three candidates who were nominated for the position by members of the community.

"Any one of the candidates would have made a fine addition to the board," president Herb Gelman said. "The decision was a difficult one."

Dr. Schnackenberg holds a PHD in history and lives at 1210 South Wheeler.

Parkland Roundup Calendar Completed

The Parkland Roundup Week calendar was completed during a special meeting of the Roundup committee held at the home of Parkland Business Club vice president Harold Lloyd last week.

The committee set the time and date for princess judging, coronation ball, box lunch auction, button sales kick-off meeting, the rodeo dance, and the parade.

First elements of the 1967 parade will start marching down Pacific Avenue from South 96th Street at 10 a.m. July 29, according to parade chairman Bob Ketner. The parade will terminate at South 138th Street and Pacific Avenue, he stated.

Roundup queen candidates will be judged for poise and beauty during the July 19 Business Club meeting. Judges will observe the princesses riding ability starting 11 a.m. July 22 at the Parkland Roundup grounds.

Head Start Classes Get Off To Good Start

TACOMA - Representatives of many school districts in our area participated in an orientation-training workshop held on the PLU campus last week in preparation for the summer Head Start classes.

The School districts included Puyallup, Fife, Yelm, Orting and Tacoma - all of which will be holding Head Start classes through grants from the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The purpose of the four-day session at PLU was to explore some of the characteristics of the disadvantaged child in regard to his health, physical development, family relationships and his own self-image.

The 70 participants attended lectures taught by experts in health, education and welfare. Exposure to several professional areas, according to PLU Director of the School of Education Dr. Kenneth Johnston, was to prepare the trainees in helping children to develop their potential for emotional and physical growth.

The institute members were taught how to introduce the children into group activities

so that social relationships with their peers would improve. At the same time, the teachers were told how to establish a relationship of trust between themselves and the children.

Later in the week the participants learned how to plan their educational program, cope with problems, involve the children's parents in the program and make effective use of volunteers.

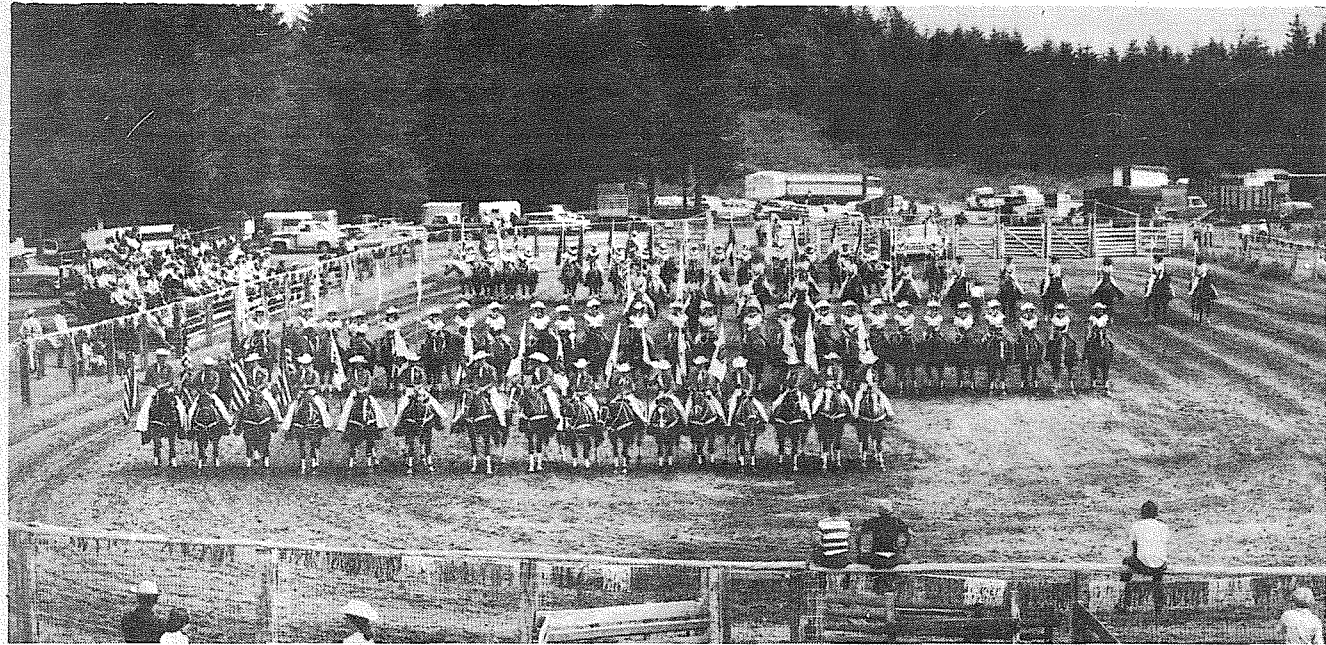

June Platoon Calls Women To Army Duty

Women between the ages of 17 and 34 who are high school graduates and are interested in enlisting for the Washington State June Platoon for the Women's Army Corps (WAC) should see Sgt. Donald K. Brown at the U.S. Army Recruiting Station, 106 W. Main St., Puyallup.

The formation of a June platoon is part of a movement to enlist 3,300 extra personnel in the WAC. The increase was recommended by the Burke-Marshall Report concerning the Armed Forces and approved by President Johnson.

The platoon will consist only of Washington women, who will take the oath of allegiance on June 28 and receive their basic training together at Ft. McClellan, Ala.

Sgt. Brown noted that enlistment now was "not only a chance for the young women of this state to participate in a satisfying experience, but a tremendous opportunity for them to learn about a career."

He said that after basic training, WACs are assured of attending the career school of their choice.

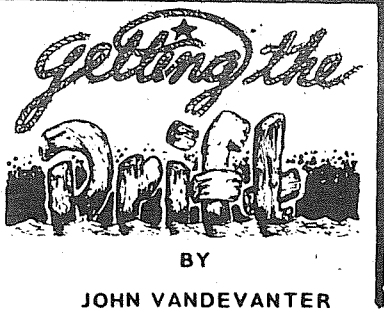
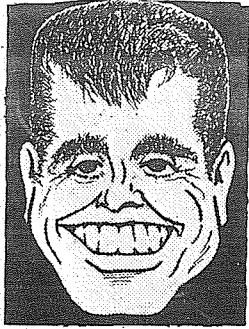

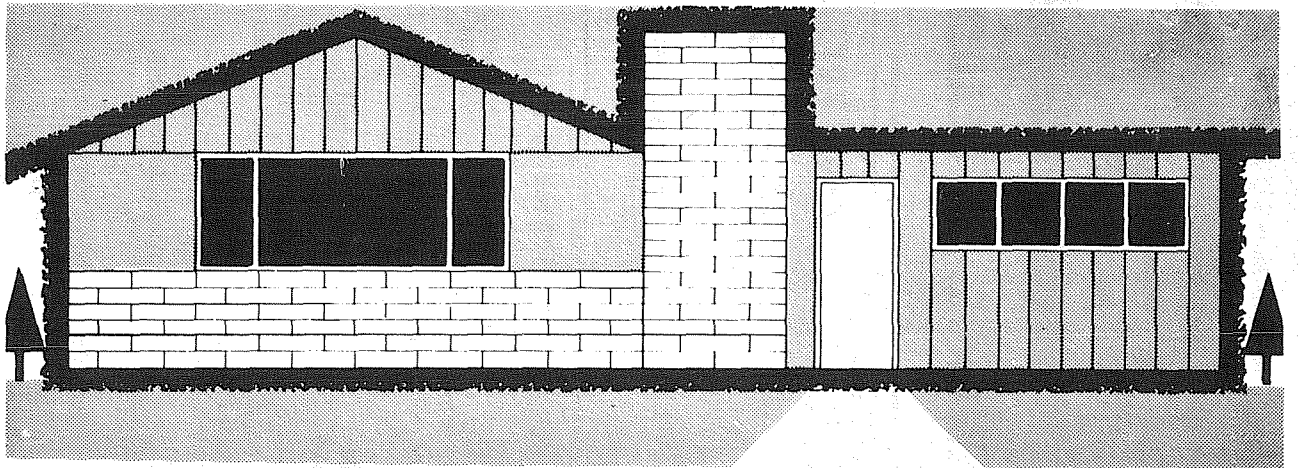
Ward, Fabiani Shine In All Star Tilts

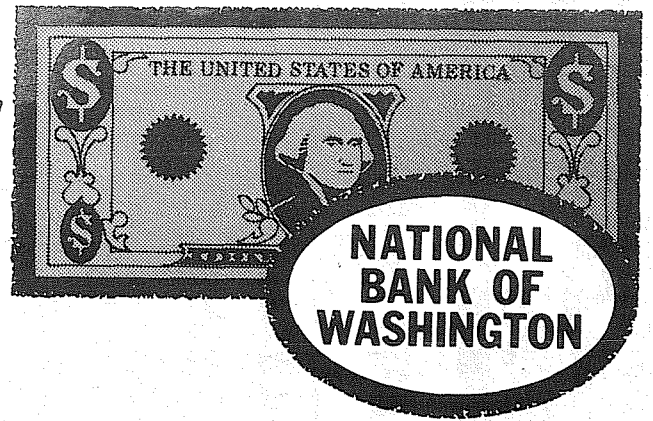

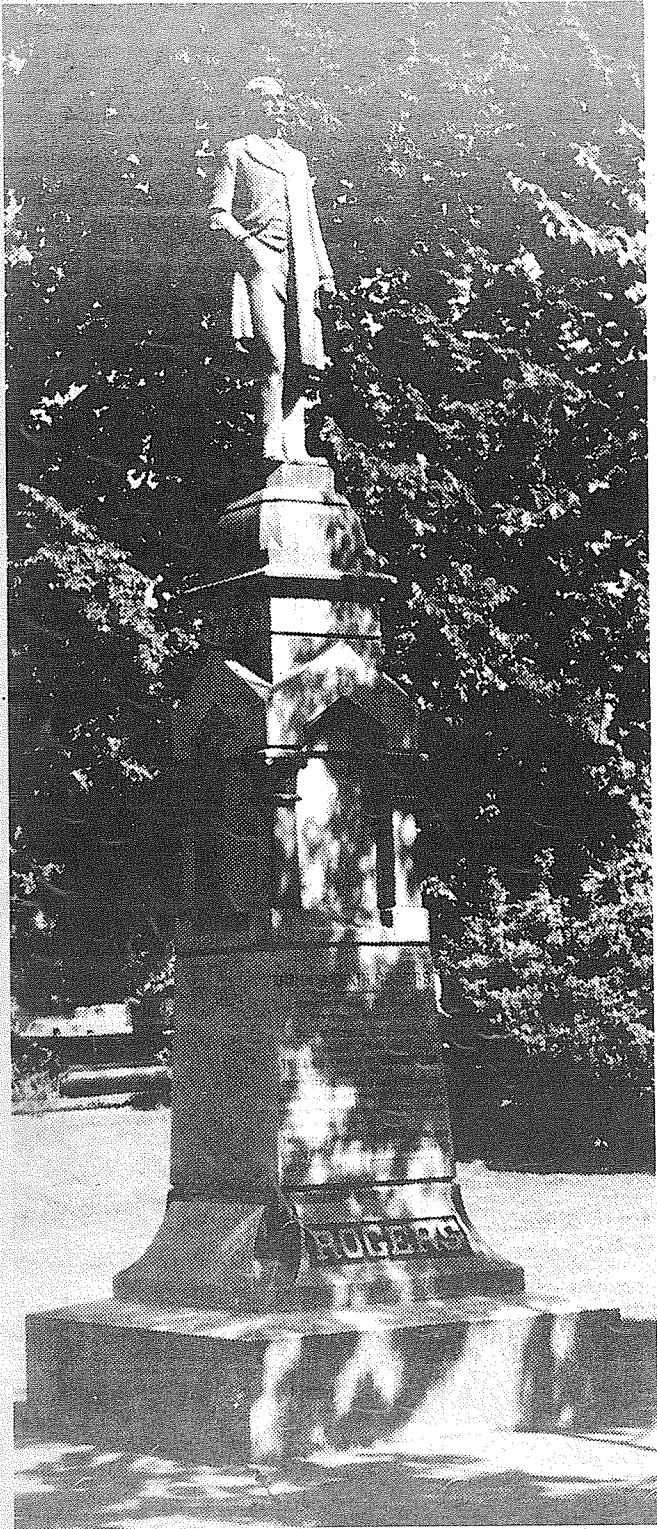

New High School To Carry Name Of John R. Rogers



PUYALLUP - Puyallup's new secondary school scheduled to open in the fall of 1968 was named Gov. John R. Rogers High School last week by school officials.

Gov. Rogers is Puyallup's only ex-governor and is father of the "Barefoot Schoolboy Law" which was unique in the field of education at the turn of the century. The "Law" provided that each district should receive yearly allotments for each child of school age living in the district from school funds.

The legislation introduced into American education a principle that was startlingly new and different, namely that it was the responsibility of the state itself to guarantee to every child a good elementary education regardless of the financial status of the child's family or community.

Up to now Puyallup's only notice of the Governor who served two terms beginning in 1896 has been his tombstone in Woodbine Cemetery. The legend on it, a quotation from one of his many pamphlets, reads "I would make it impossible for the covetous and the avaricious to utterly impoverish the poor. The rich can take care of themselves."

John R. Rogers was born in Brunswick Maine in 1838. He attended common schools in Brunswick and then went

to Boston and learned the pharmach business. He managed a drug store in Mississippi until the approach of the Civil War, when he became a farmer and school teacher in Cumberland, Illinois.

In 1876 he moved to Kansas where he was a farmer and was elected to several local offices and established and edited the Kansas Commoner. He came to the State in 1890, making his home here until he took up residence in the capital city.

His election came at a time when economic readjustment was the demand of the hour. The Republicans were being criticized for the deficiency judgment veto by Gov. McGraw. The free silver agitation was at its height, Times were hard and people were reaching out in all directions for relief.

During his first campaign he was denounced as a "dangerous radical and a firebrand of social revolution" stated Russell Blankenship 20 years ago in a publication "The Political Thought of John Rankin Rogers."

However continues Blankenship, "Rogers in his political philosophy was far from being a radical, as that word is usually employed. He was ultra - conservative, a positive reactionary."

He was an agrarian Democrat, accepting implicitly the

statement of human rights as set forth in the Declaration of Independence."

Before his election he had attracted much attention throughout the State by his writings. He was noted as a pamphleteer criticizing and being criticized.

Toward the end of the first year of his second administration, the Valley's only governor died December 26, 1901 after suffering for a week with an attack of pneumonia.

Final plans for the new school have been completed Tacoma architect Arthur Forbes told the school board and a call for bids will be issued as soon as the plans gain necessary state approval.

Board clerk Marion Catron said the contract will probably call for completion within 365 days.

The new school will be a campus-style facility of four or five buildings and will be capable of housing about 1,250 students.

At this time school officials approved the naming of the new secondary school scheduled to open in the fall of 1968 Gov. John R. Rogers High School. A Spokane high school is also named after Gov. Rogers as is an elementary school in Tacoma.

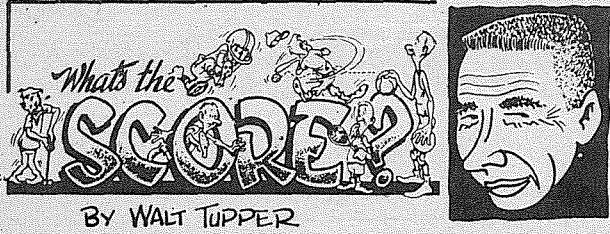

Game Commission To Meet At PLU

OLYMPIA - The Washington State Game Commission will meet Monday at 1 p.m. at Pacific Lutheran University.

All Game Commission meetings are open to the public, points out Chairman James Ralls of Wilson Creek, and interested individuals or representatives of groups are invited.

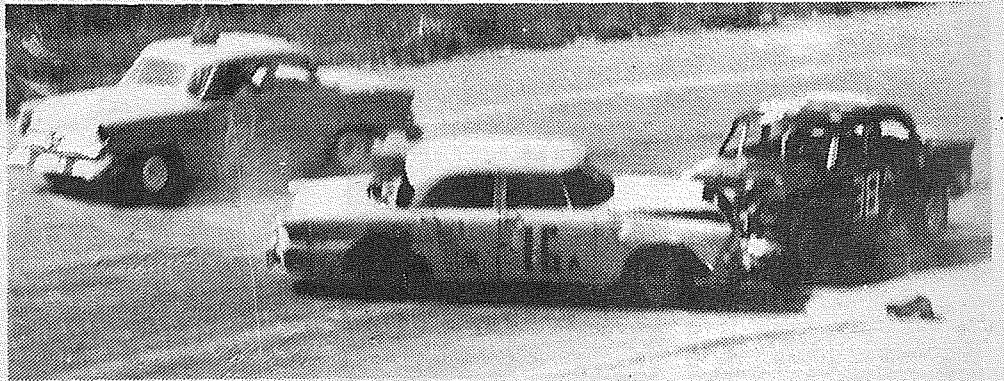
Major item on the meeting agenda is 1967 lake rehabilitation. The Washington Game Department will propose, to the Commission, rehabilitation of 34 lakes, nearly all of which have been so treated before.

Each of the waters proposed has been investigated by biologists and found to be falling off in recent years' fish production. In most cases, reduced production has been caused by overabundant populations of less desirable fish -- stunted sunfish and perch, stickleback, bullheads, and carp.

Only the lake proposed in Chelan County and several in Grant County, have not been rehabilitated at some time in the past. Most of the Grant County waters are located on the Quincy Game Range.

Lake rehabilitation has long been successfully used in Washington State as a tool to increase game fish production through lessening of competition from undersized or undesirable fish species.

Lakes proposed for rehabilitation in late summer or fall of 1967 are: Chelan County - Shaeffer; Franklin County - Dalton, Clark, Mesa; Grant County - Castle, Coffin, Dot, Martha, Crater, H, Quincy; King County - Ames, 5-mile, Green, Morton; Kitsap County - Horseshoe; Kittitas County - several highway gravel pit areas; Okanogan County - Beaver, Little Beaver, Beth, Copper, Green; Pierce County - Bay; Skagit County - McMurray; Snohomish County - Devils, Howard; Spokane County - Silver, North Silver, Medical; Stevens County - Black, Little Twin, Starvation; Thurston County - Clear

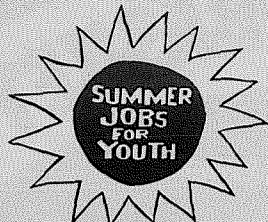

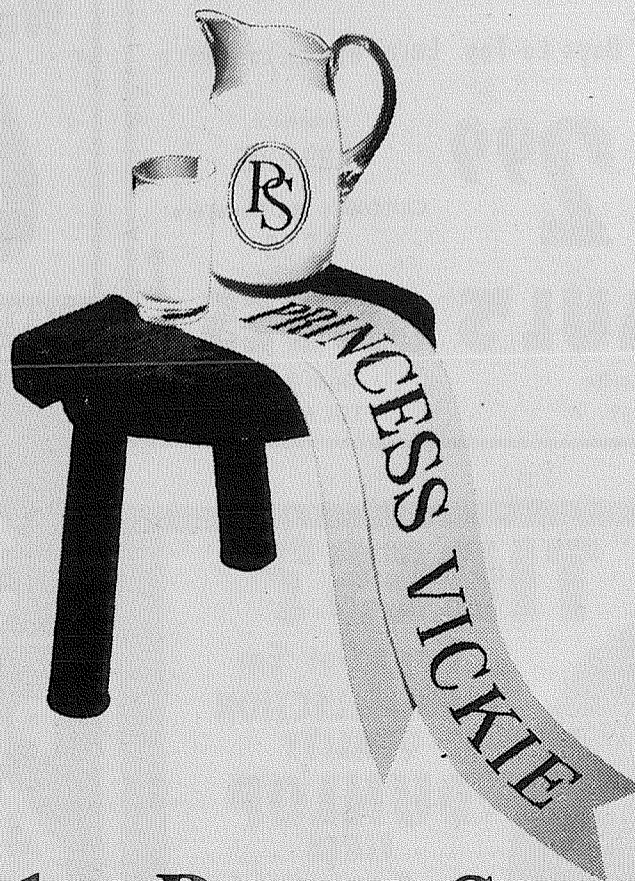
