New High School To Carry ame Of John R. Rogers



FOLLOWING THE DEATH of former Governor John R. Rogers on December 26, 1901, school children of the State with their pennies and dimes raised a fund to erect this statue of the Governor in Olympia. Close as Puyallup is to its historic traditions, it has had neither stick nor path dedicated to one of its most noted pioneers and its only Washington State Governor until last week. new secondary school scheduled to open in the fall of 1968 was named Gov. John R. Rogers High School last week by school officials.

Gov. Rogers is Puyallup's only ex-governor and is fath-er of the "Barefoot Schoolboy Law" which was unique in the field of education at the turn of the century. The "Law" provided that each district should receive yearly allot-ments for each child of school age living in the district from school funds.

The legislation introduced into American education a principle that was startingly new and different, namely that it was the responsibility of the state itself to guarantee to every child a good elementary education regardless of the financial status of the

child's family or community.
Up to now Puyallup's only notice of the Governor who served two terms beginning in 1896 has been his tombstone in Woodbine Cemetery. The legend on it, a quotation from one of his many pamphlets, reads "I would make it impossible for the covetous and the avaricious to utterly impoverish the poor. The rich can take care of them-

John R. Rogers was born in Brunswick Maine in 1838. He attended common schools in Brunswick and then went to Boston and learned the pharmach business. He managed a drug store in Mississippi until the approach of the Civil War, when he became a farmer and school teacher in Cumberland, Illinois.

In 1876 he moved to Kansas where he was a farmer and was elected to several local offices and established and edited the Kansas Commoner. He came to the State in 1890, making his home here until he took up residence in the capital city.

His election came at a time when economic readjustment was the demand of the hour. The Republicans were being criticized for the deficiency judgment veto by Gov. Mc-Graw. The free silver agitation was at its height. Times were hard and people were reaching out in all directions

for relief.

During his first campaign he was denounced as a "dangerous radical and a firebrand of social revolution! stated Russell Blankenship 20 years ago in a publication! The Pol-

ago in a publication. The Political Thought of John Rankin Rogers."

Thowever continues Blankenship, "Rogers in his political philosophy was far from being a relied. being a radical, as that word is usually employed. He was ultra - conservative, a positive reactionary.

He was an agrarian Democrat, accepting implicity the statement of human rights as set forth in the Declaration of Independence."

Before his election he had attracted much attention thruout the State by his writings, He was noted as a pamphleteer criticizing and being criticized.

Toward the end of the first year of his second administration, the Valley's only governor died December 26, 1901 after suffering for a week with an attack of pneumonia.



Lake Planting Topic

Game Commission To Meet At PLU

OLYMPIA - The Washington State Game Commission will meet Monday at 1 p.m. at Pacific Lutheran University.

All Game Commission meetings are open to the public, points out Chairman Ja-mes Ralls of Wilson Creek, and interested individuals or representatives of groups are invited.

Major item on the meeting agenda is 1967 lake rehabilitation. The Washington Game Department will propose, to the Commission, rehabilitation of 34 lakes, nearly all of which have been so treated before.

Each of the waters proposed has been investigated by biologists and found to be falling off in recent years' fish production. In most cases, reduced production has been caused by overabundant populations of less desirable fish -- stunted sunfish and perch, stickleback, bullheads, and carp.

Only the lake proposed in Chelan County and several in Grant Conty, have not been rehabilitated at some time in the past. Most of the Grant County waters are located on

the Quincy Game Range.

Lake rehabilitation has long been successfully used in Washington State as a tool to increase game fish production through lessening of com-petition from undersized or undesirable fish species.

Lakes proposed for rehabilitation in late summer or fall of 1967 are: Chelan County -Shaeffer; Franklin County -Dalton, Clark, Mesa; Grant County - Castle, Coffin, Dot, Martha, Crater, H. Quincy; King County - Ames, 5-mile, Green, Morton; Kitsap County - Horseshoe; Kittitas County - several highway gravel pit areas; Okanogan County - Beaver, Little Beaver, Beth, Copper, Green; Pierce County - Bay; Skagit County - Mc-Murray; Snohomish County -Devils, Howard; Spokane County - Silver, North Silver, Medical; Stevens County -Black, Little Twin, Starvation; Thurston County - Clear






