THOUGHTS FOR THANKSGIVING DAY

The first recorded Thanksgiving was the Hebrew Feast of the Tabernacles. The New England Thanksgiving dates from 1633, when the Massachusetts Bay Colony set apart a day for thanksgiving. The first national Thanksgiving proclamation was by Congress during the Revolutionary War. The first great American Thanksgiving Day was in 1784, the Declaration of Independence. There was one more national Thanksgiving in 1789, and no other until 1863, when President Lincoln issued a National Proclamation for a day of thanksgiving. Since that time the president has issued an annual proclamation. Let us glean some of the uncounted blessings which we have as individuals, American, and Christians.

1. Thanksgiving Doubles Blessings

Our blessings are multitudinous, but the best blessing of all is a heart that receives with gratitude. It magnifies our little things until we fail to wish for the great things of others. Such an acme of life is within the reach of every lowly heart that will trust Christ fully. A certain man, of blessed memory, said he liked to look into the store windows to see how many things

he could do without! A thankful heart doubles blessings, causing us to enjoy them twice—in fruition and in remembrance. This thanksgiving season is a good time to make the change from "kicking" to chiming.

2. Thanksgiving Grace

Let us remember the homes that were founded by the folks who laid the foundation for America. A tremendous percentage of them never sat down to eat before they asked God to bless them and they never left the table until they thanked God for what they had received. May I ask the hundreds of people who read these lines to take a look at their homes to see what has happened to the Family Altar.

3. Thanksgiving Is A Social Duty

Thanksgiving is as much a Bible command as honesty, though few people think of it in that way. It is easy to see that it is wrong to go into the neighbor's house to steal his purse, but yet many do not hesitate to go, time after time, to rob him of courage and hopefulness. People who insist upon cherishing depressing moods and doleful views have no right to wander about spreading infection. They should be quarantined until they can show a certificate of a thankful spirit. To spread gloomy views or to fail in gratitude to God for His unnumbered and always undeserved blessings is also a sin. Let us praise God more than men may doubt Him less.

4. Thanksgiving, Great Feast

Thanksgiving is a family day in America. Pick up your Bible and read about the great Thanksgiving Feast that was held in the record made in Saint Luke's gospel chapter fifteen. Let not our Thanksgiving at home be as selfish as the old rhyme puts it: "Bless me and my wife, my son, John, and his wife; us four, and no more." Nevertheless, how seldom do any of us get much beyond mere selfish intercessions. It seems that today the prayers of Americans should be chiefly thanksgiving, God has so abundantly blessed us. The fragrant flower of thanksgiving which blossoms in the heart of God's people is the result of a little bud called praise which is firmly affixed to the stem and stock of Christian faith. The psalms, which are the music rooms of the Bible, are filled with songs of praise.

5. Thanksgiving, Forgotten

We Americans, in contrast with people I have seen this summer in seventeen countries, have so much of the abundance of God's benefits that we are liable to forget the Giver in our satisfaction over the gifts. A fire may die from excess of fuel as well as from lack of it. A fire may be killed, not from lack, but from excess of fuel. When the multitude of life's good things make us forget the Giver, Thanksgiving day comes along to remind us that the soul must not be stifled under the load. How is it with our

gratitude? Is the glow gone? Has the abundance of God's goodness to us made us careless? Let us push the iron of this Thanksgiving thought home and break up crusts of indifference that our soul may break forth into flame. "Bless the Lord, oh my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

6. Thanksgiving, Due to God

Depression is as paralyzing, deadly and infectious as any epidemic. Blessed are the calm spirits that go on trusting in God. At this thanksgiving season, let us take a new start in remembering God's mercies—in remembering His faithfulness, His grace, His goodness. That will prove a royal cure for depression, a sure method of defeating the evil one. Most of us are better off in most ways than ninety-eight percent of all other people. That fact, alone, ought to make us grateful and contented. But the grateful and contented belong to the less favored ninety-eight percent. The two percent are the grumblers and the self-pitying.

Gratitude is a grace that struggles for expression. It does not shut itself up in the heart. It does not allow itself to be merely felt. It wants to speak. It wants to say something. The writer of the one hundred and seventh psalm exclaims, "Let the redeemed of the Lord say so." If Thanksgiving Day means anything it means that we say to God, "Our blessings are from Thee, and unto Thee do we now return thanks."

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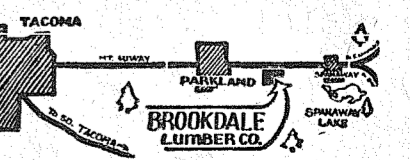

Lt. A. Salmon and wife (Phyllis

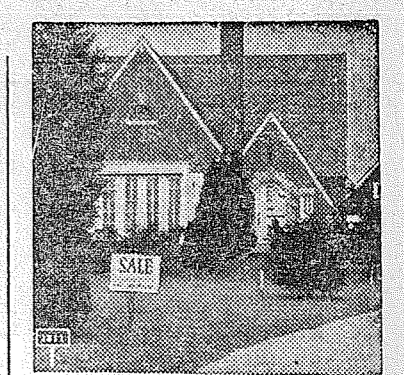

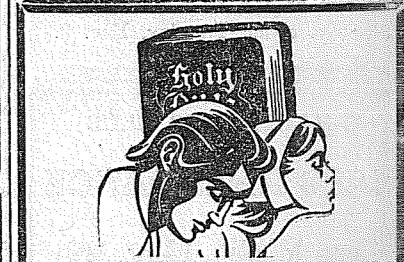

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Easy Fruit Cake

4 dozen 2-inch vanilla wafers, broken into pieces
1/2 cup Pec Milk
1 Tablespoon flour
1 cup pitted dates, cut in small pieces
1 cup seedless raisins
1 cup broken nuts

2 well-beaten eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
1/4 teaspoon salt

Put wafers and milk into a 2-quart bowl. Let soak until wafers are soft. Mix the flour, dates, raisins and nuts. Beat together the eggs, sugar, cinnamon, nutmeg, allspice and salt. Add to softened wafers. Mix well. Mix in flour and fruit mixture thoroughly. Put into a greased tube or loaf pan (see note) holding about 5 cups. Bake on oven rack slightly below center in moderately slow oven (350) about 1 hour, or until cake pulls from sides of pan and is firm to the touch. Let stand in pan 5 minutes before turning out to cool. Makes a 2 1/4-lb. cake.

Note: If loaf pan is used, bake cake 1 hour and 15 minutes.

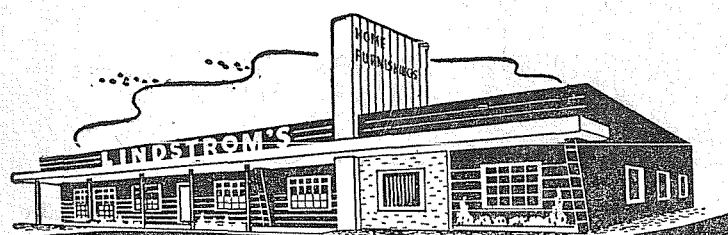

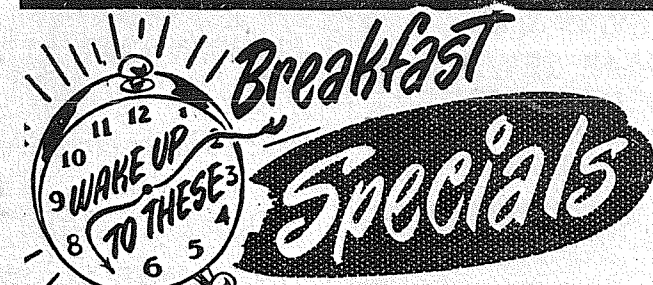
