

Easter

Longfellow once said, "The annual miracle of spring is a symbol of the resurrection of mankind." Every bursting leaf from the winter of death is a yearly miracle. The creeping caterpillar, the cocoon swinging on the bare tree branch thru the winter, then the beautiful butterfly winging across the meadow is prophetic of man's resurrection from the grave.

The death and resurrection of Jesus is a simple story. His enemies did the cause He espoused a great favor when they took such precautions to seal His death. His death is a certainty. Then the broken seal on the grave, the stone rolled away, the empty tomb, the terrified soldiers, the shining seraphs, the fearful disciples, the witness of the women, and the sight of him by 500 people at one time, all join to seal the fact of His resurrection.

Christianity is the story of historic facts which have happened. The facts are established by Paul's writings within twenty-five years of all the happenings. No misrepresentations have been proven by his contemporary antagonists. Note the witness of the disciples of Jesus: the tone of sincerity, the accent of conviction, the child-like simplicity of their testimonies. There is no sign of morbid imagination nor of wishful thinking.

Jesus was buried a stone's throw from the city of Jerusalem. Why didn't the rulers put an end to the pestilent story of the resurrection? If the enemies stole the body, why did they not produce it to stop the story? If His friends stole the body from the grave, why did they go forth to die for the truth of it after 70 years? There is no deficiency in the facts and proofs, but rather in the bias of those who are determined to doubt the greatest fact in all history.

The resurrection of Jesus establishes the truth of the supernatural, teaches that life is not tied to this present body, that death is a long sleep, and brings to the fore that the Scriptural teaching about life beyond the grave is a proven certainty. In short, the resurrection of Easter morning establishes the work and claims of Jesus Christ as God.

Sgt. Bob McCormick of Parkland has just returned from two years' service overseas. Bob is very happy to be back, and he and his wife plan to build a home soon.

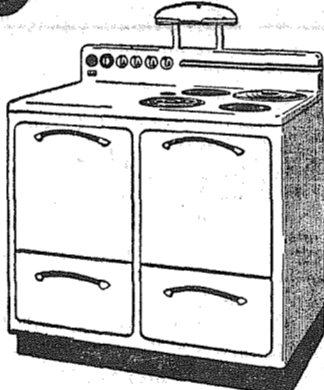
SON-IN-LAW JOINS SELLE AUTOMOTIVE FIRM

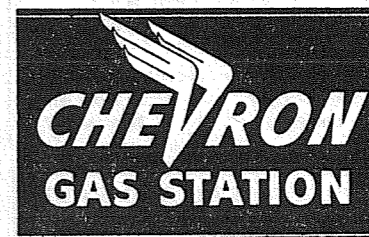

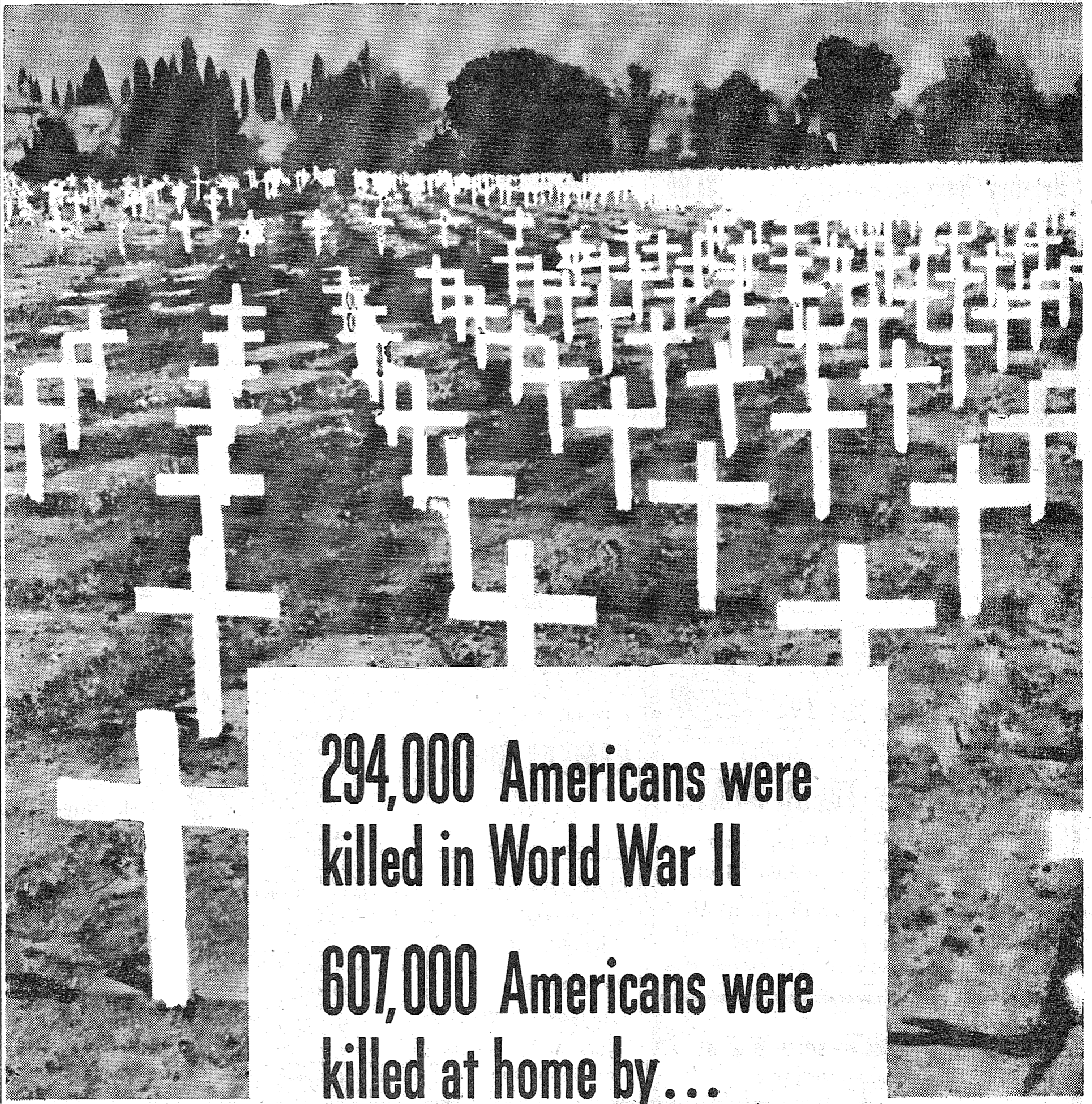

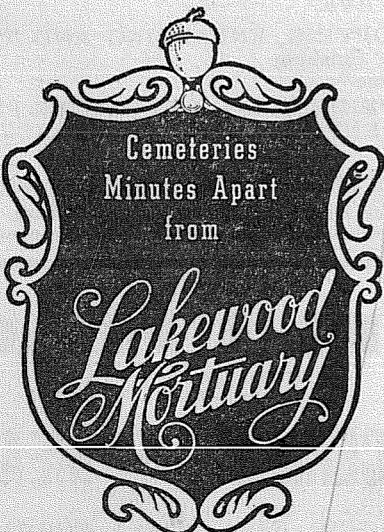
