Registration Rules Set For Schools

Puyallup Public Schools will open Wednesday, September 6, 1950 at 9 a. m. The Puyallup teachers will attend a half-day session of the Puyallup Institute in Puyallup starting at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 5. On the same day they will have lunch together at the P.H.S. cafeteria and attend their own building meetings in the afternoon.

Registration in the high school, Maplewood, Meeker, J. P. Stewart, and Frank R. Spinning the buildings will be open all day. At the Firgrove and Waller Rd. Schools the buildings will be open in the afternoon only. All

building principals will be at their buildings according to the above schedules.

Registration is necessary for all kindergarten students, first graders who did not attend kindergarten last year, all new pupils, and all change of address students. First grade students who attended kindergarten in this city last year will not need to register. The age requirement for kindergarten students to register and for first grade students to register should be studied carefully. Any students who wish to register for kindergarten this year must be five by November 30. Any students who expect to register for the first grade this year must be six by December 31.

It will probably be well to mention again at this time the new regulations in the Puyallup Public Schools pertaining to all first grade students. All students who expect to attend the first grade in the Puyallup Public Schools must have a physical examination before they will be allowed to enter. These physical examinations will be provided by any Puyallup doctor in the office of the doctor according to the choice of the particular person. The Puyallup Public Schools are very grateful to the doctors of Puyallup for rendering this service. This will eliminate the use of school time after school has started for medical examinations. The term Puyallup Public Schools in relation to this first grade requirement for physical examinations refers to the Firgrove and Waller Road Schools as well as the four elementary buildings that have been in the Puyallup district in the past. All of the Puyallup doctors have a card which they will issue to each parent for each first grade child, after the physical examination. The doctors have these cards in their offices. It will be necessary for each parent to bring this card with the student as the child enters the first grade. If there are patrons who would prefer to have their children examined by Tacoma doctors instead of Puyallup doctors, they should be sure to get a card to be filled out by the doctor which can be brought with them at the time the child enters the first grade. These cards may be obtained in the Superintendent's office at any time. These cards will also be available at each one of the elementary buildings including Waller Road and Firgrove during the hours that these buildings are open for registration.

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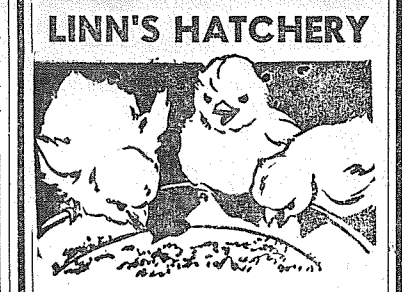

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Steele Ended Bird's Years Of Carnage
Pierce County Prosecutor Recalls Sensational Murder Trial

TACOMA, WASH.—Jake Bird had been in and out of penitentiaries for twenty-five years. During this period he had committed nine confirmed murders. Yet, on the night of October 30, 1947, he was still free to commit other murders, and on that night he entered a Tacoma home and hacked two women to death. Why hadn't this terrible menace been removed from society years ago? Patrick M. Steele, the Pierce County Prosecutor who finally put an end to Bird's quarter-century of lawlessness, revealed some interesting side-lights on the Bird Case.

"Bird was not an ignorant, untutored negro," Steele said. "He was smarter than half the criminal lawyers in the State of Washington. Jake had been in so many escapades with the law that he had picked up a practical degree. As a matter of fact, this wily Negro 'fired' four lawyers during the course of his many appeals and refused the services of others.

"In 1928, at Carter Lake, Iowa, he stood over a bed and was hacking a man to death when his wife woke up. He took two swings at her, practically knocking one eye out of its socket. The brave woman, through constant pleading, finally talked him out of his murderous attempts. Bird was later apprehended. Despite the evidence against him, despite the fact that three axe murders had been committed in nearby Omaha on the three previous nights, Jake Bird almost went free. A colored society raised funds to finance his defense by selling pencils. Witnesses testified falsely as to his whereabouts on the night of the crime. Bird got off with a thirty-year sentence, but was out again in twelve years.

"Although the press, through garbled and inaccurate versions, had the public believing that I was attempting to make a 'deal' to give this vile eleven-time murderer a life sentence, my object from start to finish was to see that Jake Bird paid the final penalty. It took only thirty minutes for the jury to reach the verdict of guilty, which demonstrates the effectiveness of the case I had prepared against him.

"Some people were of the opinion that I was trying to soften the penalty when Jake Bird was still alive eighteen months after the trial. As I mentioned before, Bird was a smart convict. Our system of law provides many safeguards to assure that only the guilty are punished. These safeguards were as available to Bird as to any other citizen, and Bird, through his exceptional knowledge of criminal law, was able to take advantage of every legal maneuver. The fact that every move of Bird's met with failure attested to the thoroughness which marked his prosecution. No lawyer, no prosecuting attorney in the country could have hurried the death penalty. Three execution dates were stayed—first by Governor Walgren, then by two appellate courts.

"When Judge Rosellini signed a death warrant for the third and last time he said, 'Many persons not familiar with the legal workings of this case have been critical of its long delay. This has been to enable you to have every recourse to law.'

"Jake Bird was hanged at Walla Walla on July 15th, 1949. For eighteen months I had fought against every reprieve and every legal move that Bird had made. My object had been, from start to finish, to see that Jake Bird would never murder another innocent person. The object was accomplished."

Malcom's Meats To Open New Store

Sheriff Lee Croft Makes Statement issued recently by the campaign office of Sheriff Lee Croft in officially announcing his candidacy for re-election on the Democratic ticket.

Lee Croft, one of the best known and most highly respected law enforcement officers in the West, will be a candidate to succeed himself as sheriff. He has filed for the primary election, September 12.

Sheriff Croft's platform in his bid for re-election is the basic record that has guided him through the active and vigorous 67 years since he was born on a prairie homestead in Lewis County.

It is: "Integrity in public office, integrity in all business relations and integrity in all personal affairs."

Those who know Lee Croft as a man, a citizen, a business leader, a civic worker, a union card holder, and a public official will testify that this platform has been the keynote of a useful and productive life.

This strong sense of devotion to the right things of life has won Sheriff Croft a personal following such as no other public official of Pierce County has ever earned.

Lee Croft has been a good sheriff, and more.

He has established a sheriff's office that has been entirely free of disruption, the usual accusations of graft and corruption have never been heard because of the high level of operation and the public records will show that several of his opponents in this election, at times when they were not candidates and could speak without political purpose, have praised him as the best sheriff in the history of Pierce County.

Lee Croft has not limited his usefulness to the operation of the sheriff's office. In addition to his regular office hours, he has spent as much or more time in activities, group and individual, designed to make Pierce County a better place in which to live.

He has given unstintingly of his time for the Tacoma Boys' Club and has raised thousands of dollars by sponsoring various activities in its behalf. His welfare work among Tacoma fraternal and civic organizations is well known to members, but Croft is not one to seek personal glory because of his accomplishments. While others have stopped to grab the spotlight, Lee Croft has been too busy helping others to pause in his busy life.

Although several of his opponents are on record as to the outstanding accomplishments of the sheriff's office under Lee Croft, he, himself, is not entirely satisfied, although he realizes that there has been a tremendous improvement since he took office.

More men are needed to handle the policing problems of rapidly growing Pierce County and since there are now about 100,000 outside of incorporated cities, Croft believes that he will be granted funds to get the additional help needed.

"My men are willing to work overtime and are on call 24 hours a day," Croft declared, "but it is too much to ask that they give metropolitan police service with only one-sixth as many men on a population basis as the Tacoma police when we have thirty times as much area to cover."

Confident that the new census figures will convince those who

hold the purse strings at the courthouse that more men are needed for outside patrol duty, Sheriff Croft has asked Capt. Larry Amundsen of the Tacoma Police Department to join the sheriff's office in an important capacity when he retires. Capt. Amundsen, who has a coastwide reputation, has accepted.

"I have asked Capt. Amundsen to delay coming to the sheriff's office because I do not want it to appear in any way that the appointment is political," Croft said. "I don't know Capt. Amundsen's politics and I don't care. All I know is that he has an outstanding record as a peace officer and that's the only kind of men we want on the Pierce County sheriff's force."

Sheriff Croft added that the growth of the county makes it imperative to replace the 60-year old jail which is antiquated. He is a strong advocate of a new city-county building and believes one should be built as soon as possible, defense requirements given first priority.

Lee Croft has become widely known as an ambassador of good will for Tacoma, Pierce County, and the whole Northwest country. While attending the Shrine convention in Los Angeles recently, he was called upon by Eugene Riscailus, the famed sheriff of Los Angeles County.

"I called to congratulate you on the wonderful cooperation your office in Tacoma gives the Los Angeles County sheriff's office," Riscailus told Croft. "I say no sheriff's office in the country gives us better co-operation and we appreciate it because it makes a big difference."

Under Sheriff Croft, Pierce County, outside of incorporated areas, has had no underworld

districts, there is a complete absence of organized vice and the crime rate is exceptionally low.

"One reason for this," Croft said proudly, "is that the people of Pierce County are among the finest in the country. Vice has a hard job gaining a foothold when the people don't want it."

Sheriff Croft added: "I know most of my opponents personally and regard them as friends. As is my policy, I will say nothing bad about them. They are showing good citizenship in offering themselves for public office and I am sure Pierce County will benefit by what we learn in this campaign."

(Our State Representative, Reuben A. Knoblauch, chairman of the Legislative Interim Committee on State Institutions, reports on his committee's visit to the Northern State hospital at Sedro-Woolley.)

Sedro-Woolley is located north of Everett and is surrounded by beautiful dairies and farms. This was my first time in this territory and it made the trip much more interesting.

The Northern State Hospital, which is a mental hospital, is a great deal like the institution out at Steilacoom. In fact, both places are terribly over-crowded and both have about the same population. At the present time there are 2210 patients in this hospital. In charge is Dr. Charles H. Jones, who at 31, is the youngest

superintendent of any state institution in the nation. I had met Dr. Jones during the 1949 session, when he came to Olympia with Dr. Keller of Western State, to testify before my committee. Dr. Jones is really enthused about his work and took great pride in his institution when he escorted us on a tour of the ground thru the buildings.

You'll be surprised to learn there are more than 1,000 acres in the Northern State Hospital grounds. Over 40% of the food used is grown at NSH. Last year the farm superintendent figured that they had raised over 102,000 pounds of vegetables and fruits. One of our committee members, Sen. Tom Hall, of Skamokawa, is a dairyman, and of course he particularly enjoyed our stop at the cow-barns. There are 250 cattle in the herd, with 75 being milked at the present time. The milk room was in clean condition, we were told that the machinery was antique and that the State Dept. of Health would have condemned this shed years ago had it not been a part of a state institution. Those of you who have cows know how strict the laws are. Over 211,000 pounds of hay was grown last year to take care of the herd. A new barn is on the "must" list and has been for a good many years.

Our next stop was at the power house and the boiler rooms. Over four years ago the boilers were checked and condemned, some patching was done and they managed to get by. A new boiler system is also a "must."

I've inspected many of our 13 institutions in the past few years and the visit to NSH brought to my attention some of the saddest conditions that I've found on any of these trips. I was surprised to see the set-up that was being used for the water system. As the result of a flash flood in 1945 the old water system was washed out and it became necessary to drill wells which have worked out unsatisfactorily. Due to chemicals in the water and a sediment which has a very deteriorating effect on the boilers and pipes, and a problem in the laundry, the water supply is a constant worry to Dr. Jones and his staff. The water pressure is so low that when a fire hydrant was turned on the water hardly made a good spout. I couldn't help but think what would happen if a serious fire would ever hit the place. Mr. Harold Van Eaton, Director of State Institutions, assured the committee that he was giving this matter immediate consideration and hopes that a new and satisfactory system will be installed in the very near future.

At 1 p.m. our host, Dr. Jones, and his staff, treated us to a very fine dinner, which was followed by a discussion on the needs at Sedro-Woolley.

Later we were taken thru some of the buildings and I can't over-emphasize the over-crowded conditions that we found. It was the same old story over and over again - the need for new buildings. I've seen this need in every inspection that I've made and it's a problem that can only be solved by the passage of the

bond issue in this fall's election. If only you folks could be on these visits with you'd understand why I keep talking about the bond issue. Dr. Jones told us that he even had a hard time getting staff members there because he had no decent residences to offer them. And to make matters more serious, he has only 12 doctors on his staff to take care of the 2210 patients. Divide the doctors in to 8 hour shifts (they work much longer than that) and you can readily see how many patients each doctor must care for. We, on the interim committee realize that along with the bond issue the next legislature must find the money to bring up the salaries of the employees in our institutions. I'm ashamed to tell you what we're paying them at the present time. If only every member of the legislature would visit these institutions they would be better informed as to our needs, etc. There's so much to be done in behalf of these people who cannot fight for themselves. Many groups come to Olympia with big campaign chests to put across or defeat a bill. And yet, simply because people in our institutions do not have an "alumni" to go out and fight for them their needs are overlooked, year after year. Surely we Christians should deem it our duty to take care of our unfortunate neighbors.

HAROLD BIRD CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

Harold Bird, widely known in police circles, files for Pierce County Sheriff. Bird, who lives at 3302 No. Mullen St., is currently engaged in operating a retail lumber yard, with his son Jack, at 2301 South Tacoma Way; a business he established in 1945. Bird has a well known record as a law enforcement officer. He was a deputy sheriff under both Tom Desmond and Remont Campbell, Jr., and served four years as Tacoma's Chief of Police under Commissioner Frank T. Callender, at that time establishing the first police training school ever held in Tacoma. In 1939 he was superintendent of the city garbage department under Mayor Kaufman, and continued to serve under Mayors Cain and Fawcett.

Born in Reno, Nevada in 1895, Bird was educated in the public schools of San Francisco, and came to Fort Lewis in World War I in 1917. He was active in athletics of the 44th Infantry and later when commissioned a second lieutenant, was in charge of the 44th's athletic program. After the war he became physical director of the Elks lodge, continuing in that post until 1928.

Active in civic affairs, Bird has long been a member of the Elks, Eagles, and Royal Arcanum lodges, as well as the American Legion. He has served with the Daffodil Festival Association continuously since the start of the organization.

Outlining his candidacy, Bird declared: "I will make an intelligent study of the county regarding prowl car service to outlying districts. There will be a rigid and regular schooling of personnel, on all phases of police training, and on what the public expects of a law enforcement officer. I will strive for complete cooperation with all law enforcement agencies. I will maintain the closest of public relations with all military groups. And lastly, I will hold all deputies personally responsible for the enforcement of all laws in their district; and any deputy failing to do this will be replaced."

Bird's son, Jack, will handle his campaign, with headquarters at 2301 South Tacoma Way, phone Garland 6767.

E. S. C. TO CLOSE VALLEY OFFICES

The Employment Security Department local office in Tacoma today issued an announcement regarding the service of claimants living in the Puyallup, Buckley and Eatonville areas. The last day of service to claimants at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Hall in Puyallup will be August 23. INSIDE SCENE

From The Capitol

REPUBLICANS NEWMING LANGLIE RIVAL

Latest report from our Seattle-Tacoma operatives informs us that a large group of influential Republicans in the two big Sound cities are laying plans to unseat Republican gubernatorial incumbent Arthur B. Langlie in the 1952 primaries. They are grooming their hand-picked candidate well in advance and will have more than adequate funds to back him when the time comes. Their candidate is Emmett Anderson, Grand Exalted Ruler of the national Elks Lodge.

It now appears that many of the big campaign contributors in the Republican ranks will be placing their loose change on Anderson to win, place or show in the big race of '52. As one of the biggest of these financial backers told this reporter recently, "All we wanted from Langlie was good government, and he hasn't produced. We figure our investment was wasted and we won't make the same mistake twice."

Another rapidly growing rumor in political circles has it that Langlie is gradually becoming aware of his widespread unpopularity throughout the state and won't try too hard for another term in the governor's chair, but will, instead, run against Harry Cain for the Republican nomination to the U. S. Senate. Probably on the theory that ANYBODY can beat Cain.

NO. 1 A-BOMB TARGET

It is pretty well conceded among defense planners that the Pacific Northwest in general and the Puget Sound region in particular is the most vulnerable area in the nation for a possible Russian atomic bomb attack. This leads to conjecture, on our part at least, as to how effective the state's civilian defense setup is to meet such a grim possibility. We may be doing the administration an injustice, but from where we sit it appears that what planning has been done has been carried on in the upper level of state officialdom, with little attention to the neighborhood and block organization.

Unless the state's civil defense leaders come up with something practical in the next week or so we'll feel called upon to devote a column to an outline of a sensible civil defense program. The governor and his radio-announcer civilian defense director can clip it and make use of it if they wish. At any rate, it will give them something to think about.

MORE ON POLITICAL COURTS

Our recent column exposing hopes of dominating the Thurston County Superior Court, where most of the state's legal projects are tried, has inspired a more than usual reader response, most of it commendatory. A number of attorneys have told us, off the record as to names of course, that they have privately been viewing the situation with alarm for some time, and from a non-legal public much admiration for courageous young Judge Charles Wright, who has made his legal decisions from the law books rather than from the scrapbook of political expediency.

We still say to our Thurston and Mason readers that their votes for Judge Charles Wright will be votes against machine politics in our courts.

Our readers in Sumas, Deming, Nooksack, Puyallup, Parkland, Eatonville, Ephrata, Roy, McKenna, Spanaway, Kapowsin, Lakeview, Alderton, Orting, Riverside, Seattle and other parts of the state won't be able to cast a vote to decide this vital issue, but we suggest that they keep an eye on the Thurston - Mason county vote.

This is a far bigger issue than it appears, for it will directly effect the entire state. How wisely the people of these two counties use their ballot will decide whether or not our judicial system can rise above partisan politics.
