#### Double Trouble For McDonalds


Troubles don't come singly for Mr. and Mrs. Roger McDonald!



This seems only cost for such an important checklike an overstatement of optimism up is just a few minutes of time. when we recall that only 50 years ago T.B. was the No. 1 killer in the U.S.A.—and that only three years ago it was still the sixth leading cause of death in our State.

However, our goal appears to be alogether reasonable to achieve. In three years we've already brought it down from sixth place to 10th. We have a well-planned program and adequate hospital facilities throughout the State. This is the first requirement if we're going to destroy T. B. and we've accomplished that.

The second requirement for compllete eradication is an aggressive case-finding program.

Destroying a disease is like destroying an enemy in battle. You first have to find the enemy - then overcome him. The best way to destroy a disease it to locate it early and then treat it-and this is especially true of tuberculosis.

Next to hospitalization, the case inding program is the most important maneuver in our fight to destroy completely the enemy T. B. Case-finding is discovering the presence of tuberculosis in persons who do not suspect they have its symptoms.

In this work doctors are alert to the possibility of tuberculosis in the patients who come to their offices. Many cases of T. B. incidences are revealed here. Then there is the routine X-raying of general hospital admissions which represents a program that is worthy of full development.

Organizations are already hearing about the need for such a building, because of the inadequate office space, and the dangers from fire and earthquake in both the county court house and the Tacoma city hall.

Engineers of both structures have found court house timbers eaten away by dry rot, and point out that storage vaults for valuable records in the buildingss are not fire-proof and are totally inadequate. Vaults are designed to ward off small blazes, but because they stand on heavy wooden timbers they are not protected from fire from beneath.

Organizations already on record upporting the need for a new countycity building include the Central Labor Council and the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce.

Roger McDonald, junior partner of Pochel Distributing Co., and a member of the 20-man advisory committee assisting the Pierce county and Tacoma city commissioners, urges all voters to get out and vote for the proposed county-city building in the Nov. 4 election.

"People should realize the urgency for making arrangements to replace the dangerous, obsolete buildings being used by the county and the city at present. Even if the voters approve the new buildings at this election, it will be 1954 before financing details are complete and contracts let, with at least another year elapsing before the new buildings are ready for use,' McDonald declares. "Let's start the ball rolling NOW; it's later than

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
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
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
