

# ENGLISH TEA RING

3/4 c milk 3 T shortening 3 T sugar

1 cake compressed yeast

1 beaten egg Grated rind of 1 orange

½ t salt
Scald milk; add shortening, sugar and salt; cool to luke-3 c flour warm. Add crumbled yeast cake and stir until dissolved. Add egg, reserving 2 t. Stir in orange rind and enough flour to make a smooth soft dough. Turn out on floured board and make a smooth soft dough. Turn out on floured board and knead lightly. Place in bowl; cover, and let rise until double in bulk. Roll into oblong shape about ½ inch thick. Spread with filling and roll lengthwise. Shape into ring and place in greased 10-inch cake pan, pressing ends together. Slash outside top edge at 1-inch intervals. Brush with reserved egg and let rise until very light. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 25 minutes.

# Blaze Big Enough?

Two fires occurring in this area last week left a family of seven homeless and destroyed an \$18,000 building of a poultry company. Both buildings burned to the ground.

Was the blaze big enough to shed some light on the inadequate fire protection system here?

Both fires could have been put out in their earlier stages if there had been an adequate water supply, but no sooner did Lowe, and driver Francis Henry the firemen get the fire under control than the fire trucks had to leave for more water while the fire blazed up again.

The Midland district, where the home was destroyed, has only one fire hydrant. Spanaway has none. Parkland has four and will soon have eight more but these are concentrated Damon car. in one district.

The system of water districts will make it difficult to install an adequate number of fire hydrants. Franchises and contracts must be investigated. It will take the cooperation of all three districts, working through their various community organizations, to put in such protection. The time to do it is now, before any more fires occur.

It will be costly, yes, but so is fire when it destroys buildings and leaves families homeless. In the long run the actual cost will be paid off in lower insurance rates.

Next time it might cost something in human lives—and next time it might be you.

The problem is, "Can we afford more fire protection?" And the answer, "We cannot afford to be without it."
