Don't Take a Chance With Distemper

Perhaps the most dreaded word known to the dog profession, whether it be the professional dog owner or just the one dog pet owner, is the virus known as "distemper." It is not a subject that should be taken lightly, nor is it one that should be greatly feared, and denied as ever having been connected with your



Jun for all! Much is already known about distemper, and much is still to be learned about distemper. Certainly the old idea, of letting nature take its course without prevention or pre-caution, is pure folly. Today, we have temporary shots that are not 100%, but give excellent immunity for a period of up to 21 days. On a more permanent basis, once small pups are old enough, there are other methods of inoculation that are very effective in giving your dog life-long immunity to this dreaded virus.

The most important step is to take measures of precaution before the distemper virus has started its dead-Veterinarian when you first get your young pup is highly recommended, as distemper strikes most frequently at dogs under one year of age Even should your dog contract dis-temper, if caught soon enough, with proper medical care, drugs and personal attention, his chances of recovery are very good. Symptoms are much like worms in very young pups with a loss of appetite, runny eyes and nose, loose bowels, dry skin, dry cough and loss of weight, all of which are usually accompanied with

The one bright thing about distemper, once the dog has it and recovers, chances are excellent that it will never strike at him again.

miringly at his newly acquired pup, perhaps the last thing he thinks of is "worms." Regardless of how well the little fellow has been cared for while nursing his mother or in being weaned, unless the breeder took the time to worm the entire litter, it is a sure bet your puppy has worms at work in his intestines. Most large professional breeders

tell the new owner what has been done to his pup in the line of worming, and when the treatment should be repeated. In many cases, new owners do not get their pups from large kennels, and think the swelling and bloated look after the pup eats is a sign of over fed contentment. This is not the case as a rule; it is a worm condition that causes the trouble, which if allowed to run for a period of time, will result in loss of appetite, runny eyes, loose bowels, dry skin, loss of weight and a general run down condition. In such a weakened condition, the puppy is wide open for any virus condition that might oe working in the area. It is well in first buying a puppy


Feeding the Small Puppy

As the new owner fondles his first puppy, the first reaction is to compare it with a tiny new born baby. Right here is the first mistake an owner makes in the care of his newly acquired dog. The puppy at weaning age is far more advanced than is the helpless child who must depend on adults for survival. From six weeks on the puppy is well advanced in what to do to-ward taking care of himself, and it is up to you in guiding him in his eating and every day habits of life.

At weaning age the puppy has a good strong set of pin teeth and a set of intestines that can handle with ease, limited amounts of solid foods. It is well to see that he gets fed often, but small amounts of feed at a time. Small pups up to eight weeks should be fed four times each day, three times each day up to six months, twice each day from six months up to a year, and only once a day for adult dogs, not being given hard work.

You must keep in mind that what looks like a small plate of food to the owner, is probably a big meal for his pup. Single growing dogs kept in the house with limited exercise, do not need as much food as dogs allowed to run in the yard or kennel runs. A good program to follow is always make the milk meal the noon and last meal at night The solid dog meal should be fed in the morning and at dinner time. In this way you have balanced the solid and liquid meals, as to get the greatest food intake. It is most important that your dog clean his plate at each feeding and within 10 minutes. If he appears to tire of his food, and is in good health, the fault is probably with the owner. This is your signal to either cut the amount of food per meal, or cut the number of feedings received each
