

## Census Starts April 1, Parkland Local Hdqs.

The nation's biggest quiz program is about to get underway. On April 1, enumerators will set out on U. S. highways and by ways to tabulate noses.

In our area, it will take more than 50 enumerators to ring all the doorbells south of the Tacoma city limits to the Nisqually river between Highway 99 and Mt. Rainier National Park. Census headquarters for this whole area, taking in all south central Pierce County, will be in Parkland.

Supervision will be divided between Freeman L. Cochran and Eugene J. Schumacker. Cochran, who has lived in Parkland since 1929, is crew leader for the area between Highway 99 and A Street, between the city limits and Spanaway Lake.

Schumacker and his enumerators will count noses in Graham, Roy, Kapowsin, Eatonville, Spanaway and surrounding communities and rural districts.

Midland and Summit residents will be reached by enumerators working from Puyallup under the direction of Mrs. Leona Mairs.

Each of these districts is subdivided into 25 to 30 enumeration districts with an approximate population of 800 to 1,000 families. Each crew leader supervises 25 to 30 enumerators.

Cochran, Schumacker and the other unit leaders from districts throughout Pierce County and southern and eastern King County began six days of instruction.

On March 27, the two local leaders will pass the instructions along to the

50 or more enumerators who will canvass their two districts. This "school" is tentatively set for the Parkland Fire station.

The census will continue through April and into May, until every person in the area has been counted. In advance, the two unit leaders have been conducting a spot check to sample a small percentage of the homes in the area.

All enumerators will carry proper credentials from the bureau of the census, and homemakers are urged not to be afraid to ask the doorbell-ringer to show his credentials.

## Neighbors Plan To Build Home For Blind Vet

Residents throughout the South End are joining in a project to build a home for a blind veteran at 121st and East F, about a half mile east of the Parkland school. Leading the undertaking is Mrs. Bernard Rouse of Rt. 13, Box 254-G, who took the young man under her wing after he lost his eyesight in the summer of 1948.

The man, veteran of three years' service, was working at Boecings in Seattle in 1948 when he was called to the Midwest to be at the bedside of his mother, his only living relative, who was dying of cancer.

Following her death and his return to the Pacific Northwest, he found Boeing workers out on strike, and he got a job constructing gas stations. One day a chunk of concrete hit his eyes, resulting in complete blindness.

He has spent the greater part of the past year and nine months in hospitals undergoing surgery in a vain attempt to restore his vision. But there is no hope; already one eye has been replaced with a glass eye and the other will have to be removed soon. He cannot even distinguish light from darkness.

During recent months the vet has been staying with Mrs. Rouse, an acquaintance for several years. But he desires to become a useful citizen with as much independence as possible. He would like to have a place of his own in which he could become familiar with the objects and have a garden and a pet dog.

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## Voters Okay All School Money Propositions; Nix Water Issue, Bethel Site

The returns are still incomplete and unofficial, but it looks as though all the school millage and bond issue propositions in the South End passed, the Spanaway water district bond issue failed, and fire commissioners and school directors were elected in Tuesday's county-wide election.

In the Franklin Pierce district, Superintendent Morris Ford's main worry was whether enough voters had turned out to make the election valid. At last count, the total was 1,558, more than the minimum number required. A majority favored the 20-mill levy.

Incomplete figures from the Bethel district showed a two-to-one margin in favor of the Bond issue and a 62 per cent approval of the 20-mill levy. However, the proposed 34-acre site between the Roy Y and Elk Plain was voted down 1,040 to 508. The tally in favor of the bond issue was 1,069 to 455 with most of the precincts accounted for.

For school director, G. O. Stovner was running ahead of incumbent Otto Siburg throughout most of the precincts in the F-P district, but the returns were still inconclusive.

Five directorships were voted upon in the Bethel district. At latest count, John Newell was ahead of sticker can-

## Funeral Services Held For Bert H. Senner



## HOW TO TREAT YOUR TELEPHONE

Suggestions to help protect your service



1. A twisted cord can lead to trouble. Although the wires are especially designed for flexibility, too many twists and kinks may eventually break them and interfere with service until a repairman can call. Good idea to get the curls out by letting the receiver dangle and unwind by itself . . . then keep them out by remembering, each time you call, not to put turns in the cord as you handle the receiver.
2. It's built to take it . . . but your telephone can develop ailments if it's dropped. So make sure the stand it sits on is solid and is in a spot where it won't be accidentally bumped. Other ways to help protect service: Avoid "gadget" attachments for your telephone . . . keep cords clear of doorways where they may be pinched . . . and always keep water away from wires and fittings.
