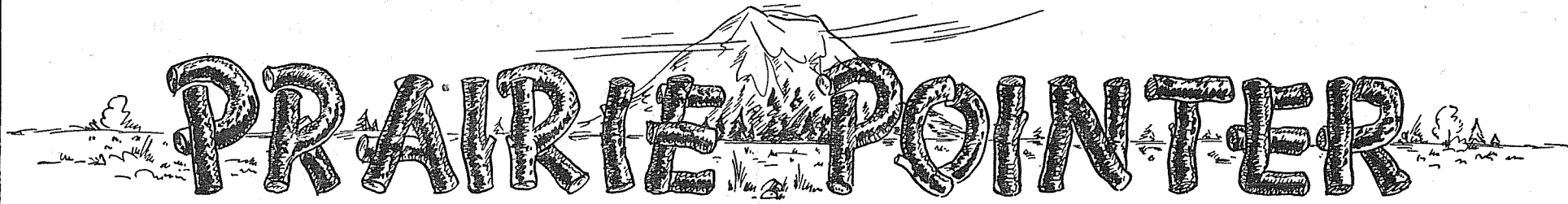

Two New Businesses Opening in Midland

North Pole Locker Plant Has Latest Modern Equipment

If you want to get a warm welcome and a cheerful smile, you are invited to visit the coldest business in Midland! The new lockers, owned by Lee Cole and Gene Brittain, are now open and doing business.

Has "Sharp Freeze Unit"

Among the unique features of the new locker company is a sharp freeze unit, the only one of its kind on the Pacific coast, it was stated. With a temperature of 25 below zero, the sharp freeze unit preserves the original flavor of meats, fruits and vegetables which are frozen in it before they are placed in the regular lockers. The temperature of the regular lockers is zero.

900 Lockers

Built almost entirely by Brittain and Cole, the plant has 900 lockers. The lockers have 11-inch cork insulation and a total wall thickness of 13 inches. The lockers have either 8, 9 1/2, 12 or 13 cubic feet capacity.

It has two electric units, which are connected so that in the event of the breakdown of one unit, the other would carry on.

The approximate cost for the lockers was \$50,000.

The plant will be equipped later with a cutting room, modern saws and grinders for the slicing and preparing of meat for storage, and a cooling room for freshly butchered meat. The cooling room will be 21x9.

Local Residents

The Brittain have lived in Midland for several years, while the Coles have been residents for two years. "It was a little ad that brought us to Midland," Mr. Cole said. "We had just sold our apartment house in Seattle and bought a trailer in preparation for a trip to Florida. We saw an ad in a Tacoma paper about a variety store in Midland—and we came out. Well, here we are."

CORNERSTONE CEREMONY HELD AT MIDLAND

ST. JOHN OF THE WOODS CHURCH EXPECTED TO BE FINISHED IN SEPT.

The cornerstone for Midland's St. John of the Woods Church was laid last Sunday, July 20, with the Most Reverend Gerald Schaughnessy, S.M., Bishop of Seattle, officiating. The bishop was assisted by the Reverend William Gallagher, the Reverend Emond Barry and the Reverend Jeremiah Milner of Saint Ann's Parish, Tacoma.

Burned in 1940

In December of 1940, the church was burned to the ground. The members of the church have worked hard to raise money to build a new church again.

In 1941, the Reverend Edmond Barry was appointed to serve as pastor at Marymount Academy, so the Reverend Robert Logan was chosen to take his place.

The Reverend Robert Logan has worked hard with his parishioners in getting the new church started. The building was begun in May and is expected to be completed in September of this year. The cost when completed will be approximately \$50,000.

Many Priests Present

Among the priests present were The Rev. Albert Allard from the Sacred Heart parish in Tacoma; the Reverend Joseph Mayostek of Saint Joseph's Church; the Reverend Bernard Cremer of All Saint Church, Puyallup; the Rev. Eugene Legault, S. J., from Bellarmine High; the Reverend Timothy Moynihan of Saint Joseph's Hospital; the Reverend William Quick from Saint Martin of Tours in Fife; the Rev. George McClean, also of Fife; Reverend Father Henry, O.S.B., from St. Peter and Paul in Tacoma; the Reverend A. J. Krebsbach, S. J., from St. Leo's in Tacoma, Ed Boyle, a seminarian of the parish, helped with the ceremonies.

The contractor in charge is Jim Parvis and the architect is John McGuire.

The outside of the church will be of brick and the inside will be of pumice stone and plaster. It will be one of the most modern churches in this vicinity.

A very large crowd was present, this being one of the first ceremonies of its kind ever held in Midland.

PROF. DOUBTS BRIGHT FOLKS CAN BE G.O.P.

PETER J. BARDON SAYS MAN WITHOUT GOD IS FINISHED

Peter Jeremiah Bardon, Professor Emeritus of Economics and Sociology of Pacific Lutheran College, is still as spry and active as any teen-ager, though he did admit under questioning that he will be 80 years of age next May 19th.

Driving his own car, Mr. Bardon stopped for a chat with Mr. and Mrs. Walt Young, at Young's Gift Shop, Parkland. Mrs. Bardon, too, is well. "She's as good as ever," he said, "only she can't run as fast as the day she caught me."

Quizzed on his political outlook, Mr. Bardon admitted lightly that he was often regarded as a radical during his years at the college. "I've always said—and I still say it—," he said with a twinkle, "I can't understand how any intelligent person can be a Republican."

Was Too Gloomy

The business men often protested when he taught here, he said. "When I predicted the second world war, they said I was too gloomy. Well, just wait until the third one comes—and Communism sweeps the world. Then they'll see."

When asked what he thought of communism, the retired professor said, "Oh, the communists are no worse than the greedy capitalist—neither one is interested in a Christian world."

"There's plenty for all—we produce in unlimited quantity—why can't we make use of what we produce?"

Came to College in 1912

Mr. Bardon (he refused to be called Doctor or Professor) came to the college in 1912, teaching until 1917, when the first world war practically forced the shutting down of the college. Returning in 1929, he taught until 1938. "Then they fired me—I mean retired, though it's the same thing—for being 70 years old," he said with a smile.

The Bardons came to visit their children, Jennie Bardon, teacher in the Clover Park High School, and Peter, supervisor of music in the same institution.

Man Without God Is Done

"There's only one real conviction I have," he said, his mood changing from a joking to a serious one, "Man without God will perish from this earth."

Mr. Bardon is remembered by many of his students for the early morning devotional services which he began at the college. "I hope they're still having them," he said.

The Bardons are now living at 9020 Roosevelt Way, Seattle. When asked if the address reflected his political views, Mr. Bardon said, "Well, there are a lot of folks who won't live on a street with that name, but I'm not one of them."

Mrs. Bardon was not in agreement with her husband on all points. "Even the republicans let us have churches, Peter," she said firmly. "That's more than the communists would do."

Mr. Bardon hesitated, then replied somewhat reluctantly, "Yes, they will let us do that anyway." Waving a cordial good-bye, the Bardons climbed into their car and drove off, concluding their brief visit.

RECEIVE TOWER AND PUMPS, AWAIT MOTORS

WILL HAVE COMPLETE SYSTEM WHEN WORK HAS BEEN FINISHED

With construction already under way this week on the new water tower of the Southeast Tacoma Mutual Water Company, Midland residents look forward eagerly to the day when they will have a completely self-sustaining water system. Carl J. Taylor, manager-secretary of the company, stated that the tower had just been received, and that erection of it was being done by the Pittsburgh-Des Moines Steel Company. Most of the frame is already up, and when completed will soar 100 feet in height, with the tank reaching an additional 32 feet.

Long awaited, the tower and pumps, minus the motors, arrived a few days ago. It is expected that it will take approximately six weeks to complete the erection of the tower, which will have 100,000 gallon capacity, and is similar in design to the Parkland water tower.

Wells Are Ready

The company has two wells drilled and completely set up for operation. Well number one at 98th and Jackson is 415 feet deep, while well number two at 90th and Golden Given Road is 505 feet in depth. The wells have 12-inch casing in part, with the remainder 10-inch casing.

The pumps are capable of producing 350 gallons per minute. Turbine type in design, they were made by Peerless Pump Company of Tacoma, and are like those used in Parkland.

When the motors are received, the new water system will be ready for the final touches. After the motors are installed, the pump houses can be set up, hooked to the existing mains, and electrical connections made, and will then be ready for testing. While Mr. Taylor stated that the company wrote that one motor may be shipped soon, no assurance was given for the other one.

When the new water mains are installed, the company will put in ones large enough to support fire hydrants, Mr. Taylor stated.

Old Company

The water company has been in existence since September 15, 1926. A mutual company, it is a non-profit organization, serving the Midland area, and then west to the Sales Road and north to the city limits. The cost of the new tower is approximately \$32,500, Mr. Taylor said. The total cost of the improvement is not known, because of the expense for the pump houses, the connecting up with the existing mains, and other expenses. The work was financed from accumulated dividends of the company, without additional levy.

Mrs. Fjelde Meets Accident Sunday on Mt. Rainier Outing

Mrs. Guri Fjelde, mother of Mrs. Edvin Tingelstad, with whom she makes her home, had the misfortune last Saturday of tripping over a small boulder while on an outing to Longmire, fracturing her left hip. Park rangers administered first aid, and after a consultation with Dr. Holmes of National who was called to the scene, she was rushed to Tacoma in the Park Service ambulance. This ambulance was met by one ordered out from Tacoma and the accident victim, aged 81, was taken to the Tacoma General Hospital where Drs. Goering and Staatz gave her surgical attention Sunday morning.

Despite the seriousness of the injury and the effects of the long ambulance ride, Mrs. Fjelde is resting comfortably and her condition is comparatively good. With Mrs. Fjelde when the accident occurred were the E. Tingelstad family and their house guests, the Clarence Olafson family of Duluth, Minnesota. The group were enroute to Mt. Rainier and had stopped at the Longmire camp ground for a picnic dinner. Former students of the old Pacific Lutheran Academy will remember Mrs. Fjelde as "preceptress" there from 1910 to 1912.

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What Is Security?

The threat of the atomic bomb hangs like a pall over the world—the "brave new world" which was supposed to have abolished war, with the defeat of the Fascist powers. Uncertainty, fear, universal insecurity grip the whole of modern civilization, so that one is driven to wonder what became of the dream of peace which everyone saw on VJ day.

What, after all, is security? The world apparently thinks that it is something attained by gigantic armies, fleets of airplanes, and control of the atomic bomb. Yet, we have been warned by our military leaders from Eisenhower to Arnold that THERE IS NO DEFENSE AGAINST THE ATOMIC BOMB. Are we then building on an illusion in talking merely of universal military training and new and vaster air fleets?

One is reminded of the words of Kipling, "Lord God of Hosts Be With Us Yet"—lest all our supposed civilization be "one with Nineveh and Tyre." For security after all, if the lessons of the second world war have taught us anything, must be something more than physical power, however great. Something which is moral—or spiritual, which is constructive, not destructive. Can the world learn that lesson in time? Or will we, because of mutual hatred, fear and blind greed between the nations, blast each other from the earth in a third—and possibly final—World War?

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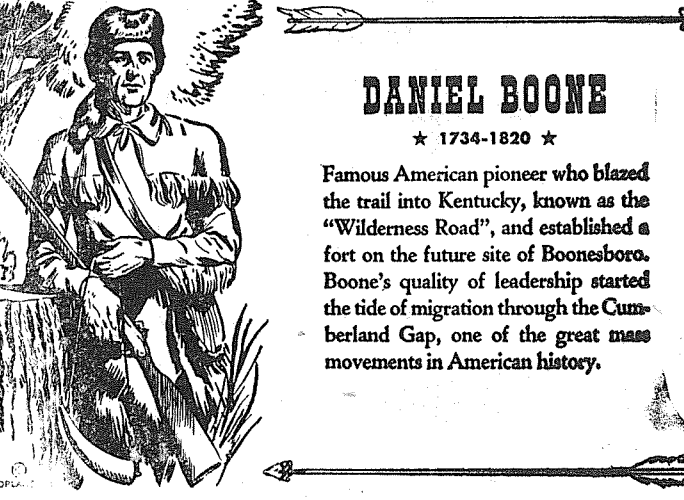
