## Decision On Bus Service Promised After September 15

Residents of the Parkland-Spanaway area, apprehensive the past two weeks because of the possibility that bus service provided by Tacoma Transit Co. to the community might be curtailed or discontinued, will probably have no definite information regarding the situation until late in September.

At the close of the all-day hearing held by the Washington Public Service Commission in the Wedgewood room of the Winthrop hotel Thursday, July 1, the lawyers representing the various factions of the dispute asked permission to file briefs of their cases, after which they announced that they would file answers to the briefs of opposing attorneys. Examiner Lee Coulton, who conducted the proceedings for the Public Service Commission, set Sept. 1 as the final date for filing the briefs, Sept. 15 for the replies. The decision of the Commission will be announced after this date. Commissioner Joseph Starin presided as judge.

The hearing was called to consider the complaint of Robert Wright of Yelm, who claims that the Tacoma Transit Co. is infringing on the certificate of operation issued his independent bus company, Nisqually Valley Lines, running three buses daily over the Mountain highway from Vail, Rainier and Yelm into Tacoma. The section of highway specified in Wright's complaint is from 144th street, the limit allowed Tacoma Transit Co. by its Tacoma franchise, and 160th St., where the buses leave the highway to go to the Spanaway business center, a distance of only 1.1 miles. Wright has no certificate for his buses to leave the Mountain

## County 4-H Camp Set July 26-31 At State Park

County 4-H Club Camp will be held July 26-31 at Miller-Sylvania State park, 10 miles southwest of Olympia. Senior 4-H members are urged to come by 12:30 p.m. on July 26th. Older 4-H members will have certain responsibilities during the camp and need to learn camp organization before all the campers arrive on Tuesday. If you arrive before lunch time please bring a sack lunch as the first meal served to you is that evening. Younger 4-H members will come on Tuesday, July 27, after 1 o'clock. If you come earlier than that time bring a sack lunch. Camp closes for everyone at 2 o'clock on July 31st.

Camp fee is \$8.50 for all July 12th is the deadline date for leaders to get the money in to this office. Only those who get their money in by that date will be eligible to attend. Limit of camp will be 250 club members and chaperones.

Each club must arrange to have an adult chaperone. Chaperones may be parents or leaders over 21 years. These chaperones are expected to enforce camp rules and attend some meetings on camp rules and problems.

Campers should bring clothes suitable for camping, costumes of different countries (if they have them), sleeping bag or bedding role (be sure to bring enough as the nights are cold at camp), flashlight, soap, towels, tooth brush, tooth paste, drinking cup, wash basin and a warm coat. Swimming suits, cameras may be also brought if desired. Some cots are available at camp for leaders.

All those attending camp will be covered by sickness and accident insurance from the time they leave home until they return from camp. A doctor will check all those attending camp on Tuesday afternoon.




**Bacon Potato Salad**  
Broadcast: July 10, 1954

2 slices bacon 1 cup Pet  
1/4 cup vinegar 1 cup Evaporated Milk  
1 teaspoon grated onion 3 cups sliced, cooked potatoes  
1/2 teaspoon pepper 1 cup finely cut celery  
1 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons sugar

Cut bacon into small pieces and cook in a skillet until crisp. Remove from heat. Take out crisp pieces and save. Add vinegar, onion, pepper, salt and sugar to fat in skillet. Stir mixture into milk. Just before serving, pour dressing over a mixture of potatoes and celery. Mix gently until vegetables are coated with the dressing. Sprinkle top with crisp bacon pieces. Makes 4 servings.





### County Agent's Corner

By C. R. Doran  
Pierce County farmers lost no hay during June. Before the days of grass silage 10 to 15 years ago, losing the first hay cutting was a risk most every one felt he had to take. Now with a grass silage program tested by the Experiment Station and recommended by county agents, no feed is lost

and the only time work stops is during a rain storm. The land produces more feed too, by removing the crop early so new grass and clover can come back during our best growing weather.  
Grass for silage is about 70 per cent moisture so that handling this crop means moving heavy loads. Forage harvesters are popular with farmers having enough tonnage to justify the cost.  
Here is a problem where that farmer ingenuity starts appearing. Dave Parker of Spanaway says his tractor buckrake is

highly satisfactory for picking up the cut grass and shoving it up to the cutter at the silo.  
Lawrence Newman of Gig Harbor finds the hay loader equipment and trucks satisfactory for getting in his crop. Since his two silos won't hold all of it, the same equipment can be used for hay making.  
Otto Reise of McMillin, using a forage harvester, found he could make some very satisfactory high wire sided trailers to hook on behind the field chopper. When full they were towed by tractor or truck to the silo trench.  
The Western Washington Experiment station has departed this year from its system of using the hayloader equipment. The 1954 crop is going in via a forage harvester. The new manure spreader is coming in for extra use. It is fitted with high sides and moves the feed from the field chopper to the silo. At the silo the tractor power take-off in gear unloads into the silo blower.  
Farmers are asking more questions about permanent type trench silos. We have just received two new bulletins that have excellent suggestions. You

can have them by dropping a card to 501 Court House, Tacoma.

One of the happiest appearing groups of people last week were the Pierce County cattlemen at the Otto Reise beef farm at McMillin. In addition to learning more "tricks of the cattlemen's trade" they ate the home prepared beef barbecue and baked beans with gusto. The women of the Pierce County Cowbelles, the Cattlemen's Association auxiliary, prepared the food with the help of PFC Elwood Corulli, presently of Fort Lewis. Private Corulli, a Washington State college graduate, has had previous experience supervising beef barbecues over the state. He said the dimensions of a pit should be three feet wide, 40 inches deep and three feet long for feeding 200 people figuring one-half pound meat per person.  
Other recommendations include these—line the pit with concrete blocks unless you have heavy clay soil. Pour a cement slab foundation for the blocks. Provisions for drainage of water may need to be considered too. Hard wood is preferable for fire. Reise used alder

wood. Have fire going about 7 hours for a bed of coals about 20 - 24 inches deep. Then take out and discard all the top pieces of wood which may not be completely burned. Take a shovel and smooth the coals for a fairly even surface. Then put a thin layer of large gravel or small rocks on coals. Follow with a thin layer of sand over the gravel.  
The meat should be aged one to two weeks in 10 to 12 pound hunks, bound tightly and wrapped in either two thicknesses of muslin or one layer of muslin tied next to the meat with an outer layer of fairly clean burlap tied around for an outside layer. Use of aluminum foil under the meat helps to keep sand out of the cloth or burlap. After placing meat packages cover the pit with lumber or sheet iron then a large piece of canvas followed by three or four inches of dirt to hold the heat in the pit. Leave meat exactly 12 hours. Prime or choice graded top round or loin is needed for best marbling of fat within the lean meat.






