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Parkland Bank Mails Checks to Christmas Club

(Crowded Out Last Week)
Nearly \$600,000 in Christmas Club checks is being mailed this week by National Bank of Washington to its 6,300 Christmas Club members in Parkland and Western Washington, according to A. G. Swindland, manager of the Parkland branch of the bank. This represents the amount these people saved through regular weekly or monthly deposits during the year.

"Christmas Club has been a special service of National Bank of Washington since 1941," stated Swindland. "The purpose is to provide a simple way for people to accumulate funds during the year for holiday spending, taxes, insurance premiums, and other bills. A member chooses the plan he wishes to join, from 50c a week up, and makes weekly or monthly deposits beginning December 1 for a period of 50 weeks, at the end of which time he receives from the bank a check for the total amount he has saved, plus interest. Special Christmas Clubs are provided for those people who prefer to save on a monthly basis."

The popularity of Christmas Club has grown rapidly during the years, as more and more people experience the satisfaction of having cash on hand during the Christmas season. On a nation-wide scale, over a billion dollars is being paid out by banks to Christmas Club members throughout the United States this year.

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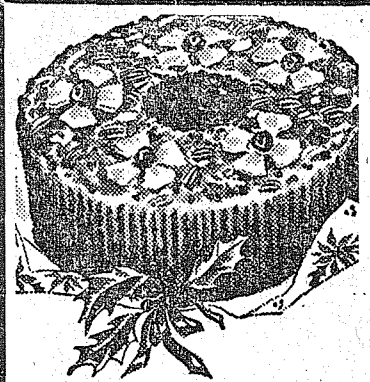

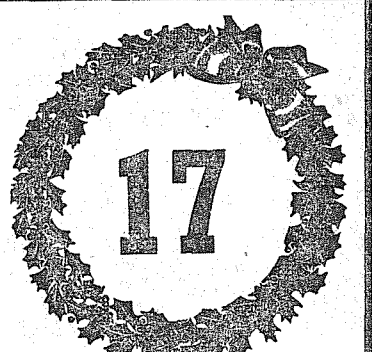

Now They Know About A Kansas Blizzard

If Mr. and Mrs. Francis Nordyke (Parkland-Brookdale Electric) had not thoroughly appreciated the Pacific Northwest before their recent trip to the middle west, they do now! Their harrowing experience in a Kansas blizzard made them realize more than ever that Kansas may be a good place to be "from," but that Parkland is the best place to be "at."

The Nordykes, with Mr. Nordyke's half-brother and family, Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Burns and daughter Sally of Park avenue, left for Kansas Nov. 14, called there by the critical illness of Mr. Nordyke's father, Guy Nordyke, of Minneapolis, Kansas, near Salina. The elder Nordyke improved sufficiently to seem on the road to complete recovery and the Washington party started home Tuesday, Nov. 25.

It was spitting snow when they started, Mr. Nordyke says, but no trouble was expected. And they got along very well for more than 50 miles, travelling along Highway 40 at a good pace. Then the blizzard struck—nine below zero, with a 77-mile-an-hour wind. Very soon their car was stopped by the snow driving into the motor, with dozens of other passenger cars and trucks lining the highway. Two trucks were able to keep going and Mr. Nordyke sent the rest of his party to the nearest town, six miles away, staying in his car. He sat there nearly six hours, wrapped in blankets, before a rescue party with truck and tractor came to move the cars. On reaching town, the Nordyke car had to be cleared of the impacted snow and it was noon of the next day before they were able to resume their journey. Snow plows had cleared the drifts from the highway to allow one-way traffic in the 175-mile strip blanketed by the snow.

They drove through some snow all the way to Laramie, Wyoming, but had no difficulty. The two couples reached home late Saturday night and are mighty glad to be back in "God's country."

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
By Mary Lee Taylor
Haystacks
Broadcast: December 6, 1952
1/2 cup Pet Milk 2 cups shredded coconut, packaged or canned
1/2 cup brown sugar 1/4 cup corn syrup
1 Tablespoon butter or margarine
Mix in a heavy 1 1/2-quart saucepan the milk, sugar, syrup and butter. Cook and stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring often until candy reaches soft ball stage (see note). Remove from heat. Add coconut. Mix well. Shape with fingers into cones about 1 1/2 inches high. Put on waxed paper to cool. Makes 2 dozens.
Note: Drop a tiny bit of hot mixture into a bowl of cold (not ice) water. If the candy stays together in a soft ball and does not fall apart when you lift it out of the water with your fingers, then the candy has cooked long enough. Be sure to take the pan off the heat while testing the candy.

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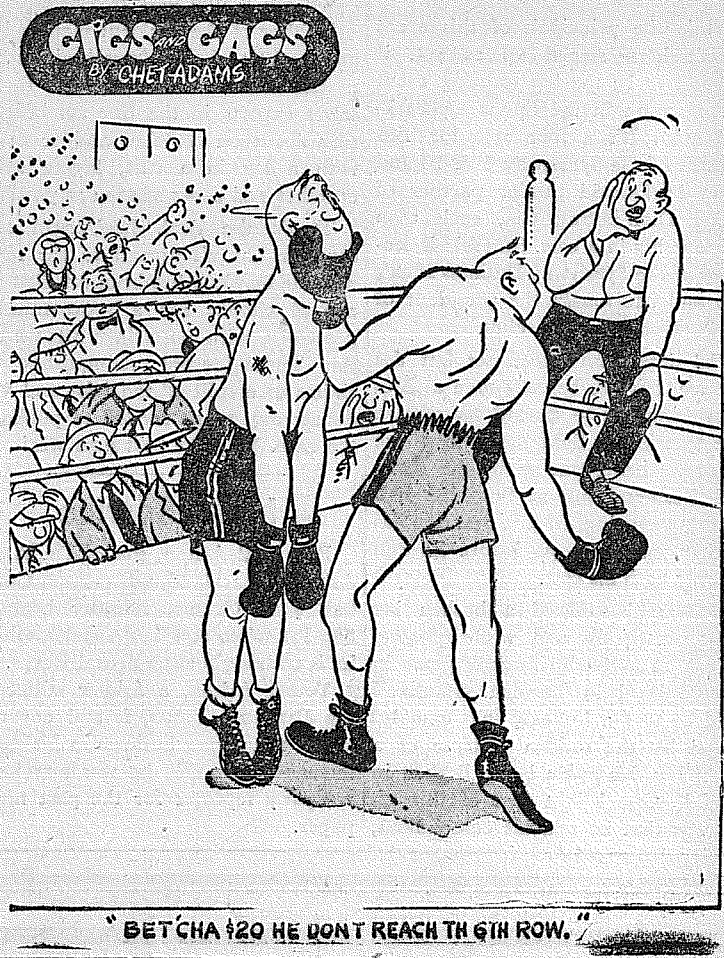
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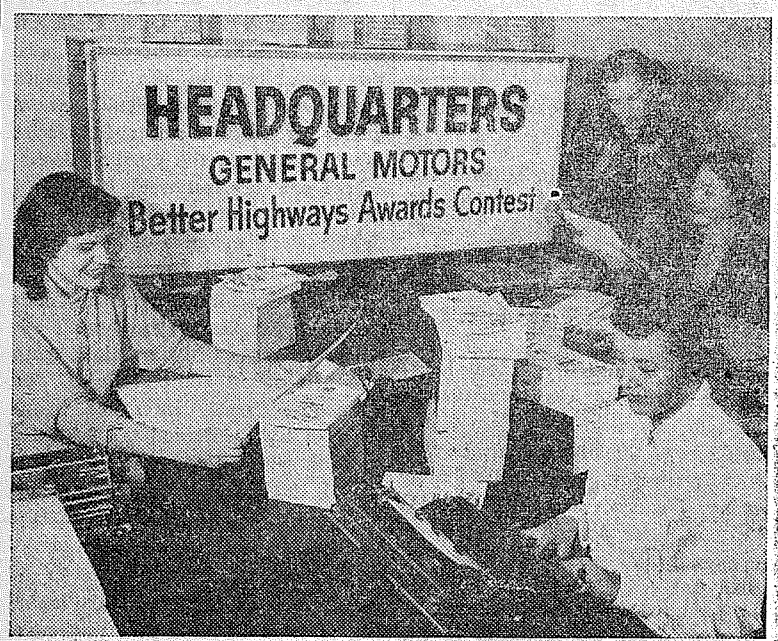
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GM Opens \$194,000 Highway Contest
