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## Parkland Bank Mails Checks to Chrisimas Club

Mix in a heavy 1½-quart saucepass the milk, sugar, syrup and butter. Cook and stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring often until candy reaches soft ball stage (see note). Remove from heat. Add coconut. Mix well. Shape with fingers into cones about 1½ inches high. Put on waxed paper to cool. Makes 2 dozen.
