Well Known Artist Mrs. Ronning needs no introduction to Parkland or Tacoma, having recently appeared as assisting soloist with the Normanna Male Chorus and Norwegian Male Chorus of Seattle and Everett in a recent Tacoma concert. She is a graduate of St. Olaf College where she majored in music and has appeared in concerts in New York, Minneapolis and other centers in the United States and Canada. Besides her training in New York, she has traveled in Norway, studying the music of that country.

Other vocal solos include an aria from Tannhauser by Wagner, a group of "What's in the Air Today" by Robert Eden, "The Brownies" by Leoni, "When Night Comes" by Carpenter, and "The Floods of Spring" by Rachmaninoff.

Mrs. Weiss will play Chopin's "Impromptu in F Sharp Major," Brahms' "Intermezzo in A Major' and "By the Seashore," by Smetana.

The concert will begin at 8:30 p.m. in the Pacific Lutheran Col lege chapel. Tickets may be obtained from auxiliary members.



Mother's Day

The second Sunday in May has been set apart for special observance in honor of the home and motherhood. The idea of Mother's Day originated with Miss Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia, and it was celebrated by a number of cities in the United States in 1910. On May 10, 1913, a resolution passed both houses of Congress commending the observance of the day by Congress and the executive departments of the government; and in the same year Nebraska made it a state flag day in honor of the patriotism of Nebraska's homes. In 1914, Congress authorized the President of the United States to designate, by annual proclamation, the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day, and to request the display of the American flag on government buildings and private homes. The first national proclamation was issued by President Wilson on May 9, 1914.

It is indeed fitting that our nation should adhere to this honorable custom. On this day men, women and children recall memories of the mothers who have gone and try to brighten the lives of those who remain. Another important object of Mother's Day which is often times forgotten is to encourage all people to honor the sanctity of the home.

Custom dictates that Mother's Day is to be observed by some special act of kindness to mother and father; by services in churches of all creeds, and by wearing a red or white carnation which is the emblem of the purity, beauty, fidelity and peace of mother love.

Education

A group of Oxford students who were touring the United States before the war were asked to comment on some of the differences between England and America. Without hesitation they observed that one of the greatest differences was the large number of young men and women in this country that attended colleges and universities as compared to their homeland.

Even before the war money and family background was not the measure of educational pursuits on the secondary level as it was in England. Our colleges and universities were filled with many a poor man's son who was fired with the ambition to earn a degree even if it entailed considerable outside work to earn the necessary dollars.

This trend has been materially augmented by the benefits offered the discharged serviceman through the G.I. Bill of Rights. It is now estimated that 1,500,000 veterans will be attending college next fall. Many of these young men would never have enjoyed the benefits of advanced education without the assistance that is now being offered.

The present program may well begin a new era in the American educational system. If our government can spend billions for waging war it can certainly afford to spend millions to ensure the proper education of its youth. Our representatives should consider a continuation of educational subsidies and grants to deserving high school graduates who cannot afford to continue their educational pursuits without financial assistance. If such a program were adopted it might well become one of the few benefits to emerge from World War II.
