Marking another milestone in the progress of the Times Journal Publishing Co., a brand new publication will be presented to the public in the very near future. The Northwest Flyer, described by Publisher Jack Brown as "aviation's own newspaper—about flyers, by flyers, for flyers," will be winging out from the Times Journal printing plant and offices in March, to be distributed twice each month.

Don Norris, editor and advertising manager of the Northwest Flyer, needs no introduction among the aviation minded people of the Pacific Northwest. He got an early start in this flying business, his know-how and skill firmed up while taking a post graduate course in the tough school of Navy air service, where he served as an aerial photographer.

For the past 10 years he has lived in or near Parkland with practically all of his activities connected with flying.

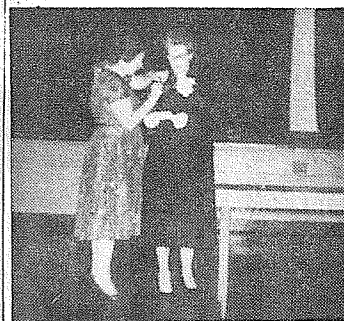

Publisher Jack Brown will be in general charge, doing his share of flying as time permits, and Wes McKewen will lend a hand with the photography.

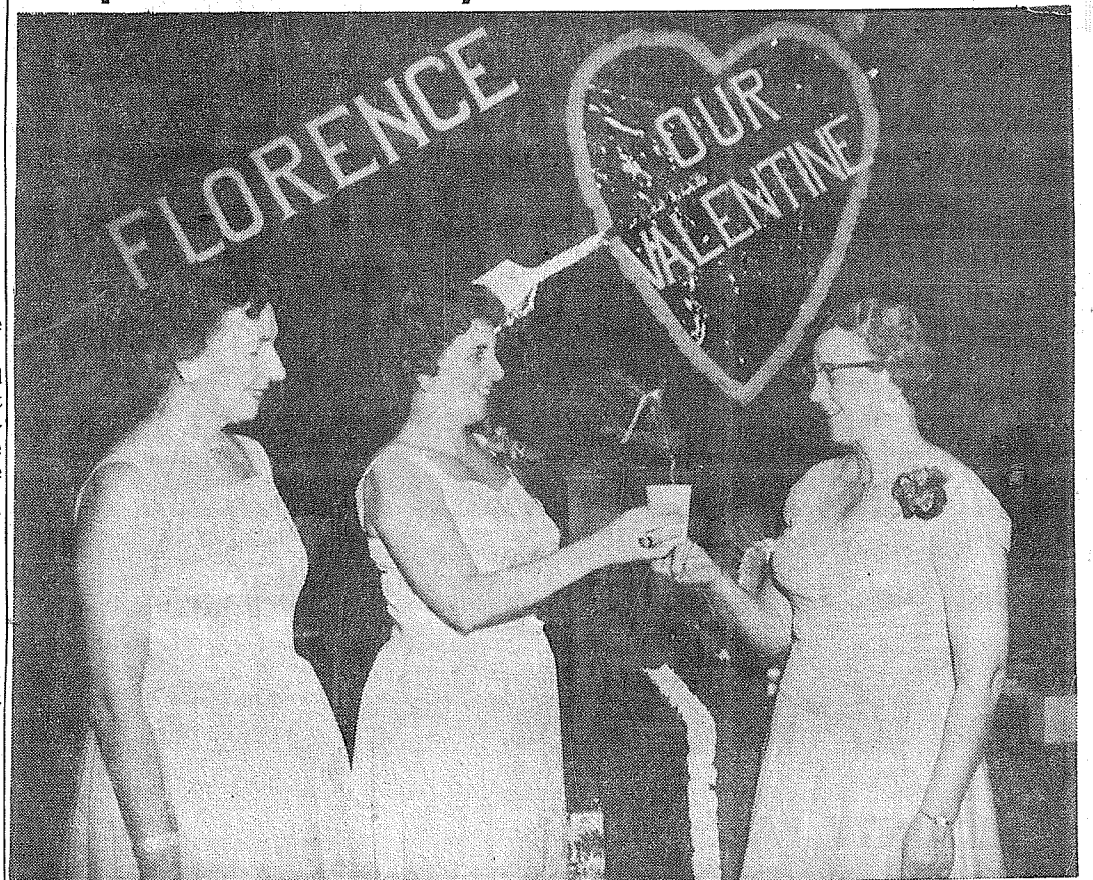

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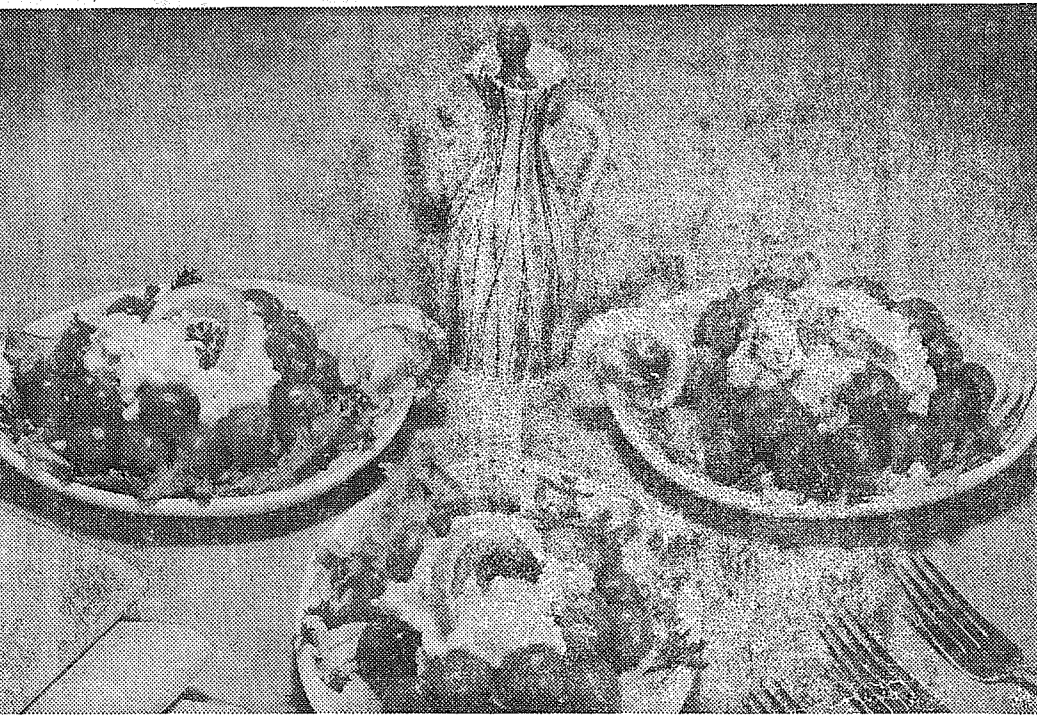
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Brighten February's Menus With Cherries



Bing Cherries—sweet and delicious—grace salads for Washington's Birthday or Valentine's Day dinners. Delicious right from the can, too, when served in their own syrup.

For Valentine's Day or George Washington's Birthday, cherries add a bright and appropriate touch to the dinner table.

"Bings" come from the Northwest. These sweet cherries are wonderful for salads, desserts and fruit cocktails, or they can be served "as is," right from the can, in their own delicious juice.

Cherry-Cottage Cheese Salad (4 salads)

One No. 303 can light sweet cherries, drained; 1 pint cottage cheese, large or small curd, 2 orange slices cut in half, salad greens.

Drain and pit cherries. Line 4 plates with salad greens. Place ½ cup cottage cheese in center of each.

Surround cottage cheese with

cherries. Garnish with orange slice and sprig of parsley. Serve with your favorite dressing.

Canned sour cherries are popular, too, in pies and desserts. Here's a very good cherry recipe for any time of year.

Fluffy Cherry Pie (1 10-inch pie)

One 3½-ounce package vanilla pudding mix, 1 tablespoon (1 envelope) unflavored gelatin, 1½ cups (large can) undiluted evaporated milk, 1 cup water, 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, ½ cup sugar, 1 cup drained canned sour cherries, 1 10-inch baked pastry shell.

Mix pudding mix and gelatin in saucepan. Add 1 cup evapo-

rated milk and water. Cook over low heat according to package directions.

Cool until thickened.

Beat until light and fluffy. Add lemon rind and mix well. Meanwhile, chill remaining ¾ cup evaporated milk in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges of tray—15 to 20 minutes.

Whip until stiff, about 1 minute.

Add lemon juice. Whip very stiff, about 2 minutes longer.

Fold in sugar. Fold whipped evaporated milk and cherries into pudding mixture.

Pour into pastry shell and chill until firm.

Garnish pie with additional cherries, as desired.

### Growing Pains for Puyallup Schools

The following article will be of interest to residents of the Woodland and Waller Road school districts, both parts of the Puyallup school district.

The Puyallup School District is setting records again this school year in services provided and the numbers being served, stated Superintendent of Schools, Paul B. Hanawalt, today. Never has the curriculum been broader than the program now available to students from kindergarten age through adulthood. Never have there been more auxiliary services available for so many. Never have there been so many students served by the schools.

Enrollments this school year in kindergarten through grade twelve exceed 4,800 students, a growth exceeding last year's record enrollment by over 360 pupils. These students are being taught in eleven schools throughout the district, nine elementary, one junior high, and one senior high school.

Adult enrollments, including both semesters, number 555 this school year and are the highest ever served by the academic vocational type offerings which now comprise the adult course of study. Only in 1949-50 were more enrolled in adult classes but this greater number was accounted for by heavy enrollments in the then popular folk dancing classes.

Each day 2,100 students are transported to and from school. Over 90 per cent of these students are transported in the school owned and operated fleet of ten busses. The remaining are transported by regular public transportation through special contracts with the school.

Each day 1,700 students are served lunches in the school lunchrooms. Another 1,130 daily secure milk from the school lunchrooms. The program also provides daily a small refreshment serving to the 400 kindergarten children enrolled in the Puyallup Schools.

The school district employs 262 regular employees including five who teach only special courses in adult classes. In addition, are those employed only as substitutes which number is probably higher than most business operations as there are but few school employees that can be absent from work without having a replacement.

Next year new records will easily be made in practically all the above named areas as enrollments are certain to grow again to bring the total number of pupils in grades kindergarten through twelve past 5,000.

Bethel Growth Points Millage Need

Editor's Note: This is the first in a series designed to present the needs of the Bethel School District and to point out the importance of the millage and bond issues that will appear on the March 10 ballot in the Bethel district.

Granting of funds by the State of Washington to help finance the construction of additions to two of the Bethel district's elementary schools depends on whether the Bethel patrons approve the \$175,000 bond issue request that will appear on a special Bethel School District ballot. The election, that will include two school measures, will be held on March 10 according to Superintendent Dewane Lamka.

district would also need to hire an additional principal for the new elementary school, and it would increase the administrative problems of operating a separate school.

Crowding In Elementary Schools

At the present time the Bethel elementary schools have been relieved of over-crowded conditions by the construction of the new Bethel Junior High; but by next fall the schools will again begin to be too overcrowded for effective teaching.

The exact sizes of the additions to the two schools, if the voters approve the bond issue, can not be determined as yet, according to Superintendent Lamka. This will depend on the drawing up of the plans and the bids that are submitted; however the preliminary plans call for a six-room addition for the primary grades at Clover Creek, and a four-to-six-room addition at the Elk Plain site.

If after the elementary school projects are completed and some of the funds raised from the bond issue remain, the district plans to construct a bus maintenance shop to relieve the present cramped shop area where 24 buses are serviced. A shed for bus storage may also be constructed, if funds are available. Lamka stressed this work would only be done after the district finances the elementary school additions.

Forty Per Cent Needed

In order to make this special March 10 election legal, at least 40 per cent of the number of people who voted in the last State General election in February must cast ballots. Of this number at least 60 per cent must vote "yes" in order to pass the two school issues.

The other school measure that will appear on the ballot is for \$75,000 or less than a 12 mill special levy to replace the present \$96,000

County Agent's Corner

You can often determine the grade of the furniture you are buying by its wood finish.

All the best grades of furniture have a beautiful soft satiny finish rather than a gloss. This finish will show the grain of the wood even when stain has been added. A very shiny varnish usually is used on low-grade furniture. It will show scratches readily and should be avoided.

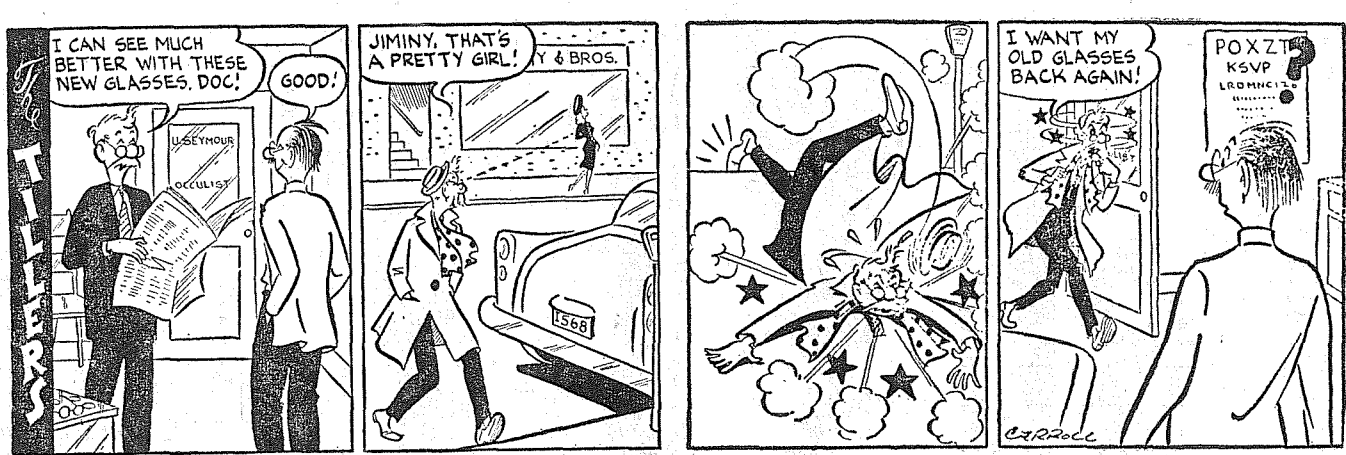
Finishes can penetrate or stay in the surface, be transparent and colorless, or opaque or semi-opaque. They can vary from dullmat to high gloss. You can run your fingers over the surface to detect flaws in the finish. A grain-like feeling, noticeable unevenness, scratches, and unevenly applied varnish imply inferior workmanship.

Today most people prefer wood in its natural color. A medium brown finish and lighter colors are being used a great deal. These finishes are generally of lacquer, although they may be oil with wax, oil finished with lacquer, or a penetrating seal. Paint and pigmented lacquer finishes are often used on French Provincial and Oriental furniture.

mill levy to help operate the Bethel schools. This millage, rated as vital to the continued operation of the Bethel schools by both the school board and the administration, will be collected in the spring of 1960 for use in operating the schools beginning next fall.

If the voters reject this millage, according to Lamka, the Bethel schools will have to reduce both supplies and teachers, even though the school population is expected to increase by at least 245 students by next fall. In the special November election, a minority of the Bethel voters refused to approve this millage and bond issue; but the majority lacked the necessary 60 per cent to approve the measures.

Forestry practices in the Pacific Northwest will be patterned more and more like those in Europe after the region moves from virgin to a second-growth cycle. J. R. Dilworth, head of the forest management department at the school of Forestry, Oregon State College, told the state convention of the Izaak Walton League of America, in Eugene, Oregon.

He said a recent tour he made of the forests of Scandinavia and Germany convinced him that: All lands will have to produce or be in reproduction when the mature timber is harvested in the next half century. "There will be no idle lands," he said.

New techniques of reproduction will be developed. "We'll have to learn a lot more about forest genetics," he said, "and we will change over to the concept of having more and better trees."

There will be intensive cultivation and other cultural methods. He reported that German forests are tilled and planted much like an American apple orchard, and added: "We will find ourselves thinning our forest areas on an eight-to-ten-year basis." Equipment will be changed. "It will be smaller and more flexible and we'll find our-

selves using horses again."

Shavings, splinters, and other wood residue are being turned into a valuable asset by a thriving industry of comparatively recent vintage—particle board manufacturing.

Particle board, which is finding increasing use, is fabricated by combining the residue from various operations involving the use of wood with adhesive and then converting the mixture into panel form under pressure and heat. It is used principally for furniture and such building items as floor, underlayment, panelling, and doors. Because of the research being done in this field, however, particle board is expected to be utilized more in residential construction.

A study by the Forest Products Division of the Bureau and Defense Services Administration, U. S. Department of Commerce, shows 46 particle board manufacturers in operation in 19 states. Production for 1957 was 182,884,000 square feet. This included 144,451,000 square feet of plate-type board from 28 manufacturers and 38,443,000 square feet of extruded board from 18 manufacturers.

The foreign output is running well ahead of domestic figures, for while production when the industry was getting under way in 1950-52 was confined to North America and Europe, particle board is being produced now in the Union of South Africa, Latin America, Far East, Near East, and Oceania. Europe, however, has had the greatest increase in production.

Particle board plants are broken down by states as follows. New Hampshire 1, New York 1, Kentucky 1, Pennsylvania 2, Virginia 3, Mississippi 2, North Carolina 10,

Tree planting failures on adverse sites can be reduced by planting older tree stock. This is particularly true for areas of heavy fern growth or droughty sites.

A research study of two year old stock versus three year old stock showed a higher survival percentage for the older stock. On the difficult planting site used, the first season showed a 37 per cent survival for two year old planting stock against 60 per cent survival for the three year old planting stock. The study made at the U.S. Forest Service Willamette Research Center in Oregon, confirms local experience with older tree planting stock.

Otto and Henry Moebius of Graham, are ardent tree planters. They experienced failures with two year old stock in heavy Bracken Fern growth. To improve planting survival, they planted the two year old stock in the garden for 2 years and then planted the four year old stock two years later. Needless to say, survival and vigor were immeasurably improved. The extra effort in planting older stock was well worth it, according to the Moebius' brothers.



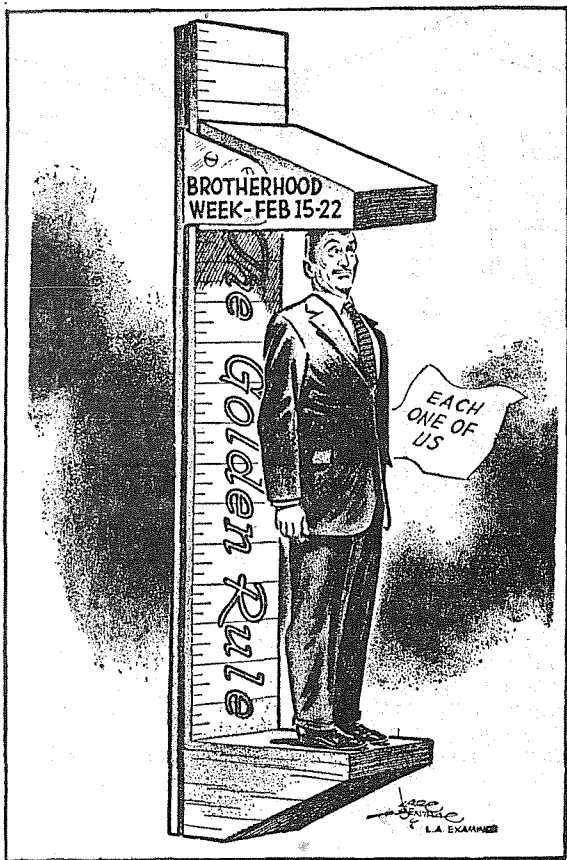

How much does it cost to feed your family? That question can be accurately answered only by considering two kinds of "spending." One is money. The other is time.

A booklet prepared by the editorial staff of "Everywoman's Family Circle" in co-operation with the National Association of Food Chains tells an interesting story. According to government figures, home prepared meals for a family of four for one day average \$4.90 in cost and takes 5.5 hours of the housewife's time. Partly prepared meals cost \$5.80 and takes 3.1 hours of time. And ready to serve meals cost \$6.70 and requires 1.6 hours of time.

In other words, if the housewife does all her own preparing, the meals will cost about a third less than if she uses the ready to serve types. But she will have to devote well over three times as many hours to the cooking task.

What it comes down to, as the booklet puts it, is "how much is your time worth?" The tremendous increase in demand for partly and wholly prepared foods indicates that great numbers of housewives put high value on their time. Take my wife for instance. She really must put a high value on her time. If she ever loses the can opener the kids and I will starve for sure.

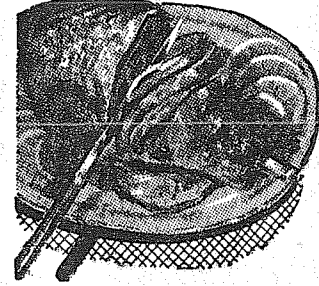

### Franklin Pierce Urges Bond Vote At Mar. 10 Ballot

Passage of the March 10 Bond issue will probably result in a new elementary school for the Franklin Pierce school system, according to Hal Evans, administrative assistant. The District will be asking for the right to issue \$250,000 in general obligation bonds in order to qualify for state matching funds.

Passage of the bond proposition, which appears second on the ballot to the 20-mill excess tax levy, will bring the district up to 10 percent bonded indebtedness. This is the main requirement for the right to receive state matching funds.

Evans emphasized the importance of state aid with the revelation that 76 per cent of the cost of five new buildings and six additions since consolidation has been paid by the state with an assist also from the federal government. The aid has resulted in the ability of the local district to meet the tremendous enrollment increases in the past 10 years.

Location of the new elementary school is still not known since population figures and enrollment projections must be studied this spring before a decision can be reached. The survey will be made in event that the proposition passes.

The next school year will find the Morris E. Ford Junior High with nearly 150 more students than its capacity. There will also be an additional increase of 350-400 students elsewhere in the Pierce system. Besides the new elementary needed, it is readily apparent that a second junior high will be a necessity.

Evans said that the second junior high will be required in the next two-year period which will probably mean another bond issue next year. He emphasized that the March 10 bond proposition will not cover both the elementary and a junior high. Enrollment increases are expected to continue at a 5 percent clip in the future.

Evans reminded community people that the State Board of Education limits the size and capacity of all schools. With their limits set for certain enrollment figures we must comply and cannot build larger schools as some people suggest.

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
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
