



Special Delivery—Maybe

Considerable perplexity has arisen in Parkland in regard to special delivery mail received at the Parkland post office. The Pointer put the "bee" on Acting Postmaster Elmer Beard the other day and his reply was this:

"I have tried to get a clear-cut ruling on the matter from several different postal officials, but the postal rules appear to conflict in regard to handling special delivery matter at a post office where there is no regular delivery service. The department has ruled that when mail is placed in a post office box it is considered delivered. Yet the official postal guide says that special delivery mail should be delivered within a radius of one mile from the office. However, in an effort to get the matter cleared up, I have written to the First Assistant Postmaster General in Washington, D. C., for a definite 'yes or no.' In the meantime the employees have been instructed to make every effort to contact addressees of special delivery mail by telephone as soon as possible after such mail is received in the office.

Modern Store Front

Parklandites have been watching the latest construction on the Gratiot Building with some interest as the modern store fronts, designed by Mel Pedersen, begin to take shape with the plate glass windows being installed this week.

Construction of the \$100,000 building, named "Parkland Centre," is nearing completion with the grand opening set for May. Many of the stores, however, will move in within the next two weeks. Among these are the Parkland Men's Shop, Parkland Radio Shop, and Myrtle Mockel's Dress Shop. Other stores which will be housed in the new building include a drug store, a donut shop, a leather goods store, a beauty shop, a flower shop and a cleaning establishment.

The building, designed by its owner, Frank Gratiot, except for the store fronts, is a two-story structure of Roman brick veneer. It includes five offices and 20 apartments in addition to the stores. Two eight-inch masonry fire walls cut the building into three sections. All walls between the stores and apartments will be sound-proofed, according to Mr. Gratiot.

EARLY PIONEERS TO BE HONORED

CHAPIN FOSTER WILL SPEAK AT METHODIST CHURCH PALM SUNDAY

Church pioneers of Parkland will be honored Palm Sunday at the Parkland Methodist Church.

Chapin Foster, District Lay Leader of the Methodist Church, will give the sermon. Foster is president of the Washington State Historical Society and curator of the State Historical Museum in Tacoma.

Mrs. Mary Wilson will give a picture of her father, William Wilson, a pioneer of this section, to the Parkland church at this service.

Pioneer Born in Canada

Wilson, born in eastern Canada in 1836 of Scottish parents, came to Washington in January 1877 when it was still only a territory. He bought 200 acres of land, part of the old Tolentyre Donation Claim, from Peter Smith.

Wherever Wilson went in those pioneer days the first thing he did was to move for the establishing of a school and church. He plotted and sold land for the Pacific Lutheran College and gave the land for the Parkland public school and the Parkland Methodist Episcopal Church.

He helped build the church during the ministry of Rev. Horace Williston in 1899. Wilson also helped organize the Sunday school at Fern Hill in the early 80's.

Merchant Patrolman Al Monta Arrests Burglary Suspects

Five young men ranging in ages from 18 to 20 were picked up by Merchant Patrolman Al Monta near the Tipperary Tavern in Parkland and turned over to the Pierce county sheriff's office last week.

Monta picked them up as he suspected them of breaking into cars and stealing articles from them. They are now being held on 12 charges of burglary, many of which were in the South End. Several of the boys had been arrested previously on other burglary charges. The trial comes up in a few days.



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

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
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
