RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Deviled Beef Patties
Broadcast: December 9, 1950

1 lb. ground beef 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 cup Pet Milk 1/2 teaspoon pepper
7 tablespoons chili sauce 3 tablespoons grated American cheese
1/2 cup rolled oats 1 teaspoon salt

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350°). Mix well the beef, milk, chili sauce, oats, salt, dry mustard and pepper. Shape into 8 oblong patties. With back of teaspoon, press a hollow in each. Put into greased shallow baking pan. Bake 30 min. Put equal amounts of 3 tablesp. chili sauce into hollows. Arrange cheese on top. Bake 15 min. longer, or until cheese melts. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

CITY MANAGER PLAN DISCUSSED

(Continued from Last Week)

and ordinance is another example of why Puyallup needs a complete change to Council-Manager plan.

I do not insinuate that Puyallup does not need compulsory garbage service, but that why purchase a modern garbage truck for around \$7,000 and then park it over at the city shops and award a contract to a private company for collecting the garbage and the city is the fall guy for collecting the money. The city pays the collector of Garbage each month for each house, apartment, farm, restaurant or hotel, whether the person served pays the city or

not. As a result of this method of collections the city garbage department is in the red around \$6,000. Of course, this might be collected by placing liens against the property of those people served or not served by the collector of garbage.

So why not go modern with some 2,000 other cities who have adopted the manager plan, and take politics out of our local government.

Why does Puyallup need a change of City Government?

Because our past city administrations did not look to the future needs in their planning or I might say, lack of planning.

Our streets are still in a very bad condition with very little surface drainage. Only about one-third of the city is served by a sanitary sewer. About half of our streets are only 30 feet wide and some are still one way country roads.

The City of Puyallup did not have an Engineer to look after their interests during two-thirds of the construction of the new south, west and east sewer system. This was let out to an outside firm of Engineers and today the sewer system is faulty and there is a law suit against the city for failure of acceptance.

The paving of West Pioneer was to my estimation a lack of future planning. Paved one fall and then torn up the following spring to lay a sewer.

The Garbage contract being awarded to a contract hauler instead of setting up a Municipal Department to serve the Com-

munity, especially after purchasing a new Garbage truck for around \$7,000, then storing it in the city yards on the river road, and the last I knew about it, it was still there.

This lack of planning and inexperience of running a city can be changed into a business like method by putting in a Manager who has had past experience in running cities. Lets take Politics out of the actual management of the City of Puyallup by voting for the Council-Manager Plan.

The voters must remember that if the Council-Manager Plan carries on the ballot, then we start all over and elect 7 new councilmen. The ones who are in office now, including the present Mayor are automatically out of office. If they choose to run for councilman they may do so but have to be elected by a majority of the voters at the Spring election.

The seven new councilmen in turn will choose a Mayor from the seven. He presides over the council and to act in emergencies, to interperet to the voters the work of the city and to take the spotlight at official functions.

The Council shapes the policies, adopts the budgets, and appoints the Manager.

The Manager does the hiring and firing of city employees, makes up the budget, brings in the needs of each department to the council for their purchase.

The council members do not interfere with the Manager and his appointees unless they find that he is not doing the job as it should have been. Then they

have the recourse of giving him 30 days notice that his job is terminated.
