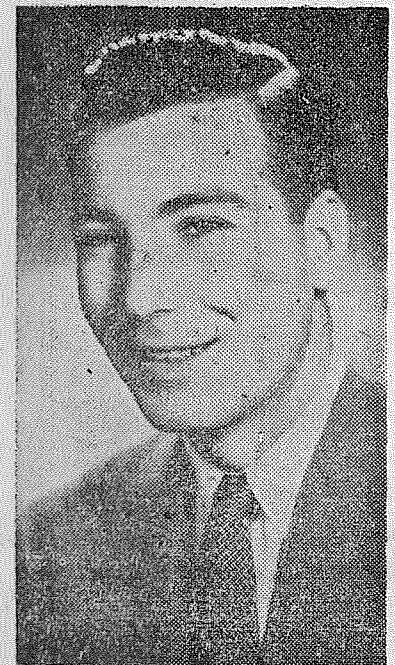

The officer laughed, "Want to be a star?"


"No, I'm lost," Jimmy informed him.



GOP Club to Meet



1 pkg. butterscotch pudding powder 1/2 cup Pet Milk 1 tablespoon butter 1 cup sugar 1 1/2 cups broken nuts

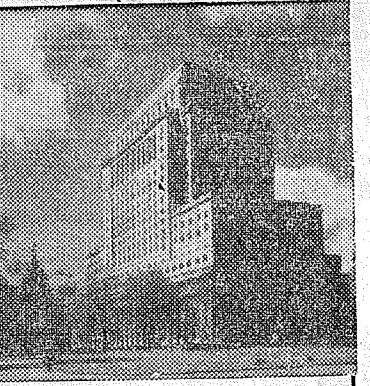

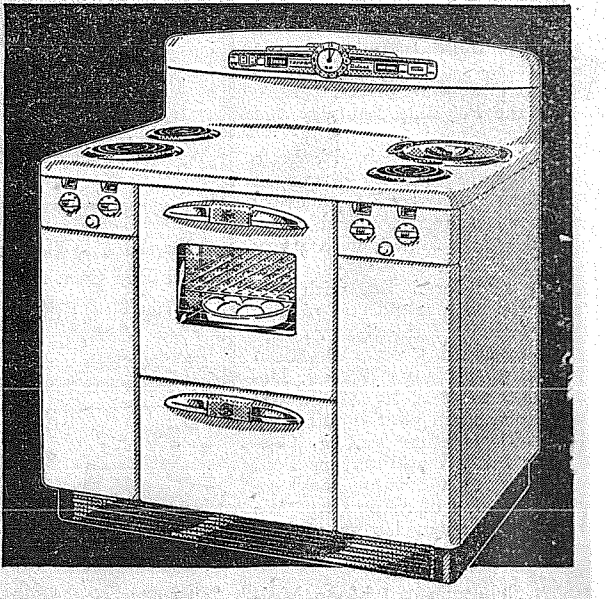

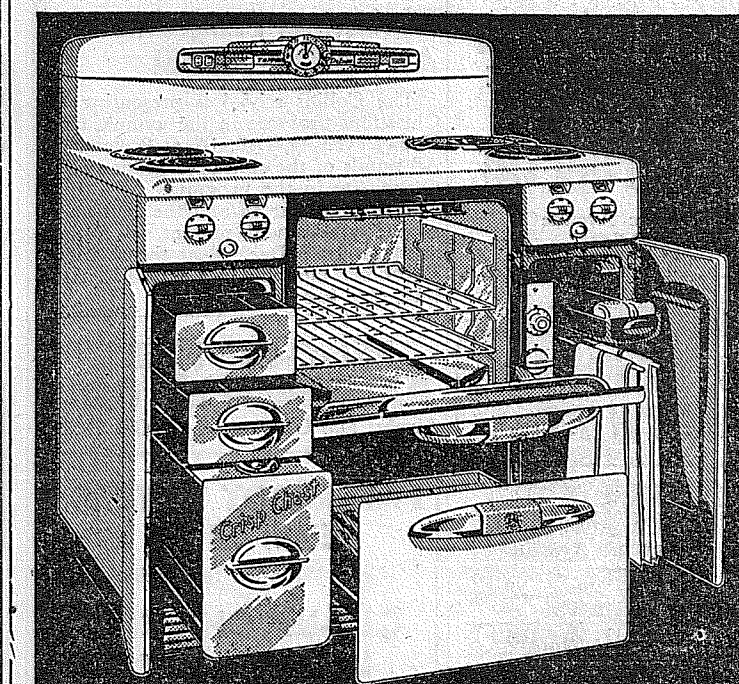

Hill Station, which is only a mile from here to start with. The paper is then sorted, being placed into sorting slots, then sacked and taken by rural carrier on the routes, some of which are in Parkland. Really is a complicated affair when it could simply be picked up in Parkland and taken by the carriers to the routes direct . . . it is typical of the red tape process developed through years of inexperienced management.

To get back to this business of addressing each one separately, even though every person on a given route receives a paper, therefore making the addressing of individual ones absolutely silly and ridiculous. All the carrier has to do at present is place one in each box without regard or trouble of sorting through a thousand to find the correct address. With the new ruling in effect, it will be necessary for each carrier to sort nearly a thousand papers to make sure each one gets in the designated box. This ruling applies to several of the routes; others are not affected.

I thought it would be a nice thing to mention to our readers, so they could see just a few of the problems we face each week in getting out a community newspaper. We in no way blame the carrier . . . we feel that he is doing as his little black book says he must.

Efficiency in governmental affairs seem to be something to be avoided rather than encouraged.

Parkland Delivery
Last year The Parkland Times came out with the suggestion that all the clubs and individuals of the area rally to the effort and proposition of getting the rural routes of the area to emanate from Parkland, thus saving a considerable amount of time and effort on the part of the Post Office Department.

Petitions were given the local postmaster from various service clubs and organizations of the area requesting that efforts be made to get such service in the area; however, the project evidently died for lack of effort or was otherwise sidetracked.

Now, more than ever, it is evident that if we are to maintain our identity as Parkland we must get local mail delivery for ourselves. Even now the mail delivery from Tacoma is being carried right to the door of the Parkland Post Office. It is absolutely ridiculous to have mail delivered within a block of our own Post Office under a Tacoma route when either a mounted or foot carrier could deliver
