MRS. STANLEY ROSSO IS AGAIN CHAIRMAN FOR SOUTH END

This week marks the opening of the 40th Annual Sale of Christmas Seals in this county. Already some 55,000 seal letters have been received by residents of Pierce county, 816 of them in this community alone.

The recent war has made some inroads on the progress we had made in the fight against tuberculosis. Now that we have a clear road ahead for us, the Tuberculosis League is in a position to carry on the fight to the finish, or until there are no more cases of this dread disease left in the county.

**Portable X-ray**  
The League is particularly fortunate in having more weapons with which to carry on. One is the delivery soon of the portable x-ray machine with which we can take chest photographs of all the residents of the county. By this method we will be able to find a number of cases of tuberculosis in the early stages, cases that can be cured.

**Seals Finance Work**  
The purchase of Christmas Seals by the residents of the county is the only method whereby funds to carry on this work are raised, and Mrs. Stanley Rosso, who is chairman of the Seal Sale in this community, asks that all recipients of the Seals send in money for them as soon as possible.

"There is a challenge to every red blooded member of this community to carry the fight through to the finish, and we must not let down now that the war is over," Mrs. J. W. Kalkus, county Seal Sale chairman, said. "With the new weapons we have at our command we shall all redouble our efforts to make Pierce county an unsafe place for tuberculosis germs."

## HEART DISEASE DEATHS HIGH

Figures From Washington Health Department Show Cancer Second

With a toll of 6,661 victims, diseases of the heart topped the ten leading causes of death in the State last year, according to Dr. Arthur L. Ringle, State Director of Health.

Cancer and other malignant tumors laid claim to second place in the State tabulation, with 2,692 victims. The origin of cancer is unknown, but most cases are curable if treated in the early stages. Dr. Ringle emphasized that "middle-aged people particularly should have regular physical examinations as a means of combating this disease."

Deaths due to cerebrovascular accidents, such as blood clots in the brain, took third place with a total of 1,856 lives. Fourth leader in death causes was kidney disorders with 1,107 victims.

**Pneumonia Fifth**  
Pneumonia, in fifth place, claimed 844 lives. Tuberculosis was next in line with 667 victims. Pneumonia and tuberculosis are "two of the most fatal communicable diseases," Dr. Ringle said, and can be caught from an infected person. The common cold and influenza often clear the way for an attack of pneumonia. Immunization against colds and the "flu" was suggested by Dr. Ringle as a precaution, while yearly chest X-rays will detect early signs of tuberculosis.

Motor vehicle accidents, holding seventh place among leading death causes, took the lives of 537 victims last year. The figures show that "motorists are still playing the role of 'death at the wheel,'" Dr. Ringle declared. Automobile accidents will not be reduced until drivers and pedestrians watch carefully, think carefully and drive carefully, he said.

**Diabetes Eighth**  
Diabetes placed eighth among leading death causes with a total of 463 lives; hardening of the arteries placed ninth with 431 victims; and suicides, tenth among leading causes, brought death to 290 persons.

"While these ten leading causes of death point out that more people died in Washington in 1945 from degenerative diseases than from communicable diseases," Dr. Ringle said, "our health battle must be waged against both if the total fo deaths in the State is to be reduced."

## 4-H CLUBBERS WIN IN SEATTLE

FOUR PIERCE COUNTY MEMBERS GET AWARDS IN DEMONSTRATIONS

With a gift of a quiet touch and persuasive tone that can soothe the nerves of a turkey, Sherman Snypp, of Kitsap county, won first place in the state 4-H agricultural demonstrations at the First Washington Junior Poultry Exposition, Seattle, November 1-3.

Sherman demonstrated how to handle the heavy, jittery bird—pick it up, hold it, carry it, examine it—and still not arouse its temper. More than 125 club members took part in the agricultural and home economics demonstrations and judging contests. The events were held at the Puget Sound Power and Light company demonstration kitchen and the Washington Co-operative Farmers plant, both in Seattle.

**First Place**  
First place in the home economics demonstrations was won by Lois Brainard, of King county, who showed how to prepare a chicken for the freezer locker.

In the agricultural demonstrations, second and third place winners were Marjorie Bastin, of Pierce county, culling chickens; and Doris Aldridge, Clark, cutting and wrapping chicken.

The second and third place winners in the home economics demonstrations were Lois Verne Irish, Pierce county; and Marrieta Hora, Grays Harbor. These girls showed how to prepare chicken for the locker.
