

Portable X-ray

The League is particularly fortunate in having more weapons with which to carry on. One is the delivery soon of the portable x-ray machine with which we can take chest photographs of all the residents of the county. By this method we will be able to find a number of cases of tuberculosis in the early stages, cases that can be cured.

We have also the assurance, now that the November elections are over, that the county will have an adequate sanatorium with which to handle all the cases as are found. These two facts mean tion which cannot be bought thru that we can carry on the fight into local taxes from fire protection every corner of the county and district No. 4. that we can eventually eliminate tuberculosis here.


