It Can Be Dangerous

The Parkland fire truck, answering a call at McChord field this week, inspected three brush fires on the return trip, and found two of the three burning without permits.

Commissioner E. W. Beitz pointed out that the entire community is endangered when residents light fires without obtaining permission. Only by keeping a record of where fires are burning is it possible to have an accurate check, so that equipment can be sent to the scene in case of danger.

Another factor that is apparently ignored by careless residents is the fact they can be sued for damage to a neighbor's property when a fire gets out of control. They are also subject

bility for keeping a fire within safety bounds, but does assure cooperation from fire officials and enable them to check locations so that the entire community will not be endangered by carelessness.

Parkland, with its highly inflamable scotch broom, which is colorful but extremely vulnerable in dry weather, is in a more precarious predicament than many other communities in this area. It is necessary for residents here and in Spanaway to take greater caution on this account.

Damage from fires here has been severe in the past. Beautiful homes have been reduced to ashes because of carelessness and all so unnecessary! It's a simple matter to obtain a permit. Just contact Glenn Neal, Parkland's fire warden, who can be located at the post office. He will inspect your property and issue a permit which will list the hours when it is safe to burn.


