Dr. Emil Lengyel To Speak at PLC
Emil Lengyel, feature writer and foreign correspondent for the New York Times since 1927, will speak to students of Pacific Lutheran College, March 1, after his appearance before the Tacoma World Affairs Council, February 28.
Dr. Lengyel, Budapest-born and educated journalist, has been correspondent for Hungarian German, French and English newspapers and has organized a new European news service.
After serving six months as an officer in the Austro-Hungarian army at the beginning of the war, Dr. Lengyel was taken prisoner on the Russian front and transported to a Siberian prison. His book, "Cattle Car Express," was based on this experience, which turned his hair white.
Dr. Lengyel decided to make his permanent home in the United States, after coming to this country in 1921 as a correspondent sent to cover the Washington Disarmament Conference. In 1927 he became an American citizen. He has taught history and economics at Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute and is now assistant professor at New York University.

NEW COURSE IN PLUMBING

Former Navy Training Shops Available for Course at New School

Enthusiastic acceptance of the technical school section of Farragut College and Technical Institute, Farragut, Idaho, has led to the establishment of an additional course in plumbing and steam fitting to start February 1, according to an announcement today by George W. Sigg, trade school supervisor.

"We have the same fine shop which just a short time ago was used in the training of shipfitters for the navy. This equipment, with any necessary modifications, will now be turned to training plumbers and steamfitters to help fill the present labor shortages in this field.

"We have been pleased to note that the desires of the incoming students for technical education have coincided to a large degree with labor market conditions in the states in which they will eventually reside. This, combined with our testing program which assures the student will enter fields in which he has aptitudes and preferences, should make him a well-adjusted, happy worker," Mr. Sigg said.

Washington state motorists were reminded by State Patrol Chief H. W. Algeo today that Certificates of Registration are issued with 1947 license plates at Auditor's offices and that this certificate must be retained by automobile owners.

Gives Tips on Safe Use of Electricity

Electricity is one of the farmer's greatest labor savers, but many forget how much power is packed into electric wires. Electricity can bring happiness or it can bring sorrow; how it is used tells the story, says R. N. Miller, extension engineer, State College of Washington.

The first step in electrical safety is an approved wiring job. All wiring should be inspected by a qualified electrical inspector. Safe operation and maintenance of a correctly installed system is the second step in electrical safety, according to the National Safety Council.

A fuse is the safety valve of your farmstead electrical system. If one blows out, there is something wrong, too much load on the circuit, a wiring fault or short circuit. Locate the trouble before inserting a new fuse, and then be sure to use the size fuse that is recommended by the wiring inspector—usually a 15-amp fuse for No. 14 wire and a 20-amp fuse for No. 12 wire, says Miller.

Before using electrical equipment, make sure that hands and feet are dry, and that you aren't standing on a damp spot. Keep the equipment away from moisture.

Don'ts

Here are some other electrical don'ts:

- Don't use more than one piece of portable equipment on one outlet.
- Don't use metal sockets in farmstead wiring, use porcelain or other approved non-metallic ones.
- Don't use pull-chain switches.
- Don't overload your motors.
- Don't let the braid or insulation on wires get frayed; make repairs or replace cords at the first sign of danger.
- Don't tamper with permanent wiring unless you have first cut off the current at the fuse box or master switch.
- Beware of the high voltage power line, don't touch them or allow any high equipment, loose wire or other item to contact them.
- Never use electric wiring or equipment for playful experimenting or practical joking, or home-made electric fencing.

"Out of the heart are the issues of life," so how expect clean living when the heart is fed on such filth?—The Journalman.

HIWAY DEATHS SHOW DECLINE

State Patrol Declares Improvement Is Noted In Accident Record

Definite improvements over 1945 was shown in the traffic accident report for the State of Washington for 1946 just released by the Washington State Patrol. According to the patrol, 582 deaths were attributed to traffic accidents during 1946. During 1945, 583 traffic fatalities were recorded. Highway Department traffic counting devices show an increase of 50 per cent in miles traveled this year over last year, so the death rate per million miles traveled shows a sharp decline.

Patrol authorities said there were no traffic deaths during, what they termed, the sanest New Year celebration since the Patrol has been keeping accident records.

According to Patrol Chief H. W. Algeo, Washington's 1946 driving record is particularly encouraging in view of a 50 per cent rise in highway deaths in the nation as a whole. He urged Washington motorists to use added caution and good judgment as the best means of establishing an even better record in 1947.

Algeo credited the press with a definite part in the traffic death by presenting to the public safe driving facts.
