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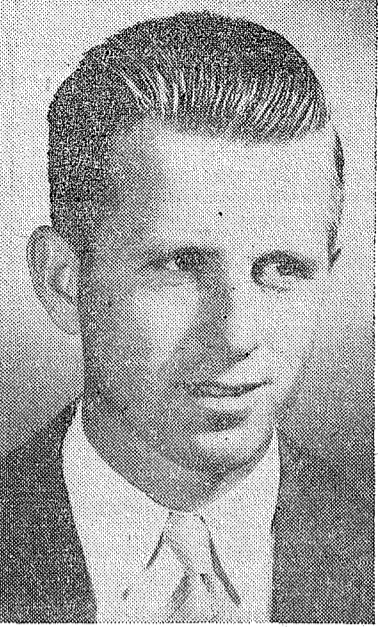

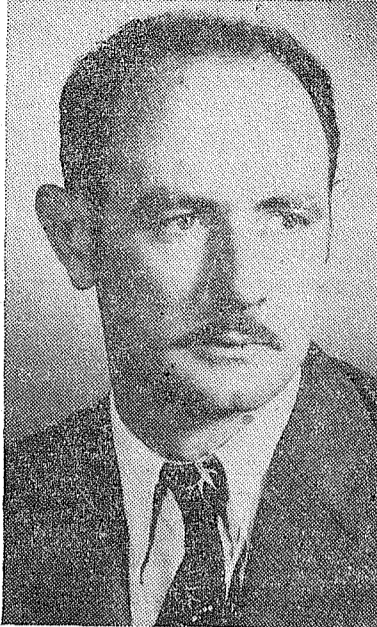

First fares on the bus were paid by Mrs. C. E. Gaiser of 163rd St., Spanaway, who was accompanied by her two children, Sandra Gaiser and Floyd Coons. They were on their way to Tacoma and transferred at 96th street to the Tacoma Transit Co. Larchmont car.

It was not until the B-Line bus arrived back in Parkland that business began to pick up. Roger McDonald, president of the Parkland Business club, boarded the bus carrying a gorgeous bouquet as a message of congratulation to the new company. Other Parkland business people who joined the party at this point included Malcolm Soine of Soine's Parkland Shoe store, Mrs. Wesley McKeven of McKewen Studio, Del Totten of Totten Realty, accompanied by his two children, Earl and Lois, Del Cheney of the Parkland Cycle shop, J. C. Howard of the Parkland Barber shop, and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Loring. With Mr. Totten was his cousin, Chief Petty Officer William Totten of Yakima, who is in the Navy and stationed at Memphis, Tenn., and vacationing here. Mrs. J. C. When the bus reached the Parkland National Bank of Washington at 96th and Pacific all passengers alighted to share the welcoming celebration during which another beautiful bouquet was presented to the bus company by Art Swindland, manager of the bank.

Although bus schedules are available at Parkland stores and from the drivers of the buses, there is some misunderstanding as to the routes. The buses travel from the Parkland post office to 96th and Pacific avenue by five routes, as follows:

- 1—Via 120th, L St., 116th, Eye, Sales Road, Broadway, Airport and A St.
- 2—Via 120th, L St., 116th, Ainsworth, Sheridan and across 96th.
- 3—Via 120th, L St., 116th, Eye, Sales Road and Croft.
- 4—Via C St., Airport Road and A St.
- 5—Via C St., Broadway, Sales Road and Croft.

From 96th and Pacific to Parkland on the reverse of these five routes.

From the Parkland post office to Spanaway via Park Ave., 138th St., Spanaway Loop Road, Rich Road and Park Ave.; return the same way.

The schedule is timed so that there is direct connection at 96th St. to and from Tacoma. These routes are all indicated on the time schedules which may be obtained from bus drivers or local merchants.

Political leaders, newspaper columnists and top ranking radio and T.V. commentators agree that it was this fight to seat the "Tucker" group from Georgia, after both the national committee and the credentials committee had approved the "Foster" delegation favorable to Taft, that started the swing to "Ike" and eventually led to his nomination on the first ballot.

Wearing his new-won laurels lightly, Senator Eastvold returned to Parkland from the Chicago Republican convention on Monday of last week. After taking "time out" to catch up on his law office practice, Don is ready to tackle his second battle of the year as Republican standard bearer in the fight for the office of state attorney general. Don's national convention victory has led many local political observers to predict a similar success when he meets his Democratic opponent at the polls in November.

Those who saw Senator Eastvold in action at Chicago agree that here is a young man who can write his own ticket in either Washington State or Washington, D. C., political circles.

REV. ERNEST STEEN WRITES OF VISIT TO ATHENS

The following interesting letter was received recently from the Rev. Ernest B. Steen, pastor of Trinity Lutheran church, Parkland, who is enjoying a trip abroad this summer. He writes from Athens, Greece.
"Athens is a fascinating place for the traveler who is interested in ancient history, both secular and religious. A three-day visit about this capital city of the Greeks has made your correspondent relive some of past Greek history.
"Since there is too much to relate in a short article, I'll tell something about the famous historic spot in Athens called the Acropolis. The Acropolis, which means "a citadel," was a great fortress in the past. It was a natural fortress as it is a great rock dome rising in the center of the city. Sheer stone walls were built about the dome to make it still more formidable.
"Several temples, made of marble, were constructed on the very top of the dome, overlooking the city. The most impressive and historic of these temples is the Parthenon, which was built over four centuries before Christ. It remains a mystery how the ancients were able to move these great marble pillars and connecting marble beams to the top of the fortress and then to erect a temple which would probably be nearly intact today except for an explosion which resulted when the Turks at one time stored powder in it.
"I was impressed by nearby Mars Hill where the apostle Paul preached his famous sermon. (Acts 17:22-31). Impressive also were many other places which were visible from the commanding height of the Acropolis.
"In the evening, after the day's tour was over, I was eating dinner on the outdoor balcony of my hotel. The most impressive scene from there was the Acropolis. I wonder if the waiters saw that I was eating like a dreamer, reliving the historic past of Athens?"
In a personal postscript, Rev. Steen gives a little more news, written from Beirut. "I'm having a wonderful time. The weather is fine. My hotel in Beirut fronts on the Mediterranean sea. The view is splendid. The breeze across the water is refreshing. I may trouble you with another letter from Jerusalem."

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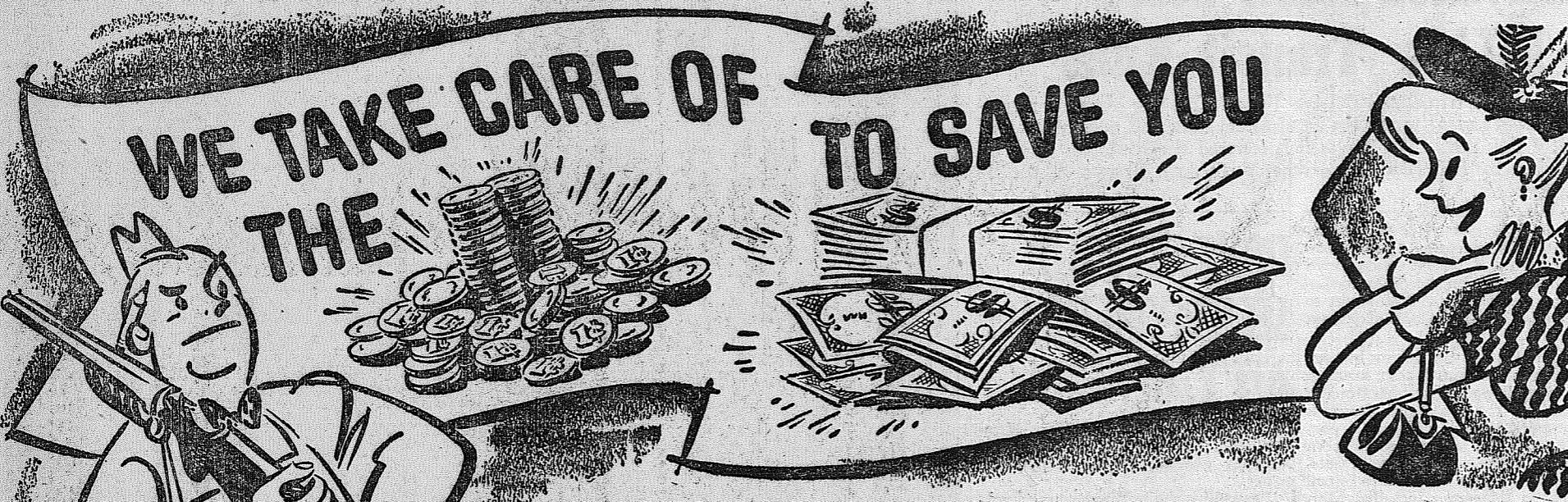


Got back from a few days of taking life easy . . . digging clams, catching a few fish. Sure had fun.


Open House Marks Silver Wedding

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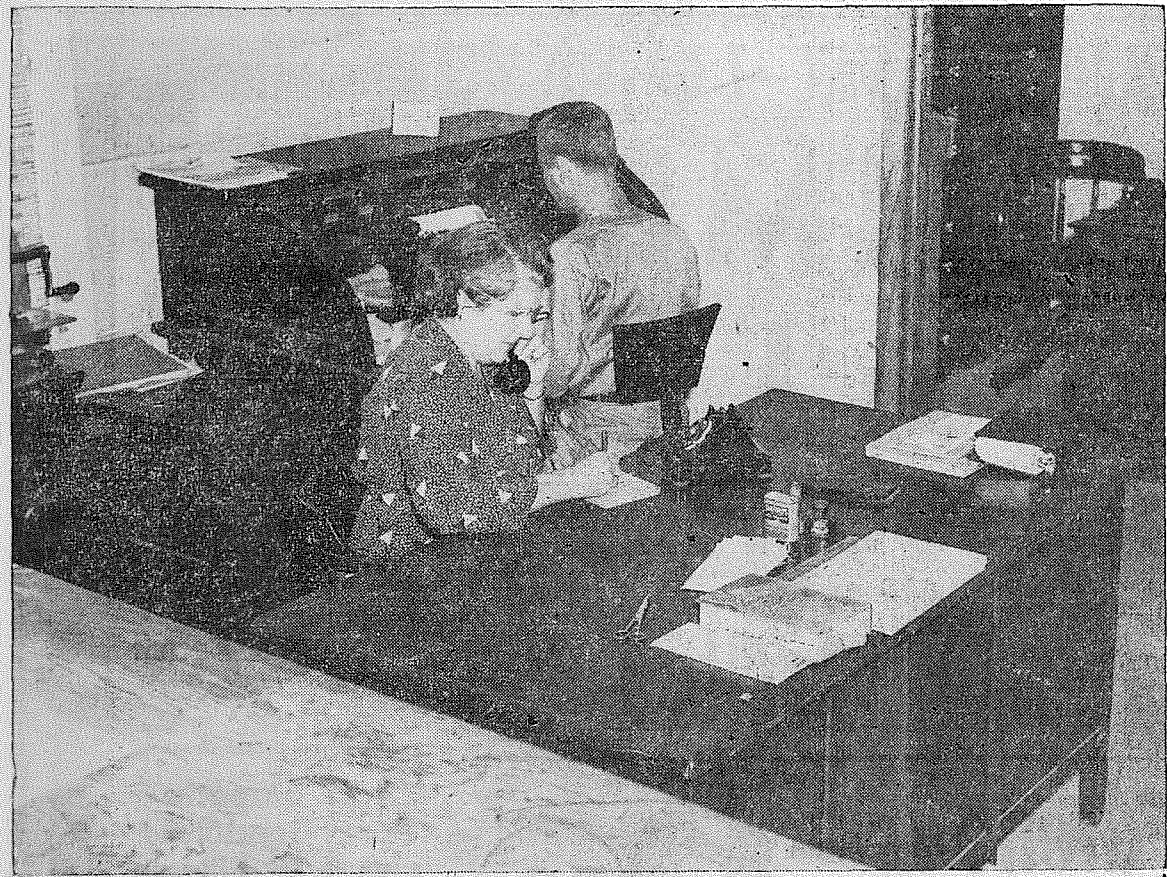
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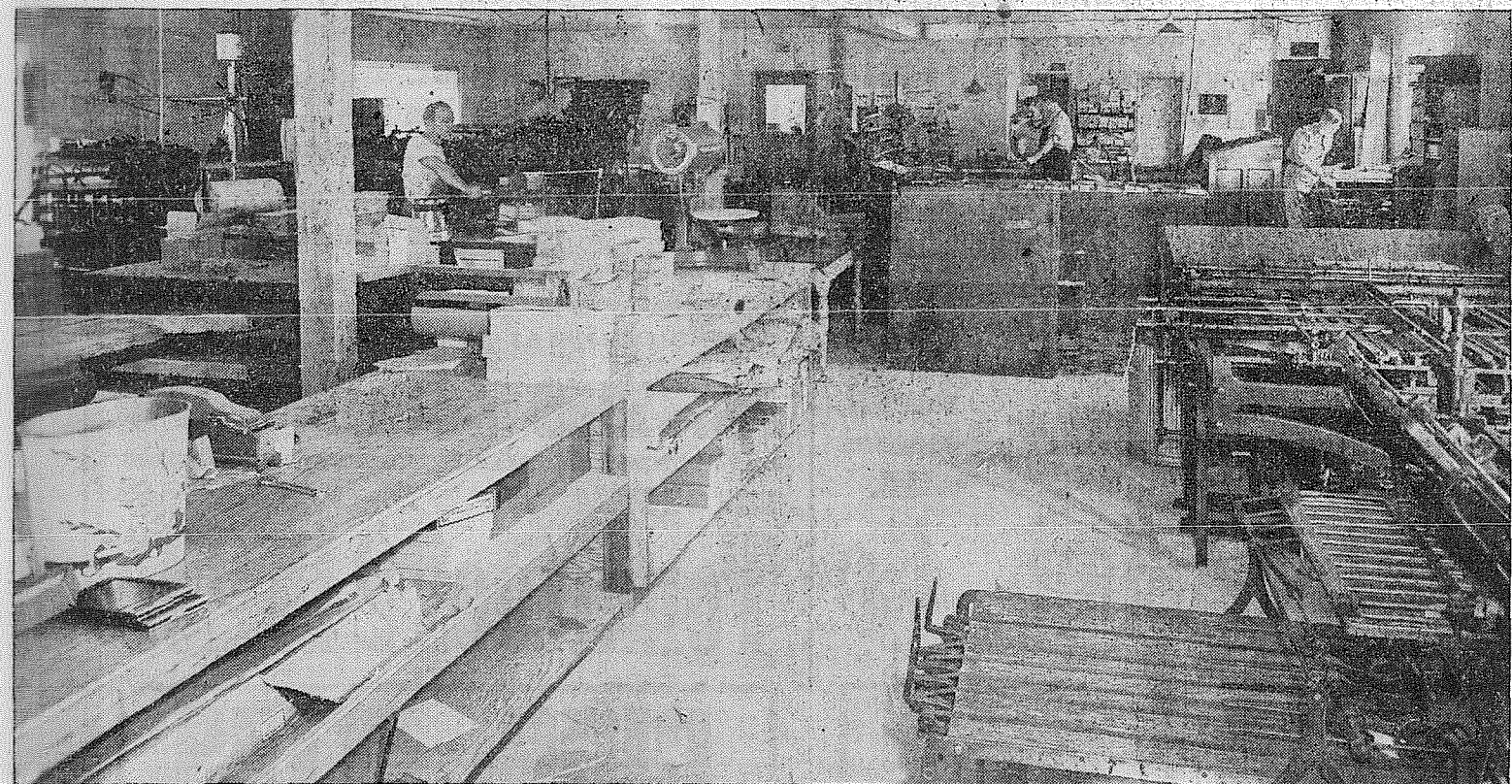

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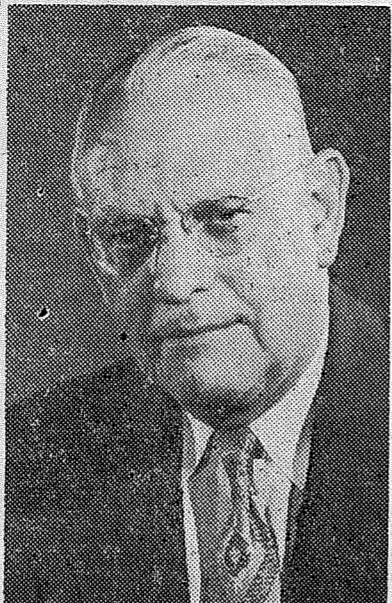
