Creston, Iowa - 7/23/57 - Four boys, two of them members of the Ground Observer Corps said they saw a UFO. They watched the object, which they described as a ball of whitish-orange light, at three different times. The boys were camping out, when they saw the object the first time about 11:15 p.m. The boys said the object they saw appeared similar to one which the Canadian Ground Observer Corps has been tracking for the last month. The Canadian report from Toronto said the Canadian GOC has orders to keep a close watch on the mysterious object which it has been observing for a month. Herb Harrison, a Canadian GOC Chief Observer, said 'It's like a little ball of fire. It keeps shifting from north to east to west to south. We have no idea what it is.

Trenton, J. J. - 10/2/56 - A Trenton night watchman reported he saw a large wingless object swoop down to hover over the Delaware River. It gave off a bad odor and flew away. Harry J. Strudevent said he was in the trailer-office of his contracting employer when the glowing object, which he described about 100 feet long, came into view. He told police the UFO came down and flew away so suddenly he was unable to get a complete description. He said it had no wings, shot fire from the rear and hissed.

Chicago, Ill. - 8/1/57 - Unofficial flying disc investigators report that an Air Force, jet chased a big and speedy "circular flying object" in the Far East last December. They said the jet got within five miles of the object before it flew off at a speed between 1,800 and 2,160 miles per hour. The report was made by the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena in its monthly magazine, "UFO Investigator." The Air Force had no immediate comment. The NICAP said a "Far East Air Force office" had advised that an unidentified jet pilot picked up the "UFO" as a strange "blip" on his radar screen, and started persuit at more than 800 miles per hour. "At 8 miles range," it quoted the Far East report, "a large round object appeared directly ahead. By this time ,the jet's radar was in "lock-on" position, automatically guiding the jet toward the UFO. A moment later, the radar was jammed by a strong interference. Using antijam procedure, the pilot switched frequency. For ten seconds this eliminated the mysterious interference pulses, then they came again on the new frequency. But they were not strong enough to break the radar lockon and the jet held its course. The jet closed to within 5 nautical miles of the object and could not close further." The NICAP said the pilot reported that the object was a golden-tan in color and had the appearance of being circular on the bottom. It quoted him as saying it made a shallow left turn, then moved up and away at an estimated speed of between 1,800 and 2,160 miles an hour.

Salt Lake City — 5/10/36 — Reports of an unidentified flying object were made by three Salt Lake City, Utah, uranium pros-pectors shortly after their sighting. The trio reported they saw a large silvery colored object "spinning or floating in the air" in the western part of Millard County, Utah. Harvey Mecham, 50 year old prospector and insurance salesman, in company with Wendel Stephensen and Bud Merkey, Salt Lake City, reported seeing the UFO from the top of Totem Knob, about 7:30 a.m.

"We were searching with scintillators near the top when Wendel spotted the UFO," said Mr. Mecham. "It was the brightest, silvery thing I have ever seen," he added.

The UFO remained stationary below some light, fleecy clouds for four or five minutes and then rose at about a 75 degree angle and then disappeared out of sight, the men reported. A strong wind was blowing the clouds to the west and the UFO went out of sight in the opposite direction, Mr. Mecham said. "This makes us certain that it was not a balloon. There was nothing hanging down from the bottom of it either," he added.

The men reported that they were about 3,000 feet high and that the UFO was about 3,000 feet above them. "I could have hit it with a high-powered rifle," said Mr. Micham. The group said they tried to get in touch with the Utah Civil Defense authorities but had been unable to locate either an office or a telephone.

Ornaments on the tree can be dangerous, too! Don't use cotton or paper on the tree, unless flameproof. ("Santa's whiskers" can cause tragedy, too). Never use lighted candles on the tree, or nearby.
