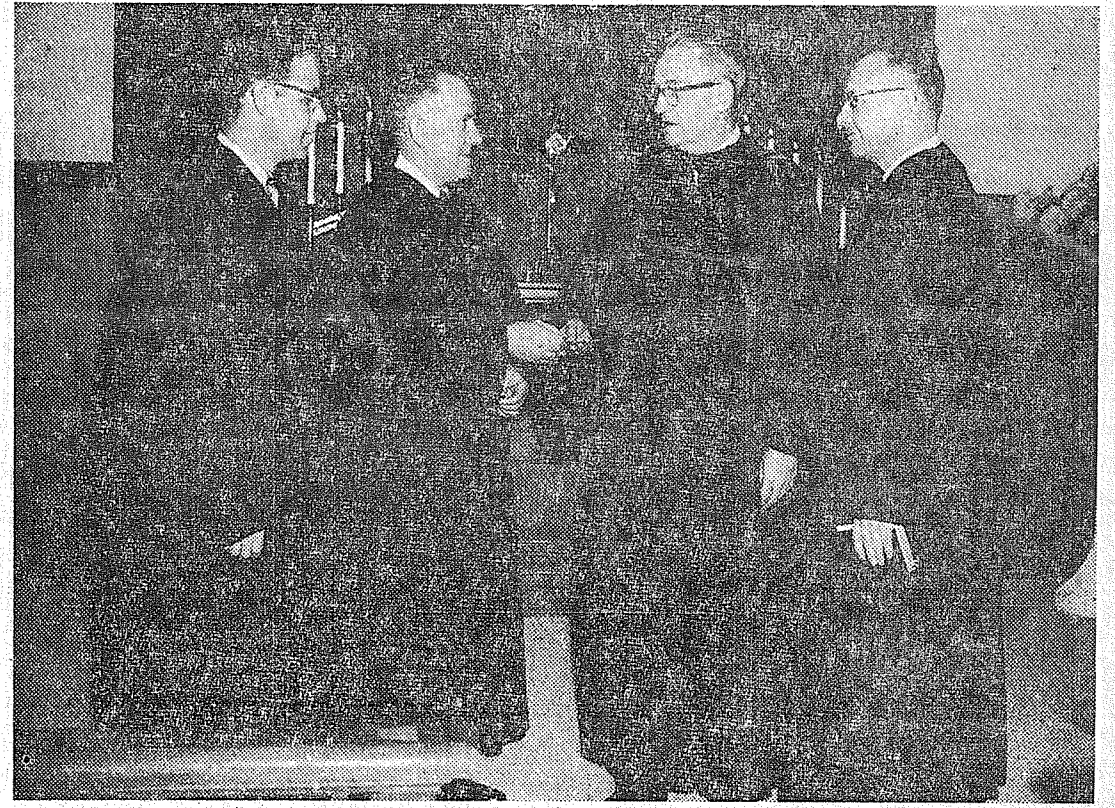


Processional Marks Methodist Church Transfer

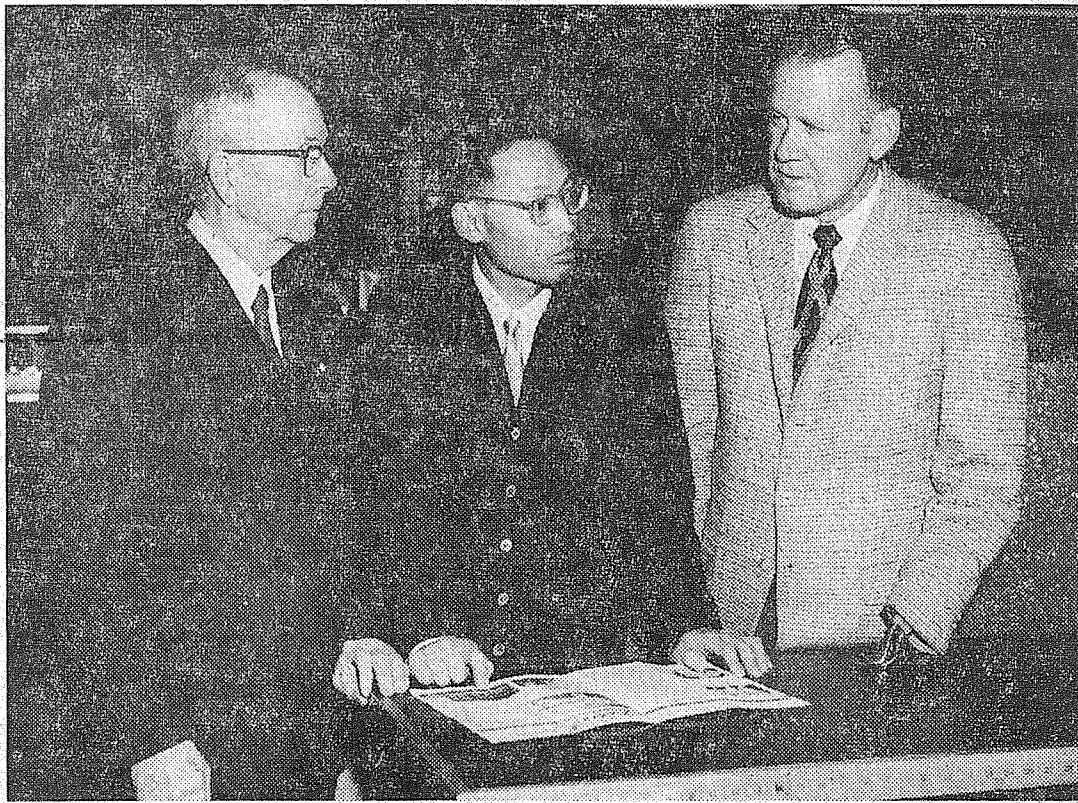

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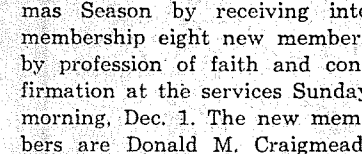
Firemen Elect New Officers

Impressive Ceremonies Highlight Consecration of New Sanctuary

A new sanctuary for the Methodist congregation in Parkland was opened for worship in impressive ceremonies on Sunday, December 8. Bishop A. Raymond Grant of the Portland Area of the Methodist Church was present to preach and consecrate the remodeled army chapel at 123rd and "A" Streets at the evening service. The morning worship service included a "ceremony of transfer" when the entire congregation marched in procession from the old sanctuary to the new one 2½ blocks away.

At the 7:45 p.m. service Charles Peterson, president of the Parkland Methodist board of trustees, presented the keys of the building to Bishop Grant who then declared it open for worship. In his brief presentation address, Mr. Peterson expressed appreciation to the numerous men, women and youth who had contributed many hours of volunteer work to the project, thus reducing the cash cost by hundreds of dollars.

Before his evening sermon, Bishop Grant was introduced by the Rev. Dr. Clark Wood, superintendent of the Seattle-Tacoma district. Dr. Wood expressed his keen interest in the progress of this church since he had served as its pastor for several years in the early thirties.

Rev. Donald Nothdurft, the present minister, presided at the Consecration service which was attended by a number of laymen and ministers from neighboring Methodist churches. Among those present was the Rev. William Andrews and family, formerly minister of this church and now serving the Highline Methodist church in Seattle.

The service of worship at the morning hour was concluded with the congregation moving in procession from the old to the new sanctuary. Some of the symbols and instruments of worship were carried to the new sanctuary by leading laymen of the church symbolizing a "bridge" from the past to the future and the transfer of the sanctuary from one building to another.

Rev. Nothdurft led the procession carrying the pulpit Bible which was then opened in the new sanctuary and Psalm 100 was read. The altar cross was carried by the Charge Lay Leader, Wilbur Roberts and the two candlesticks were carried by the president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the president of the Methodist Men, Mrs. Charles Peterson and Clyde Southall, respectively. Tacoma Man Combines Business And Humor In Highly Diverse Career

COLUMNIST NOTE: Since this feature was written, Mr. Holloway has received notification of his advancement to a post of Regional Supervisor for Region 7 of the Inter-Mountain States. Headquarters for the post are in Denver, Colo. The Holloway family will be leaving Tacoma for their new assignment the first part of January.

Charles Holloway is a man who firmly believes that without humor the world would be a sad place in which to exist.

He has sufficient experience to back up his opinion on this subject as well as one could discover should you happen to drop in at the USO building in Tacoma where Mr. Holloway has claimed Mr. Holloway's services since 1931, he has packed into his office.

another. Most recently, he has done a supporting role in the first season production of the "Great Sebastians" as well as a subsequent drama workshop participation for the Tacoma Little Theatre.

Bloomington at that time was off-season headquarters for many of the great circus acts when they were not traveling on the circuit. With all these vestiges of glamour circus acrobatics, trapeze artists, clowns, and the like, it wasn't long before the small boys in Bloomington were availing themselves of the equipment they could so readily have access to.

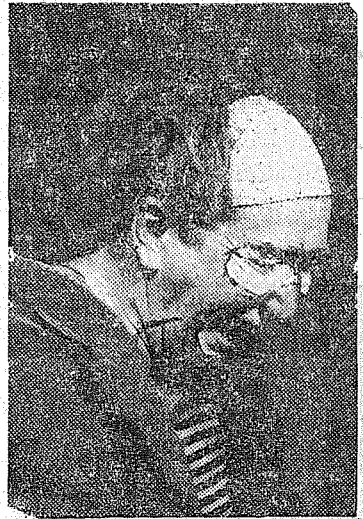
From such early day location, Chuck Holloway came to know such people as Eddy Ward of "The Flying Wards", Emmett Kelly, probably the world's most famous clown, Tuffy Genders, ass't manager for Ringling Bros. and numerous other people, big and little names in the world of circus.

With the progression of time, Mr. Holloway found himself doing his educational exercises at Illinois Wesleyan College and

George Williams. His major was, not surprisingly, physical education. It was during these early days that he and other friends interested in the circus-life, would devote their summers to working up an act and playing with any show that needed their particular brand of performance. Mr. Holloway pointed out that as in many businesses, versatility was a big thing and something you really needed. If you could clown as well as be an acrobat, or assist with some other act, this was all to the advantage.

Included in the long and fascinating itinerary of the Holloway saga, are excursions into the field of radio as program director, a lecture series for service organizations, writing children's stories (this in California while he was affiliated with the YMCA, forming a toy company in Downey, Cal. called "Ideas Unlimited" which, as Mr. Holloway states "I simply didn't have time to pursue". Possibly the most unorthodox of all his varied duties in these lines he states, was when he taught swimming over the air waves. "These were pre-TV days," he said, "and the instructions had to be verbal — sight unseen. They worked too."

In his many years with the YMCA, and the many other activities of this nature in which he has been active at the same time, there must be some major reason for such an abundance of time donation to so many civic endeavors. In the case of Charles Holloway it is an apparent love for people.

"Negotiators" Pull Fast Deal At Youth Center

What we needed just now was about 4,000 feet of 2-inch ear decking for the floor of the Summit Youth Center. And if you think you can get that for a song, take ten bucks and see how much you can buy. Why, you couldn't get enough to patch a hole in the old cow barn floor.

We had staked out a claim on one of the nose docks they are ripping out at McChord Field — 4,000 beautiful feet; I mean 4,000 feet of beautiful TG decking, like new. 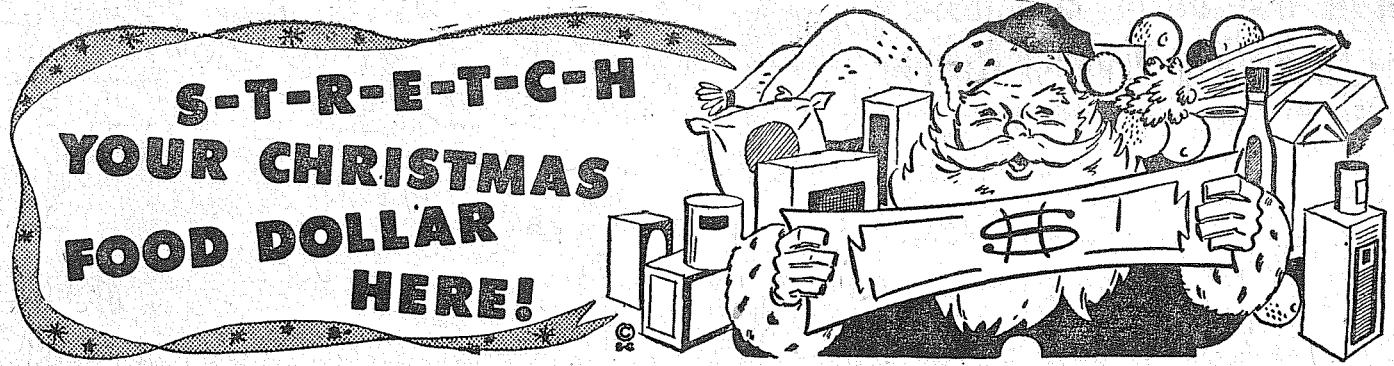

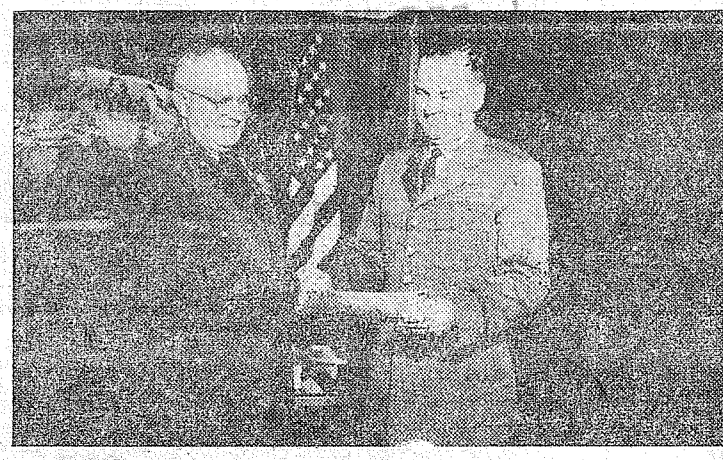

In the office, visitors will be able to secure help on voting information, counseling on medical (Continued on Page 5)

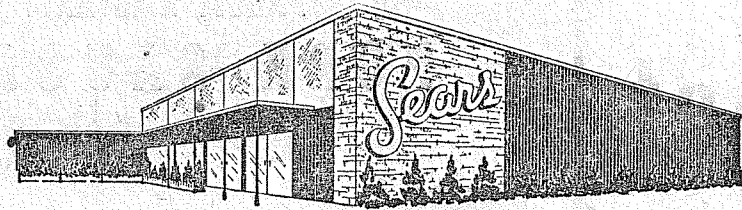
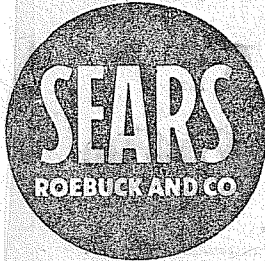

Creston, Iowa — 7/22/57 — Four boys, two of them members of the Ground Observer Corps said they saw a UFO. They watched the object, which they described as a ball of whitish-orange light, at three different times. The boys were camping out, when they saw the object the first time about 11:15 p.m. The boys said the object they saw appeared similar to one which the Canadian Ground Observer Corps has been tracking for the last month. The Canadian report from Toronto said the Canadian GOC has orders to keep a close watch on the mysterious object which it has been observing for a month. Herb Harrison, a Canadian GOC Chief Observer, said "It's like a little ball of fire. It keeps shifting from north to east to west to south. We have no idea what it is."

Trenton, J. J. — 10/2/56 — A Trenton night watchman reported he saw a large wingless object swoop down to hover over the Delaware River. It gave off a bad odor and flew away. Harry J. Strudevent said he was in the trailer-office of his contracting employer when the glowing object, which he described about 100 feet long, came into view. He told police the UFO came down and flew away so suddenly he was unable to get a complete description. He said it had no wings, shot fire from the rear and hissed.

Chicago, Ill. — 8/1/57 — Unofficial flying disc investigators report that an Air Force jet chased a big and speedy "circular flying object" in the Far East last December. They said the jet got within five miles of the object before it flew off at a speed between 1,500 and 2,160 miles per hour. The report was made by the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena in its monthly magazine, "UFO Investigator." The Air Force had no immediate comment. The NICAP said a "Far East Air Force office" had advised that an unidentified jet pilot picked up the "UFO" as a strange "blip" on his radar screen, and started pursuit at more than 800 miles per hour. "At 8 miles range," it quoted the Far East report, "a large round object appeared directly ahead. By this time, the jet's radar was in 'lock-on' position, automatically guiding the jet toward the UFO. A moment later, the radar was jammed by a strong interference. Using antijam procedure, the pilot switched frequency. For ten seconds this eliminated the mysterious interference pulses, then they came again on the new frequency. But they were not strong enough to break the radar lock-on and the jet held its course. The jet closed to within 5 nautical miles of the object and could not close further." The NICAP said the pilot reported that the object was a golden-tan in color and had the appearance of being circular on the bottom. It quoted him as saying it made a shallow left turn, then moved up and away at an estimated speed of between 1,800 and 2,160 miles an hour.

Salt Lake City — 5/10/56 — Reports of an unidentified flying object were made by three Salt Lake City, Utah, uranium prospectors shortly after their sighting. The trio reported they saw a large silvery colored object "spinning or floating in the air" in the western part of Millard County, Utah. Harvey Mechem, 50 year old prospector and insurance salesman, in company with Wendel Stephenson and Bud Morley, Salt Lake City, reported seeing the UFO from the top of Totem Knob, about 7:30 a.m. "We were searching with scintillators near the top when Wendel spotted the UFO," said Mr. Mechem. "It was the brightest, silvery thing I have ever seen," he added.

The UFO remained stationary below some light, fleecy clouds for four or five minutes and then rose at about a 75 degree angle and then disappeared out of sight, the men reported. A strong wind was blowing the clouds to the west and the UFO went out of sight in the opposite direction, Mr. Mechem said. "This makes us certain that it was not a balloon. There was nothing hanging down from the bottom of it either," he added.

The men reported that they were about 3,000 feet high and that the UFO was about 3,000 feet above them. "I could have hit it with a high-powered rifle," said Mr. Mechem. The group said they tried to get in touch with the Utah Civil Defense authorities but had been unable to locate either an office or a telephone.

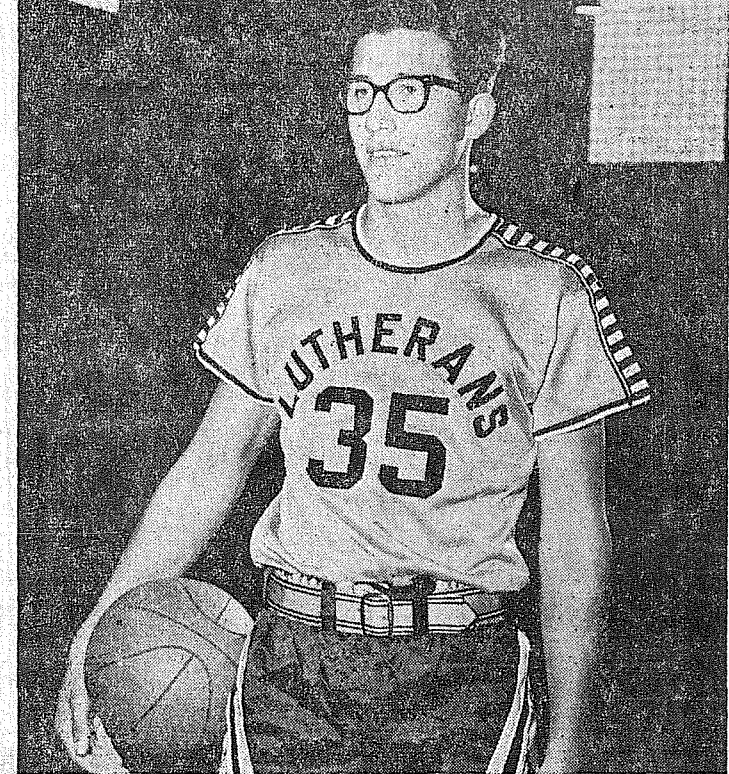

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County Agents News

Christmas trees can be sold by U.S. Grades this winter. For the first time, Christmas trees can be harvested and sold this year on the basis of Federal-

standardized grades. This offers possibilities for better returns to Washington growers for good quality trees." Joseph Buhaly, County Extension Agent, says, U. S. Grade Standards, developed at the request of State and National Christmas tree associations, became effective November 1st.

Grading is voluntary and inspection service is provided for a moderate fee by the U.S. Department of Agriculture at all major shipping points and terminal markets. Grades include U. S. Premium, U. S. No. 1, and U. S. No. 2. Trees that can't qualify for any of these grades are listed as culls. In the past many growers have sold their trees in random lots, just as a whole field was harvested, Buhaly says. Dealers could not pay too high for such lots since at times they contained as much as 30 per cent culls. Grading makes it possible for growers to command a better price for hatches of high quality trees, and it protects dealers from taking a loss on cull trees mixed in with

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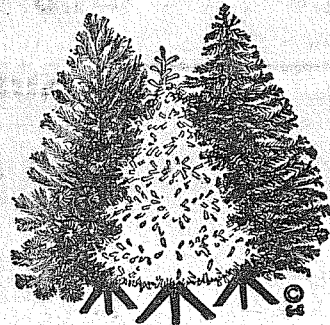

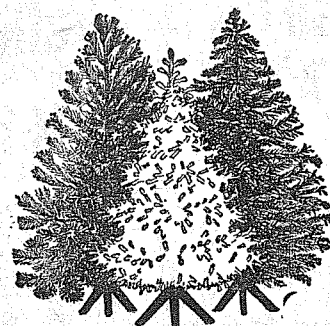

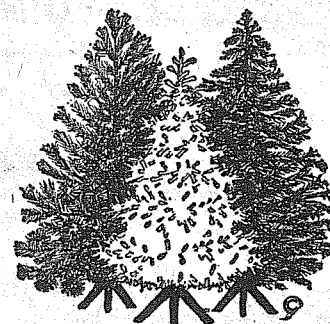
Christmas Trees are filled with pitch and resin, and when dry, can easily ignite and turn into a roaring flame. To prevent this, keep your tree fresh and green by putting it into a container of water, or water mixed with sand. Cut the trunk diagonally at the end above original cut. Be sure water is kept above the cut.



Ornaments on the tree can be dangerous, too! Don't use cotton or paper on the tree, unless flameproof. ("Santa's whiskers" can cause tragedy, too). Never use lighted candles on the tree, or nearby. Keep ashtrays and cigarettes away from the tree. Remove piles of opened gift wrappings. Do not place electric trains around the tree.



Be sure the tree is kept away from an open fireplace, or heater. Check lighting sets for frayed wires, loose connections, and broken sockets. Don't plug too many cords into one outlet. If any extensive wiring is planned call an electrician, don't do it yourself! Last of all, "Lights Out," when you leave home, and when you retire for the evening!

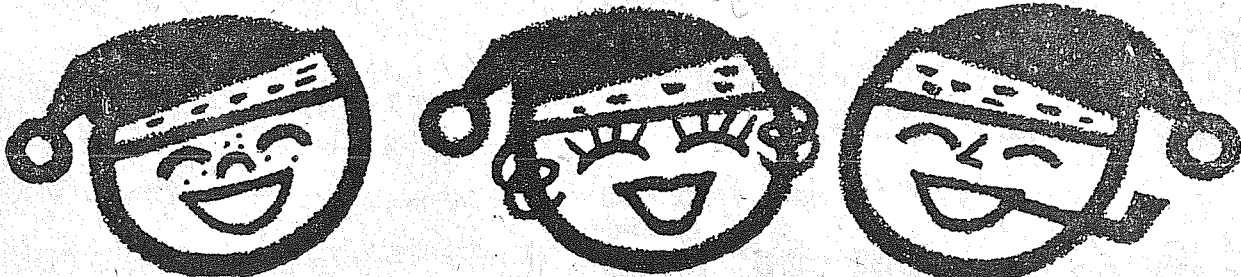

YULE BAKING PART OF HOLIDAY TRADITION

In many homes, certain baked specialties have become part of the Christmas tradition. These favorites appear like old friends, year after year, and are always eagerly anticipated. For some, a Christmas tree cake holds this honored role.

For the homemaker who likes to carry out such traditions, and at the same time, give them her own personal touch, the cake will have to be something out of the ordinary. A white layer cake, baked in Christmas tree pans, boasting a tangy lemon frosting and a Cranberry Cream Topping, offers an interesting new variation on the familiar Christmas-tree-cake theme.

To give the cake a new look and taste, the Lemon Frosting is used to spread on the sides of the cake as well as between the layers. The topping has a gelatine base to which cranberry sauce and whipped cream have been added. The cranberry sauce imparts little sparks of color for a glamorous touch.

Since the cake is intended to be something extra-special, the sort of thing to be served after tree-trimming or gift-opening, you'll want to be sure of perfect

baking results. Therefore, it's especially important that you choose a shortening of high quality. A pure, white shortening made from a blend of vegetable and meat fats is an excellent choice. This "quick mix" type shortening is equally good for both baking and frying.

White Christmas Tree Cake
Yield, two-tree shape layers or two 9-inch round layers.
¾ cup shortening
2½ cups sifted cake flour
4 teaspoons double acting baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1½ cups sugar
1 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 egg whites

Place shortening in a bowl. Add flour, baking powder, salt and sugar, which have been sifted together. Add 2/3 cup of the milk and vanilla. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed of electric mixer or by hand using 150 strokes per minute. Throughout mixing time keep batter scraped from sides and bottom of bowl with rubber scraper. Scrape bowl and beaters. Add unbeaten egg whites and remaining 1/3 cup milk. Beat 2 additional minutes on medium

Cranberry Cream Topping:
Yield, about 1½ cups.
2 teaspoons gelatine
2 tablespoons cold water

½ cup whipping cream, whipped. Soften gelatine in cold water. Add boiling water and stir until smooth. Add cranberry sauce and sugar. Place in the refrigerator until mixture begins to thicken. Fold into whipped cream.

More than 2,000 Christmas gifts are given out annually to hospitalized veterans in this state by Legionnaires, Commander Ed N. Davis said.

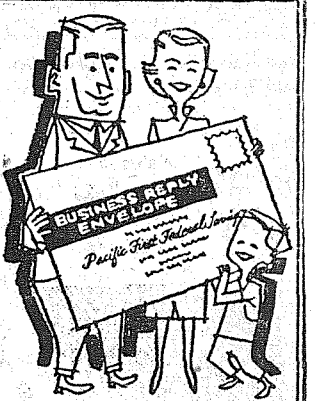
Meaneast Thief

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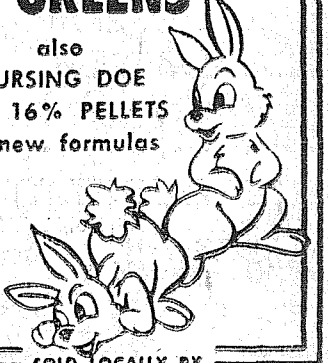
