Club to Chew Police Problem, Hear Coffee

No Parklander can afford to miss tonight's session of the Parkland Community Club, which will be held at the school, and due to daylight saving time, will start at 8:30.

In the first place, law enforcement problems in the Parkland area will be put through the mill. In the second place, John M. Coffee will be on hand to speak on the history of Washington. And in the third place, a cowboy band from CPS will entertain.

Parkland's policing problems will be given a thorough airing, with Attorney Don Eastvold in charge. County Commissioner Harry Sprinker and a representative of the sheriff's office will each give their points of view on the enforcement of laws in this area.

The commissioners recently charged the sheriff's office for not enforcing the laws adequately. After noting that Pierce County's highway death toll is the heaviest in the state, they pointed out that the sheriff's deputies had issued but one speeding ticket in the first four months of 1950.

But speeding isn't the only complaint of local citizens. Shooting fire-

arms, wreckless driving, vandalism and other offenses are growing more prevalent in the fast-growing South End. The sheriff has replied that he lacks facilities to give the more densely populated suburban districts adequate protection.

There is little doubt but that Parkland is in need of constant and continuous protection from a law enforcement agency. Some have suggested that if the sheriff is incapable of providing such service, Parkland will have to provide its own, by naming a constable.

At any rate, all angles will be taken into consideration, and the Community Club will take some definite action at tonight's session.


Burns House Down While Fixing Floor

Justice of Peace Is Named For Parkland

Continued growth in Parkland was recognized recently when the appointment of Louis Innerarity as justice of the peace for the College precinct was announced by the county commissioners.

The appointment was made to fill an original vacancy and gives Parkland its second justice of the peace. Martin Easterday holds office in Parkland No. One precinct north of Airport Road.

Asked about the scope of his new duties, Innerarity replied, "The responsibility of any justice of the peace is to provide a judicial function in his community for the convenience of its citizens. He is not a sheriff nor a legal adviser. My purpose shall be one of providing a fair and impartial court in accordance with the law governing justice courts."

Innerarity is a resident of Parkland, is married and is employed as an adjuster. His office will be temporarily located at his home on 125th Street.

Justice courts have jurisdiction over criminal cases in the county and civil cases in the precinct. Each justice court has a small claims division for handling of cases involving less than \$20, and in other civil actions, has jurisdiction over cases involving less than \$100.

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
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Central Ave. P-TA To Install May 17

His appointment followed the announcement that Miss Cora Scherzer is retiring at the end of this school year.

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
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
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
