No date has been set for the wedding.

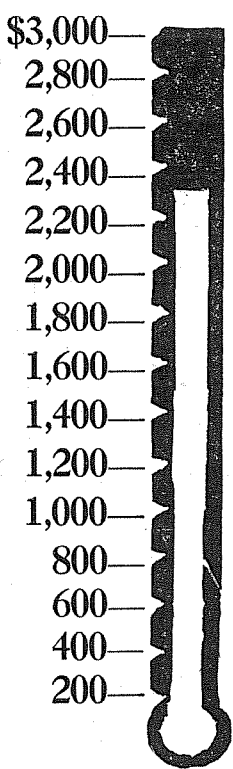

PARKLAND MEN FOIL BURGLAR

SAFECRACKER SHOT IN ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE FROM WATER, LIGHT CO.

A safecracker, Edwin Tinker of Tacoma, learned it doesn't pay to "tinker" with the safe at the Parkland Light and Water Co., when he was apprehended in his attempt to burglarize the company.

Tinker broke into the office of the company early Friday morning by prying open the basement window. He set to work breaking open the safe with a pick-axe, a crow bar, and a sledge hammer that he had taken from the basement of the building.

The crude attempts were heard by George Knudtson who, noticing that the light in the office was out, aroused his son, Ralph, and Art Berntsen. The three armed themselves and surrounded the building.

The burglar tried to escape through the rear entrance undaunted by the warning from Ralph Knudtson, "Stop or I'll shoot." Knudtson shot him in the back with a 12 gauge shotgun as he leaped over the hedge next to the building.

The sheriff's car was called and took him to the hospital. He was not seriously hurt.

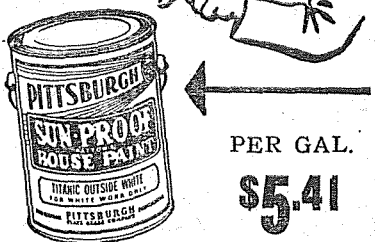

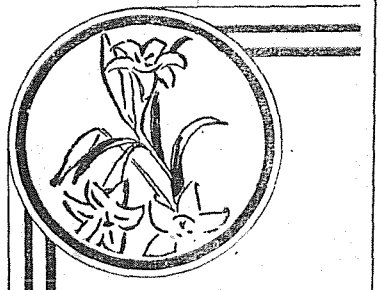

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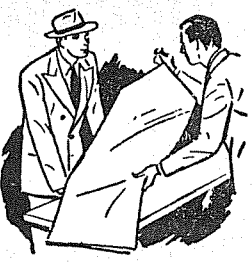
