## Endurance Test Set For Airmen

Air crews will go through the motions of flying a plane five days at a stretch in experiments to find the limit of human endurance under flight conditions. Experiments are scheduled to begin in August at the Marietta, Ga., plant of the Lockheed Aircraft Corp., in an effort to crack what Lockheed scientists call the human barrier.  
 The human barrier, it was explained, is the last barrier to the future ranges of aviation, now that scientists have broken the sound barrier and chipped away at the heat barrier and range-and-endurance barrier.  
 Conquest of the human barrier could make possible flights into outer space and unlimited range flights in nuclear-powered planes, Lockheed said.  
 The men taking part in the tests at the Georgia plant will be confined for 120 hour periods in a mock-up flight compartment 7 by 17 feet. Ten crews will take part. Experiments are expected to be concluded early next year.

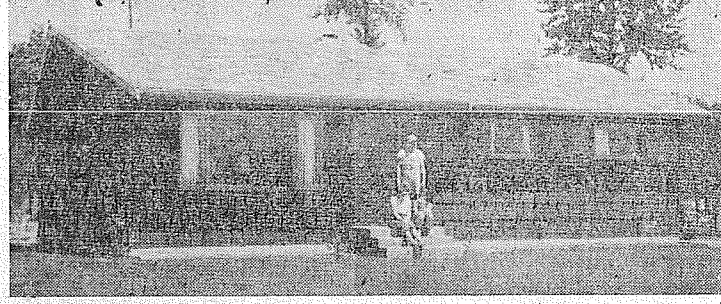

Pierce County has more small forest owners than any other county in Washington and Oregon. This according to the recent cooperative Timber Resource Review study released by the U.S. Forest Service. 4,426 owners is the number of ownerships in Pierce County and covering 199,000 acres. This figure of 4,426 represents persons who own from 10 up to 4,999 acres. 4058 owners are in the 10 to 99 acre class. Persons owning less than 10 acres of forest land were not counted in the survey.

"One family in 10 owns a small forest," so states the forest service publication. "Half of the private commercial forest land in Oregon and Washington is in

"small" private holdings of less than 5,000 acres." "There is no place for complacency in the Pacific Northwest when only 58 per cent of the small forest ownerships qualified for 70 per cent and better stocking following cutting." These and other facts garnered from the U. S. Forest Service publication, "Small Forest Landownerships Oregon and Washington," indicate that improved management is needed on small forest properties.

Speaking of how rapidly small forest owners are receiving assistance the publication indicates that technical help is slow in reaching this group. It states that at the present rate of assistance to small ownerships it will take 33 years to reach all of them.

"44 per cent of the operating small owners in Western Washington cut timber from stands less than 60 years of age." This shows that cutting trees before

they are ripe is common practice with almost half the small operating ownerships. Loss of money to the owner and loss of resource to the nation is the result of too early cutting by a large number of woodland owners.

The practical small forest owner takes a critical look before he cuts. What needs to be done and how it should be done is often a difficult decision to make, Richard E. McArdle, Chief, U. S. Forest Service, emphasized this in his talk before the 81st annual meeting of the American Forestry Association when he said:

"It's at this point that you probably will need some expert advice. Each and every forest property is a law unto itself. You can learn from your neighbors and from others, but you are not going to get anywhere until you apply that knowledge to a specific property—your own. Your situation may be entirely different from the forest next door. The steps I would take on my land probably are not the steps I'd advise you to take on yours. There is no simple, easy rule of thumb that can be applied everywhere. Designing a practical plan of management for growing good

timber—or any other aspect of forest conservation—requires at least as much skill, experience, and technical knowledge as does the production of any crop. You won't get the answers you need by reading a 4-page pamphlet, by looking at a 20-minute movie, or by attempting to use some rule-of-thumb guide. So don't underestimate or undervalue the technical skill required to do a profitable forestry job. It's easy to make a mistake that will cut your long-time income to a third or a fourth of what you could have. You are going to have time and money tied up in this enterprise. It's your time, your land and your money. Get some good out of it."

Interesting information from Pierce County Agricultural Census: Number of beef cattle in Pierce County rose from 1800 head in 1940 to 12,500 head in 1956. From 4249 eggs in 1940 to 5,062 in 1954. From 1,071 sheep in 1950 to 1567 in 1954. From 2451 horses and mules in 1940 decreased to 1196 in 1954.

Howard Young, a hog producer at Edgewood, who has some of the Palouse breed of hogs recently developed by Washington State College showed me some records about the Palouse breed. Of 35 litters born last spring from gilts that were an average of 9 pigs weaned; 42 pound weaning weight at 56 days; 200 pound average weight at 154 days; 100 lbs. weight gain on 319 lbs. feed! One Boar weighed 254 lbs. at 150 days of age! That's quite a record.

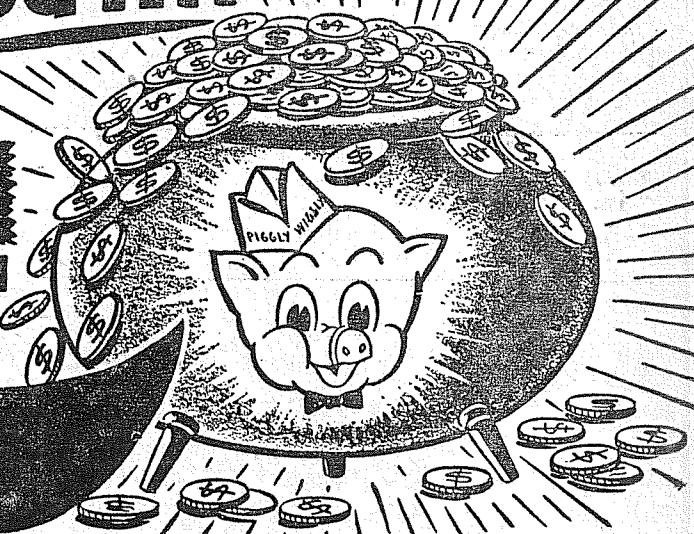

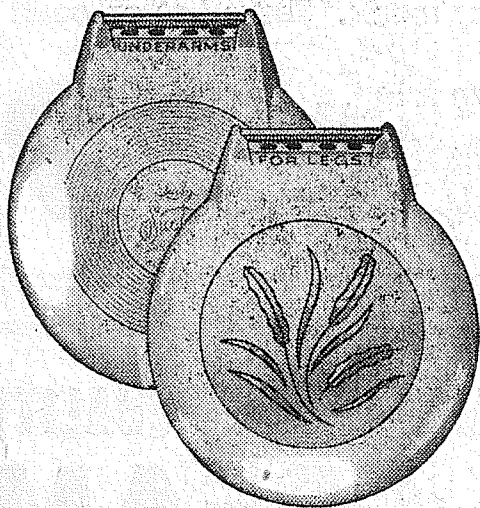

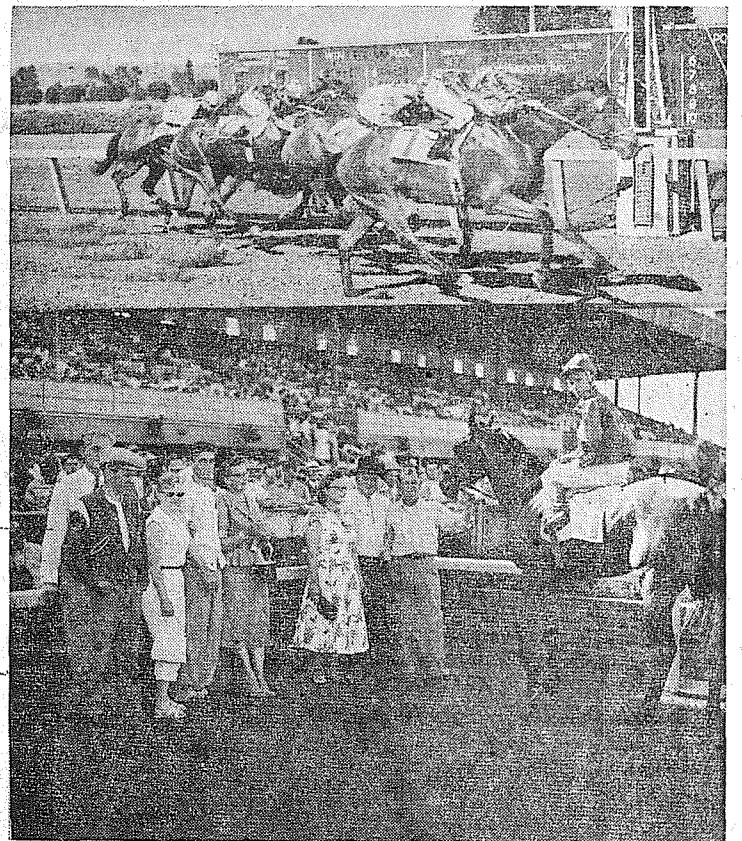

### County Agent's Corner

Dairy Day, August 1, at the Western Washington Experiment Station will feature the nutritional aspects of dairying. The Soils Department under Walter Mortensen and the Agronomy Department under Dr. Herman Austenson are cooperating with the Dairy Department to make the day a success in bringing information to the dairymen.

"We are attempting to find which grasses would produce the most feed for the least cost over

the longest period of time in this section of Washington where most of the dairies are located," stated Dr. Austenson.

The Agronomy Department will conduct field trips to its various plots where tests are being conducted on pasture and hay mixtures using various grasses for yield and distribution thru the season. There will also be demonstration of grass variety tests, annual crops, cereal variety tests, and silage corn varieties.

"All of our tests should be of interest to the dairymen of the area as they are designed for this particular area, its climate and

weather," stated Dr. Austenson. One new item of interest is the employment of gibberellic acid on red clover and alfalfa. Much is being written at the present time on this growth stimulant for plants.

A new experimental drill will be displayed by the Soils Department. It is one of four in the United States, built at Beltsville, Maryland, by the U.S.D.A. It is being used to study precise rates and placements of seed and fertilizer for forage crops.

"The machine permits us for the first time to properly study various methods of establishing forage crops. This is extremely important to the dairyman, for in order to obtain maximum production from his crops he must first establish the best possible seeding," stated Dr. Mortensen.

"We are making studies on pastures and hay crops involving time, method, and rate of application of fertilizer and its influence on production. Major emphasis is being placed on nitrogen

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and phosphate fertilization since they most frequently limit production in western Washington. We are particularly concerned with phosphate as it presents the most problems of application," added Dr. Mortensen.

Test plots where these studies are being made will be shown to the visiting dairymen as well as exhibits from the State College of Washington and dairy tours. Dairy Day will start at 10 a.m. and run until 3:30 p.m. Lunch will be available on the Station grounds.
