KIWANIS ELECTS AT MIAMI MEET

Delegates attending the 35th annual convention of Kiwanis International at Miami elected a prominent Canadian business leader to head the organization in the year ahead.

Roy V. Rostedt, secretary of the Kiwanis Club of Parkland area was informed today that Don H. Murdoch, president of the Peerless Laundry, Ltd., at Winnipeg, Manitoba, would succeed J. Hugh Jackson, Palo Alto, Calif., as president of Kiwanis International, which now embraces more than 3,100 clubs throughout the United States, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii and the Yukon Territory.

A Kiwanian for 17 years, Murdoch is director of the Senior Board of Trade at Winnipeg, chairman of the Associated Launderers, Cleaners and Allied Trades of Manitoba, and director of the Canadian Research Institute of Launderers, Cleaners and Allied Trades.

The new president, who will assume office August 1, served as vice-president of Kiwanis International during the past year. He also has been an international trustee and governor of the Western Canada Kiwanis District. As a veteran of World War I, he fought with the Canadian army in France, Belgium and Germany.

Delegates to the Miami convention, which drew approximately 10,000 men and women from all sections of this country and Canada, also elected two vice-presidents, a treasurer, and six trustees.

Schools To Require Physical Examination

Starting next fall, all children entering first grade in any of the Franklin Pierce schools will be required to have a physical examination by their own family doctor sometime during the three months preceding the opening of school in September, Superintendent Morris Ford announced this week.

The doctors are cooperating by setting a fee of \$2 per child for the examination in his office. For those who cannot afford the fee, there is in Parkland a free "well-baby clinic" once a month sponsored by Parkland Pre-school for children up to six.

Examination blanks may be obtained at the school any morning.

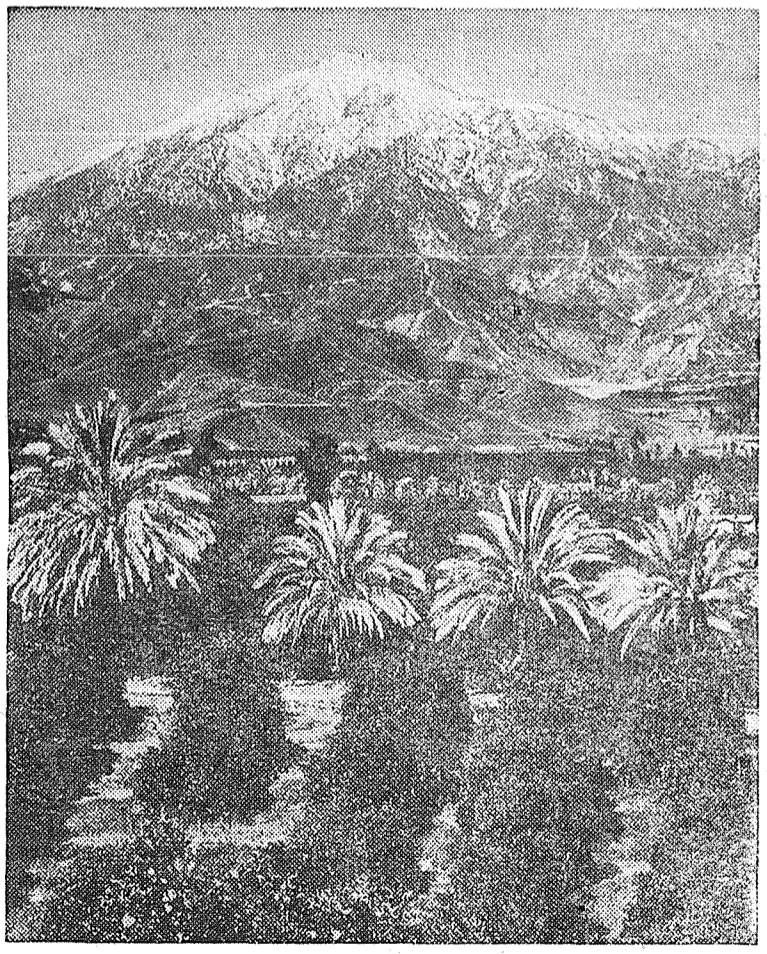
