SPANAWAY CLUB BUYS RESUSCITATOR; MAY GIVE SMORGASBORD

Donations by Bob Steidel and William Righetti started the drive for subscriptions to pay for a resuscitator which was recently bought by the Spanaway Progressive Community Club.

The club felt the area was badly in need of the life saving device, especially during the summer months when swimming at Spanaway lake is in full swing.

The group hopes to raise part of the \$605 cost by subscription and by enlisting the support of other clubs in the district. They plan to sponsor a smorgasbord at a later date to raise what other funds are needed.

Demonstrations Given

The resuscitator will be on display during the weekend at various grocery stores where donations will be taken, according to Merle Prettyman, chairman of the drive. A senior scout will be on hand to demonstrate the instrument. It may also be displayed at gas stations during the week, he said.

The purpose of the display is to get people acquainted with the resuscitator. Eventually, the life saving device will be left at fire hall No. 1. In the meantime, anyone calling the resuscitator, should call GRanite 8263 days or GRanite 7694 evenings to obtain it, he said.

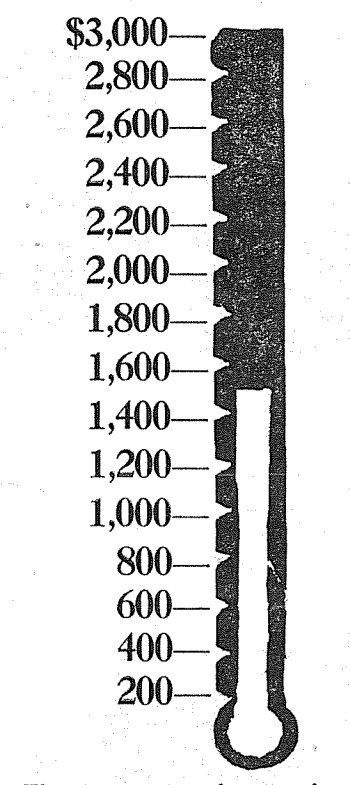
Signs on the outside of the store advertise its new policy.

Recipe of the Week

ENGLISH COFFEE BRAIDS

1 1/4 c milk, scalded	2 lightly beaten eggs
1/2 c shortening	4 1/2 c flour
1/4 c sugar	2 t cinnamon (may be omitted)
1 t salt	1 1/2 c seedless raisins
1 cake yeast	

Combine milk, shortening, sugar, and salt; cool to luke warm. Soften yeast in this mixture. Add eggs. Add flour sifted with cinnamon and raisins; mix to soft dough. Knead lightly on floured surface until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top of dough; cover and let rise until doubled (about two hours). Punch down. Let rise again until doubled. Divide into 2 equal parts. Pull each part into rectangle 1/2 inch thick; cut lengthwise into 3 strips. Braid 3 strips in loaf form. Place on greased baking sheet; cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven (375°) 30 minutes. Brush with icing. Add about 1 1/4 tablespoons top milk to 1 cup confectioners sugar. Sprinkle lightly with nut meats. Makes two 4x12 inch braids.
