



Combine milk, shortening, sugar, and salt; cool to luke warm. Soften yeast in this mixture. Add eggs. Add flour sifted with cinnamon and raisins; mix to soft dough. Knead lightly on floured surface until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top of dough; cover and let rise until doubled (about two hours). Punch down. Let rise again until doubled. Divide into 2 equal parts. Pull each part into rectangle 1/2 inch thick; cut lengthwise into 3 strips. Braid 3 strips in loaf form. Place on greased baking sheet; cover and let rise until doubled in bulk. Bake in moderately hot oven (375°) 30 minutes. Brush with icing. Add about 1¼ tablespoons top milk to 1 cup con-fectioners sugar. Sprinkle lightly with nut meats. Makes two 4x12 inch braids.
