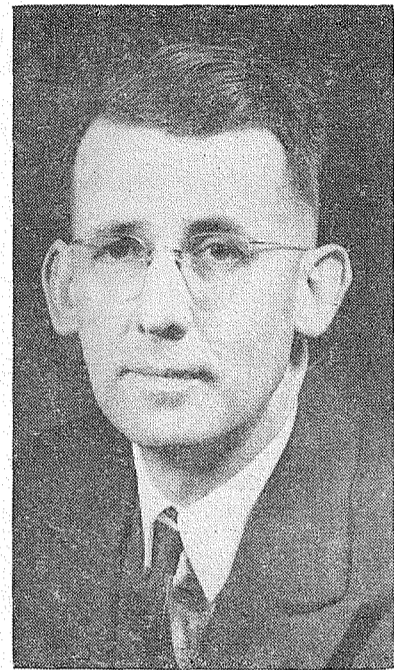


# Clay Roley New Prexy Of Kiwanis

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## Big Blow Blasts Burg; 110,000 Volt Pole Falls; Parkland Left in Dark

"Whew! What a day this has been!" That's about all Mike Wutz and his hard-working crew of the Parkland Light & Water Co. had to say at 2 o'clock Sunday morning after 17 straight hours of feverish work.

But barring another storm like the one which blasted this area last Saturday night, things are finally back to normal after one of the most hectic weekends in local history. No section in the South End seems to have escaped the fury of the combined wind and rain onslaught.

Particularly hit was Parkland's power supply. Wutz, manager of the Light & Water, points out that the community would have had virtually no power disruption if an important Tacoma City Light 110,000 volt pole had not toppled over in front of Selle's Parkland Fuel Oil & Service on Pacific Ave., bringing down with it the worst mess of wires you've ever seen and burning out all of Parkland's main lines within two blocks.

This catastrophe occurred at 7 o'clock Sunday morning. And not until late afternoon did Parkland's thousands of lights, electric ranges, hot water heaters, electric shavers, waffle irons, refrigerators, clocks, etc., go back on.

The city immediately dispatched workers to repair the damage, which took all day. The Parkland Light & Water couldn't do much until the city had cleared away its damage.

When the pumps halted, Parkland was threatened with a serious shortage of water, which grew most critical Monday morning when all the housewives started their washing machines.

Some faucets in the higher elevations failed to produce more than a trickle. Telephone service was also disrupted in many neighborhoods. Volunteers of the Parkland Fire Dept. took it upon themselves to patrol the district all day and night on the lookout for fires while another group stayed at the fire hall. Among those cruising around the district were Fritz and Harry Beitz, Ernie Skance and Lee Smith. If any fires had broken out, they would have been detected and reported as soon as if the phones had been in operation.

A. J. Stern, owner of Parkland Lockers, said that the temperature inside his establishment rose only two degrees during the power failure but was still below zero. In fact, he estimated that if the locker room were locked up, it would take ten days before the thermometer would go above the freezing point.

Midland, Spanaway and Summit got off easier than Parkland, with power blackouts lasting a few hours at the most. Spanaway's electric supply was cut off for about four hours during the middle of Saturday night. A few poles tumbled down in the Midland area, but were mostly those of the Puget Sound Light & Power, which formerly supplied the area.

Pupils of Midland school were awarded an unexpected 24 hours of post-Thanksgiving vacation Monday due to a short circuit in the school furnace. Bus drivers ripped around their routes in the morning to inform the students that school wouldn't be held. Classes resumed Tuesday a.m., although some of the rooms were still a bit chilly.

The power supply is now back to normal, but Mike Wutz urges residents to conserve electricity during the rush hours, 5 to 6:30 p.m. Hot water heaters should be unplugged during this period.

The Light & Water is building a new substation at 127th and A. When it starts operating within two weeks, it will help the district's overall power situation, Wutz concluded.

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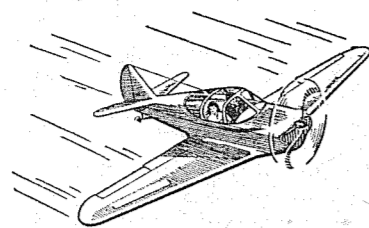
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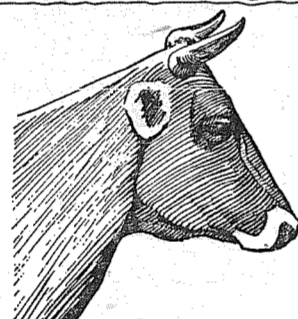
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## 14 Spanaway Groups Plan Christmas Tree, Santa Scene

The bride-elect is in her senior year at Tacoma General Hospital school of nursing. Her fiance attended PLC. No date has been set for the wedding.



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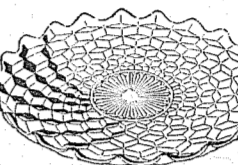
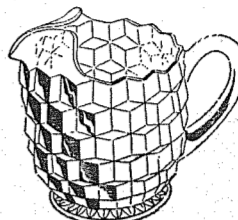
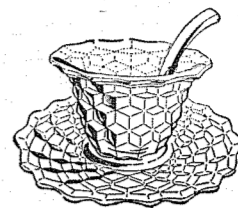
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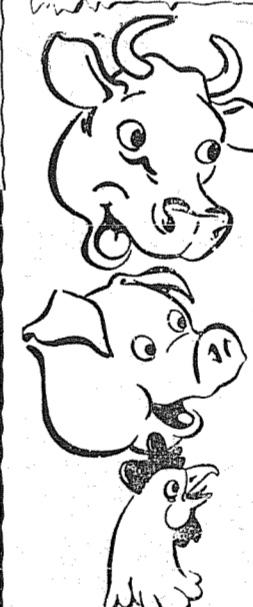
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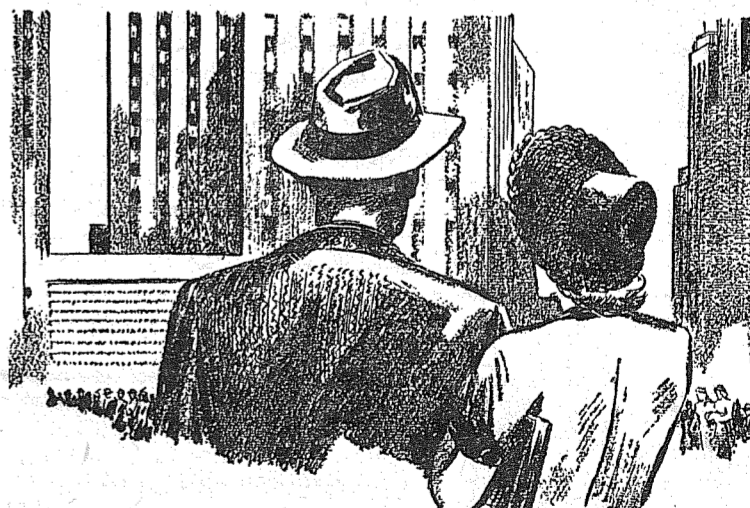
