At the present time it is housed n a room in the northwest corner of the basement of the Parkland public school and is open on Tuesday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. and on Thursday evening from 7 p.m. to

Many Books Available Children's books, and both fiction and non-fiction books for adults are to be found on the shelves and books not available at this station may be requested and will be secured from the district library headquarters at 502 South Eleventh street in Tacoma or from the City Library on Tacoma Av-

Accumulation of new books is based upon circulation of those now on hand which simply means that if the library is not used much more than it has been so far no new volumes will be pur-

chased for this station. The school board has very genrously provided the room and had the shelves built for the library, but it should be housed in a building provided for by the community. The population in this area is about 6,000 which means that we should have a very nice building especially for the library. Possibilities Great




