Liberated Prisoner Is Here For Visit

S/Sgt. WARD LYONS WAS JAP P. W. 3 MONTHS

S/Sgt. Ward B. Lyons, who was held prisoner by the Japanese for over 3 months, has arrived in Parkland to spend a much anticipated reunion with his wife and baby daughter, Rebecca Ann, whom he saw for the first time when he returned from overseas.

Sgt. Lyons, a gunner on a B-29, was shot down on a mission over Yokohama on May 29, 1945 and he was held prisoner for over 90 days.

He is the holder of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster and the Purple Heart. He also wears the Good Conduct Medal and the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with three battle stars.

Sgt. Lyons is the youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Lyons of Roy. He was a resident of Parkland for several years and married the former Doreen Benson, daughter of Mrs. Jenny Benson, Parkland.

BOND KICK OFF SET FOR FRIDAY

DRIVE, ORIGINALLY SET TO OPEN MONDAY, POSTPONED UNTIL TOMORROW

The Victory Loan—the eighth and final war bond drive to be promoted by the U. S. Treasury department—gets underway in the South End communities on Friday morning. The drive, originally scheduled to kick-off on Monday, was postponed until tomorrow to allow downtown Tacoma to complete their Community War Chest drive.

Although the Parkland-Midland-Brookdale-Spanaway districts over subscribed their war chest quota by 54 per cent, the grand total for Tacoma was far from the goal mark and for that reason it was necessary to push the opening day of the bond campaign up four days.

Roy Peterson, Parkland postmaster, who is heading the bond drive in the South End, Tuesday night announced that the entire organization was set up and eager for the opening hour of the campaign to arrive.

"It is a job that has to be done and it will take the effort of each and every one to put it over," commented Chairman Peterson.

The quota set for the South End is \$50,000.

"This is the last—give all you have and more" is the slogan being used in the victory loan. Campaign emphasis will be on the giving thanks for the war's end and the Allied victory.

THE POINTER'S Editorial Comment . . .

There is a Much Better Way

The only thing we admired about President Harry S. Truman's proposal to Congress asking them to approve a years military training was his sincerity in presenting it. Surely, the plan, as he outlined it, should receive careful consideration before being accepted by the American public.

To the 130 million Americans it is not a question of maintaining a strong national defense—for we are sure an overwhelming majority are in favor of adequate protection. Shall it be by military compulsory training or shall it be by voluntary enlistment?

That is why we disagree with the President's plan. We favor the latter plan with certain stipulations.

We believe that America, in order to remain a strong America, must maintain a powerful professional army and navy, a group that will consist of the best qualified men in the nation—men who are professionally trained in medicine, science, engineering, education and in other necessary fields. In this era of science, it is not quantity that America should be seeking. It is quality that counts.

What did America have prior to Pearl Harbor? Surely, we had numbers, but for what? (Understand, we are not criticizing the men in the peacetime army, but we do question the training they receive). Did not the professional men—the doctors, the scientists, the engineers, the educators—receive an S. O. S. from their country to assist in bringing an outdated army and navy up to the world's standards? These professional men, when called into service, were not satisfied with any world's level, they went to work to bring advancements for our nation that outdid anything offered by our opponents. That is why America won the war.

And that is the question before the American people today. Do they favor the plan of our caste system, with General Marshall doing the "ghosting" for President Truman, and have thousands of youngsters receive a year of military training that we feel will consist of drilling, saluting, K. P., and cleaning the barracks? Or shall it be a voluntary army with the best talented and gifted men in the nation—if the army and congressional leaders will make the army and navy career attractive enough?

The cost of "forcing" military training upon every able-bodied American boy would be tremendous. And we ask you, fellow Americans, how much technical training—and that is what the nation needs and that is what the president is asking for—could your son get in only 365 days when you will know that much of his time will be taken up in drilling, saluting, K. P., and cleaning and polishing his equipment and barracks?

We believe that if our leaders in Washington would sit down and do some planning and thinking that they could get enough American youths to give the nation proper protection. If they would "raise" the army and navy career to a level with other professional careers they could get plenty of men—good, well educated men. If our congressional leaders, who sometimes are too much concerned about getting their own salary increases, would raise the pay, the living conditions, and eliminate the caste system from our army ranks, they would have so many enlistments they wouldn't know what to do with all the men.

Yet, today, we in America are contented enough to let the war lords of our nation do the planning for the 130 million men, women, and children of our great land.

The most powerful brass clique in our nation is advocating and lobbying for compulsory military training—for them it will mean continuance of military "prominence," it will mean nice big salaries with good living allowances, it will mean easy working hours with the G. I.'s doing the work.

We will never—after talking to hundreds of enlisted soldiers to find out the trend of our army and navy leaders today—favor compulsory military training. We will fight with all our might to keep it from American soil. We recall what it did for France. We well remember what it did to Germany.

We want national security and protection as much as any American—probably more. But we want it the democratic, the American way.

That is why we favor:

1. Elimination of our caste system.
2. A thorough house cleaning in our army and navy "upper house."
3. Voluntary enlistments.
4. Salaries and living conditions comparable to other professions for every one in the armed forces.

With that type of a set-up, we not only would get plenty of men to assure us adequate protection and manpower, but we would have them for a "career" instead of a year.

No, Mr. and Mrs. America, we cannot and will not accede to the wishes expressed by General George Marshall through his spokesman, President Truman. And we hope that a majority of our fellow Americans feel the same way.
