Several changes in the by-laws were adopted at the meeting. Included among these was the abolishing of the office of treasurer and giving his duties to the manager. The number of members necessary for a quorum was increased from 5 to 30 members and all voting by proxy was eliminated. In addition notices of special meetings will be published hereafter instead of mailed.

The board of trustees will meet this week to decide who the officers of the company will be.

VOTERS PASS 20-MILL LEVY FOR FIREMEN

PROCEEDS TO GO FOR TWO NEW FIRE STATION BUILDINGS

Voters in Fire District No. 7 voted yes to the proposed 20-mill tax levy in the special election held last Saturday.

A total of 190 persons turned out for the election with 142 from Spanaway voting for the tax, 17 against the measure, and 26 persons in Elk Plain voting for it and 5 against it.

The snow storm Saturday afternoon hindered many persons from turning out for the election but many came out at the last minute to register their vote.

176 Votes Needed
A total of 176 votes was needed to make the election legal, according to the civil deputy of Pierce county. The validating vote was difficult to determine since the fire district is not the same as the voting district in that area.

The levy is expected to yield approximately \$15,000 which will be used principally for building two new fire stations, one at Elk Plain and one at Spanaway. They will be on the present sites.

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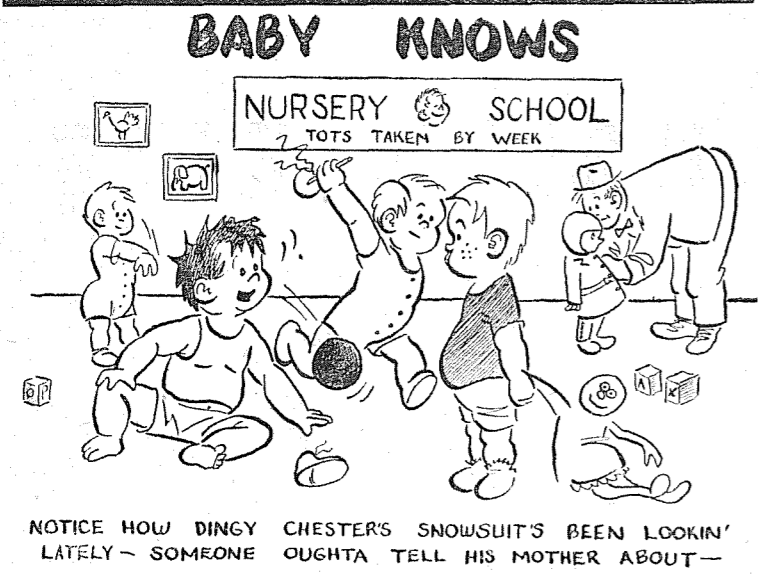
