Your permanent registration record may help establish your proof of citizenship in securing benefits. As a registered voter, you will receive a pamph-

let from the Secretary of State containing a copy of all initiative and referendum measures, and proposed amendments to the State constitution, which Will be voted upon at the State General Election, November 5.

Special "War Voting" is still in effect and DOES NOT REQUIRE REGISTRATION. This applies to: 1. A member of the armed forces, no

matter where located. 2. A civilian, if stationed outside the ter-

ritorial limts of the United States.

3. A member of the Merchant Marine serving outside the territorial limits of the United States.

4. The husband or wife of a "War Voter" who is temporarily residing outside the State of Washington.

REQUIREMENTS

1. Citizen of the United States. 2. Resident of the State of Washington for 1 year (generally means prior to entering the ser-

21 years of age on the day of election (November 5.)

If you voted for the first time in 1944the service-you are not permanently registered!

Even if you were registered as a civilian before your military service and voted in 1944, you should check your registration now. Due to the large number of requests handled by local elecnent voting record was not credited. If this happened, your registration may have been cancelled.

Check with your City Clerk if you live within the city limits. Check with your County Auditor if you live outside the city limits.
