Here's the Official Voting Information

TO ALL CITIZENS

The people of a democracy govern themselves by voting. You, as a registered voter, are able to express your opinion at the polls. And remember, your signature on an initiative or referendum measure is valid only if you are a registered voter.

Your permanent registration record may help establish your proof of citizenship in securing benefits.

As a registered voter, you will receive a pamphlet from the Secretary of State containing a copy of all initiative and referendum measures, and proposed amendments to the State constitution, which will be voted upon at the State General Election, November 5.

Special "War Voting" is still in effect and DOES NOT REQUIRE REGISTRATION. This applies to:

1. A member of the armed forces, no matter where located.
2. A civilian, if stationed outside the territorial limits of the United States.
3. A member of the Merchant Marine serving outside the territorial limits of the United States.
4. The husband or wife of a "War Voter" who is temporarily residing outside the State of Washington.

REQUIREMENTS

1. Citizen of the United States.
2. Resident of the State of Washington for 1 year (generally means prior to entering the service.)
3. 21 years of age on the day of election (November 5.)
