RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Spring Skillet Dinner

Broadcast: May 15, 1954

- 8 small new red potatoes, unpared (1 lb.)
- 2 cups water
- 2 Tablespoons shortening
- 2 1/2 oz. jar shredded dried beef
- 1/4 cup finely cut onion
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 cup Pet Evaporated Milk
- 1-lb. can peas, well drained

Boil potatoes in water in a covered pan about 20 min., or until tender. Drain, then remove skins from potatoes, if desired. Melt shortening in a skillet. Add dried beef and onion. Stir over low heat about 5 min., or until beef is brown. Stir in soup, milk and peas. Cook and stir over medium heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve over the potatoes. Makes 4 servings.

Rural Mail Box Improvement Week
