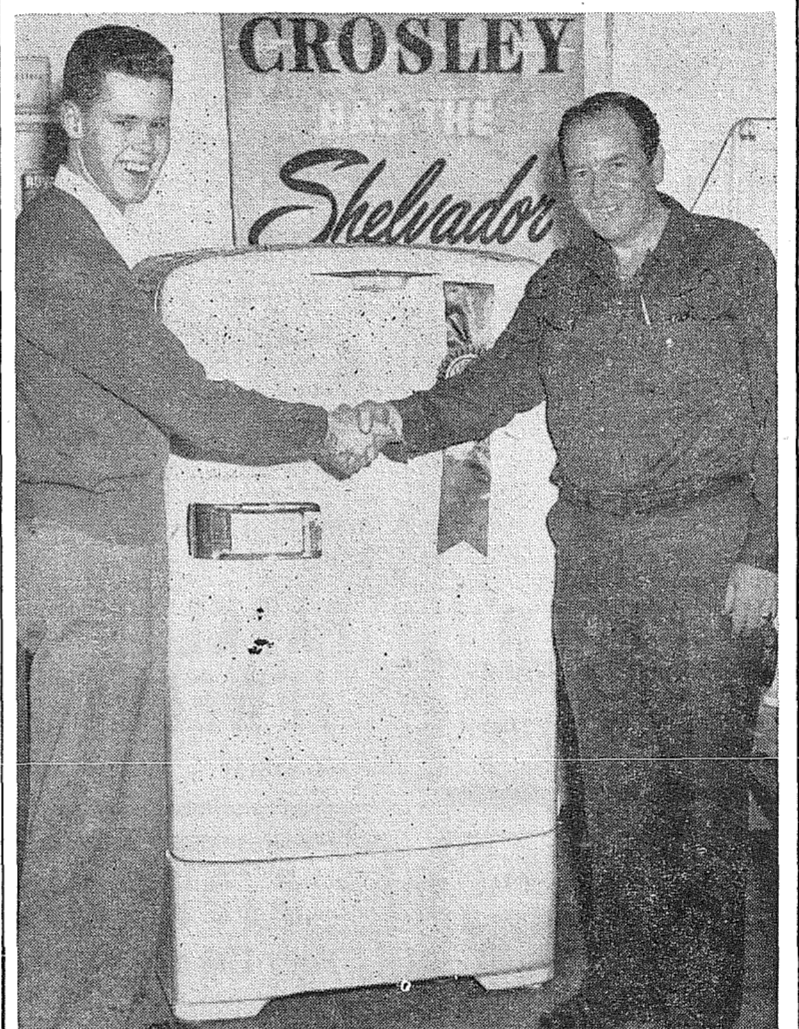
The acquisition of a folding machine is another indication of the conviction of the editor and publisher of south suburban Tacoma want and will support a first-class newspaper in their area.

And don't worry about the threat of rain or snow. In case of inclement weather, the celebration will move inside the Parkland School.

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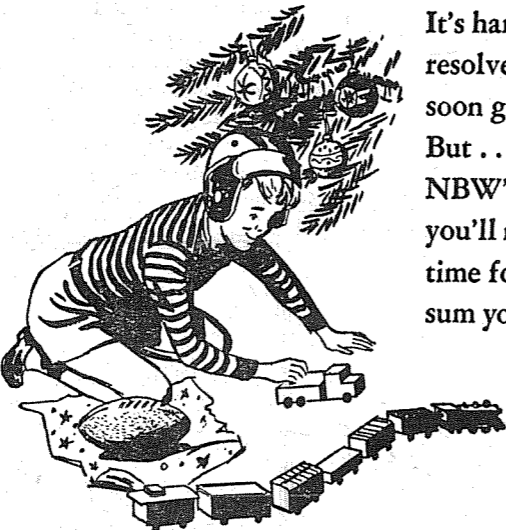

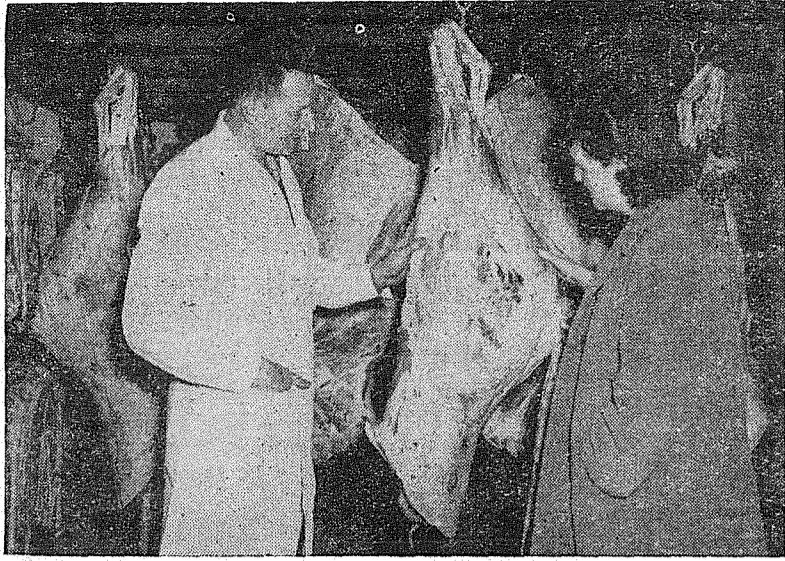
Sales Grange Keeps Froman

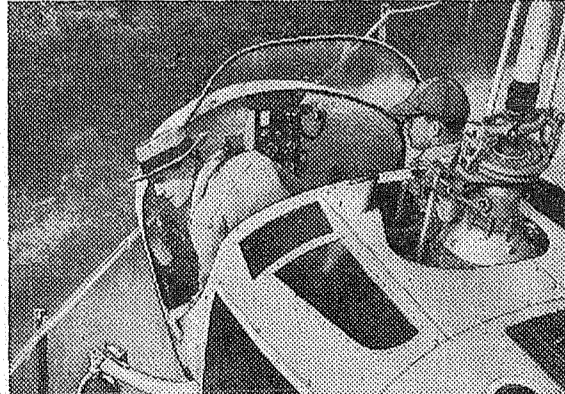

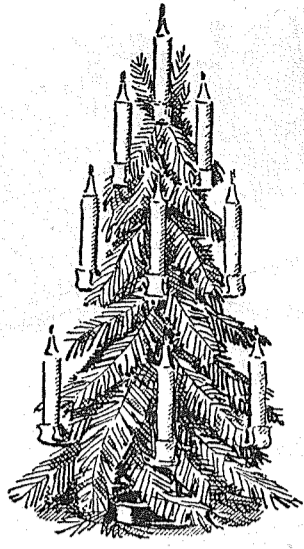
