**State Begins
Widening of
Mt. Highway**

A construction project which will widen the Mountain Highway from 96th street as far as the Country House in Brookdale was begun by the state highway department June 25.

The highway will be widened 14 feet on each side, making it 48 feet wide, according to William P. Albohm, resident engineer for the State Highway Department. This would provide four 11-foot lanes and a 4-foot median strip in the middle.

Estimated cost of the project is \$250,000. Albohm said the State Highway Department planned to continue the widening of the highway as far as the Roy Y as soon as funds could be obtained for the project.

The present project should be completed some time this year, he said.

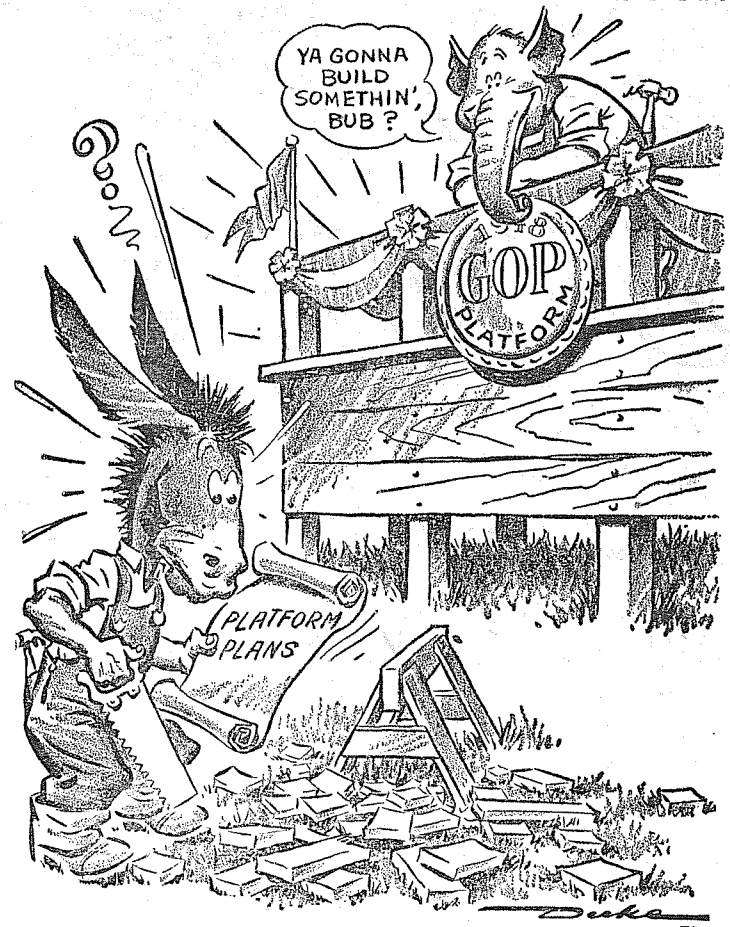

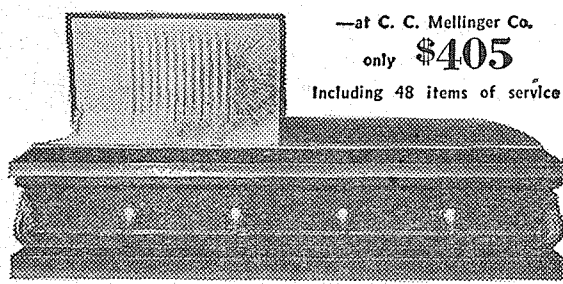

- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup shortening (butter preferred)
- 2 1/2 cups oatmeal (quick)
- 2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon soda dissolved in 1/2 cup hot water

Filling: One 10-oz. package of dates cooked with 1/4 cup sugar and a little water.

Roll out the first mixture on a cookie sheet or pastry cloth. Then spread the filling (cooked and cooled) on 1/2 of the cookie dough. Fold the other half of the dough back over this. Cut in squares and bake in a moderate oven, 350°, for 20 to 25 minutes.

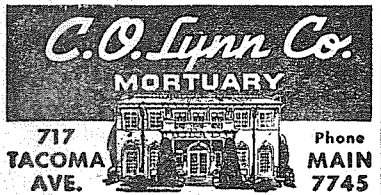

Have Pedestrians Any Rights?

Have pedestrians any rights? The annual toll of some 12,000 pedestrians killed in traffic accidents throughout the country seems to raise the question of whether an individual's right to stand—and walk—on his or her feet still exists in an increasingly motorized age.

The answer to that question can be found in current reports by safety specialists on the causes of fatal pedestrian accidents. Three out of every four pedestrians killed, we learn, were themselves violating a traffic law or committing an unsafe act, by jaywalking, crossing against signals, coming out from behind parked cars or doing something equally foolish. In other words, three out of four were presuming upon a right to walk when and where they wished, in utter defiance of safety considerations. Losing one's life is a very high price to pay for the right to walk carelessly.

In addition to the thousands of pedestrians killed, many thousands more were injured—of whom a third were crippled for life—while unknown thousands escaped accident by the skin of their teeth and continued to take chances.

Society does not concede the right to be killed or maimed by one's own foolish acts. There is a moral obligation upon us all to personally use every known safety means, and for those who simply will not, there must be enforcement by law.

It has been clearly proved that the only way pedestrians and automobiles can exist together safely is by having strict regulations for the protection and control of both. By crossing traffic where directed, when directed and as directed, pedestrians will have given up the questionable privilege of matching wits with speeding autos. But let us hope they will have gained the right to live.
